**************** Prospects for a dam on Run-

ning Water Draw continue to dim.

More than three weeks have elapsed since a group of daminterested Parmer County citizens met with the county commissioners to discuss the situation, both pro and con.

There was interest a'plenty at the meeting for the dam location south of Bovina. That interest, though, has evidently died down since that time.

We talked with Eddy Willmon, Soil and Water Conservation Service manager, about the prospects this week. He wasn't encouraging. He said the commissioners court had received no petition from the citizenry asking that a bond election be called to pay the cost of putting the federal structure here.

Willmon, who is resigning his post this week, said it was his opinion now that only two -instead of three -- dams would be asked for, and built, in Parmer County. One of these will be on the east side, at Lazbuddie. The other will be on McCracken land on Catfish Draw, just north of Bovina. There will be no cost to the county for either of these structures.

This was, understand, just Willmon's opinion at the time of our conversation. The situation

The commissioners court is the logical choice to carry the ball for the locations of the dams. At the same time, though, the elected members of the court want to do what their constituents want and they evidently don't believe that a majority of the people in the county are interested in spending tax money for such a project.

From the conversation with Willmon we got the impression that the South Bovina damsite will die a lack-of-interest death unless backers of the plan come up with some new enthusiasm. nounces. This doesn't come as a great

surprise.

The possibilities of a dam on Running Water Draw have been handicapped by first one drawback and then another since planning started months and months ago. Possible location after possible location was eliminated for various reasons as the planning continued. Then when the South Bovina site was settled on, if you could call it that, the cost seemed almost too great to overcome. And it is without a county bond election.

Too, in our opinion, there isn't enough proof-positive information available about the advantages of having a dam and a lake.

The land will be dry, the experts say, one year in 20, for instance. That's based on normal conditions, and people aren't real sure what these are and certainly they don't know contain offices, a library and what to expect in years to come. This about eliminates the use of water for municipal purposes, some believe.

Know The Truth

By the Heavenly Father Jesus has been crowned King of kings and Lord of lords, but He must be so honored by you and me, I Peter 3:15, "But sanctify in your hearts Christ as Lord. ... " This is the way the Bible talks to us so that we will make Christ our Master. The promise was made in Isaiah 9:6, 7, that Christ would sit on David's throne. It was repeated to Mary before the birth of Jesus, Luke 1:32, "He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David:" We must understand what is meant by David's throne because actually David never had a throne of his own-it was God's throne even though David did sit upon it. Here is the proof: I Kings 2:12, "And Solomon sat upon the throne of David his father . . ." 



Charolais Cattle Raised By Rancher

Lloyd Grau, long time cattleman of the Grady area, is busily introducing Charolais cattle to Curry County -- and the people of Curry County to this famous, heavy, big-boned French strain of cattle.

Charolais, pronounced sharo-lay, have a rich background, which begins back during the early days of the Roman Empire, according to historians. Then, they were raised for heavy dray or farm work, but in the years in fact, breeders have One of the oldest breeds of beef cattle, the purebred Char-

from France, as in last year's instance, restrictions are still rigid and most costly, with quarantine periods on both sides of the Atlantic before they can at last make their home in America. Now, despite the quarantines,

the restrictions, etc., there are more than 41,000 purebred Charolais registered in the United States and another 250,-00 recorded crossbreeds are being used as foundation animals in breeding up programs. The American - International Charolais Association, headquarters in Houston, Tex., will accept as purebred Charolais any animal which is 31/32 Charolais. In other words, purebred Charolais are produced when a purebred bull is used on five successive generations from a basic beef breed. This is only by using a basic beef breed; those bred to dairy type animals cannot be registered.

Just why is this breed becoming so popular? There are many reasons and not the least

of these is the rapid growth rate of the calf crop. Tests made at Grau's ranch last summer showed that calves weighed from 500 to 600 pounds each at the age of five months. Furthermore, these same calves, weighed through the assistance of the Curry County Extension office and the Grady FFA advisor, weighed from 70 to 80 pounds more when weighed just 19 days later. And this was on grass and mother cow alone. In fact, says Grau, calves grow to 1,100 pounds market weight in one year, compared with 18 months for other breeds. Premium prices can be expected from packers, too, for still another reason. Charolais are favored by consumers, we're told, because the meat is shot through with a thread-like network offat, finer



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
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
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
