When the calendar is closed on 1967 at the end of next month and the highlights of the year are considered, the expansion and development of the cattle industry in the area will, no doubt, be placed toward the top of the list of progressive changes.

Blossoming of the cattle industry during the 12-month period included the announcement and construction-beginning of Parmer County Cattle Co.'s 30,000 head feedlot southwest of Bovina and the beginning of construction of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. packing plant, which is said to be the largest in the world, It's located northeast of here between Bovina and Friona. In addition, the Hi-Plains Feed Yards, with a capacity of multithousands of head of cattle during a year are in operation west of Friona and northeast of Bovina.

These three developments are in the Parmer County area alone. Other expansion of the beef industry have been taken or announced at Hereford, Canyon, Amarillo, etc.



An explosion blew sheetrock off the ceiling onto the child's bed and blew out most of the windows. Mrs. Williams was able to rescue the child from under the sheetrock, apparently uninjured. The mother received only singed hair.






**Know The Truth**

We have no right to change or twist the teaching of the Bible. God is the author of it, He even gave the words by which to express the message, ICor, 2:13, "Which things we speak, not in words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth; comparing spiritual things with spiritual." The Bible is not the interpretation of men or the mere opinion of the apostles. It is so constructed that we either accept it entirely or reject it entirely: notice these two passages, II Peter 1:20, 21, "Knowing this first, that no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost."

The Word of God is called the "perfect" law or liberty, in James 1:25, and so all-powerful that it can furnish man with all he needs to know concerning religion, II Timothy 3:16, 17. Ambitious men have "pretended" to have revelations from God in the latter days and have palmed off on the public a book which they claim to be equal with the Bible, However, if one will reason a little about what Paul said concerning an "angel" who brings a different gospel must be rejected, Gal. 1:8,9, he will realize that the Bible, and the Bible only, must be our guide, Now, some people might never accept some other book besides the Bible, such as the Book of Mormon: however, they do something as sinful: they change what God has said in the Bible, Listen to what the Apostle Peter said about anyone twisting the teaching of the Bible, II Peter 3:16, "As also in all his epistles, speaking in them of these things; in which are some things hard to be understood, which they that are unlearned and unstable wrest, as they do also the other scriptures, unto their own destruction."

Bill Brigham, also of that company in Roswell, is mill superintendent.
