When the calendar is closed on 1967 at the end of next month and the highlights of the year are considered, the expansion and development of the cattle industry in the area will, no doubt, be placed toward the top of the list of progressive changes.

Blossoming of the cattle industry during the 12-month period included the announcement and construction beginning of Parmer County Cattle Co.'s 30,000 head feedlot southwest of Bovina and the beginning of construction of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. packing plant, which is said to be the largest in the world, it's located northeast of here between Bovina and Friona. In addition, the HI-Plains Feed Yards, with a capacity of multi-thousands of head of cattle during a year are in operation west of Friona and northeast of Bovina.

These three developments are in the Parmer County area alone. Other expansion of the beef industry have been taken or announced at Hereford, Canyon, Amarillo, etc.

What eventual development will result from these steps remains to be seen. Difficult it is to visualize what changes will come about as the area expands its agri-business to include cattle feeding on a massive scale.

Increased population is, of course, one of the anticipated changes. Others, of more or less significance, are bound to come to.

We hope the area is, or will be, in a position to take the greatest possible advantages of the development.

Bovina Businesses Football Contest isn't over yet!

We've noticed on the open-to-the-public totals of the various contestants that Bobby Cumpton's lead has slipped to two points with two more weeks remaining in the 13-week deal. Leroy Lance now has a total of 74 points as compared with Mrs. Cumpton's 76.

In a normal year, a two-point lead at this time in the contest wouldn't be considered especially unusual. However, Mrs. Cumpton has set such a torrid pace during this season that it seems unusual that she has "let up" to a certain extent.

The percentage of the pacesetter has decreased, too, now to a more normal 760 through the first 100 games. An overall percentage of approximately 750 is usually required to win. This will vary to a certain extent because of several reasons. One of these is the number of ties which result from games on the contest. Some years there will be more ties than others, needless to say, and because tie games are considered and not thrown out, they can run the contestants' percentages of accuracy up or down a point or two. This season seems to have been more tie-free than some, incidentally.

But the 1967 contest still has three weeks to run, including this one, and a lot of things can happen yet.

Just last week, for instance, Houston Bartlett was by the office to leave his entry blank and we kidded him just a little about being such a consistent player and not getting any prize-money checks.

We must have overdone it. He came up with second place and a check for \$3 when the entry blanks were graded and his wife took the \$5 first place money.

That's about all you could expect from one couple as far as the first two places are concerned.

Last week might not have been as fair as some weeks, contest-wise, though.

Readers of this column, both of 'em, had an advantage over others in that "it said here" that the Red Raiders could very well be upset by the Texas Christian Horned Frogs. And sure enough, that's just what happened as evidenced by the long faces and sour attitudes of

Effective At Mid-Term --

New Band Director Named By Trustees

A new band and music director for Bovina Schools was named at a regular monthly meeting of members of the school board Monday night.

He is James Andrews, a native of Vega, who will be graduated from West Texas State University at Canyon in January. He is expected to begin his duties here in mid-January. Andrews will replace Earle Hise, who has held the position since the beginning of the school year when he replaced Joe Wayne Harper. Hise will be assigned to teach a grade school section during the second semester.

Also hired for the '67-'68 school year at the Monday night meeting was Andrews' wife. Her teaching duties will be assigned later. Mrs. Andrews will also be graduated from WT at mid-term.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrews were interviewed by the board prior to being hired.

An accreditation report from the Texas Education Agency was discussed with an agreement being made to comply with the agency's suggestions as quickly as possible. (See separate story in this issue.)

Plans for use of the new elementary school were discussed in regard to personnel. Considered were additional cafeteria workers, a secretary and a custodian. No decisions were made Monday night.

Authorized by the board was the payment of the due estimate to the contractor on the new elementary building in the amount of \$49,280. Total amount of the contract is \$173,518.

A new school bus was ordered. It will be a 54-passenger model. Superintendent L. F. Jacobs pointed out that \$5200

was budgeted for the purchase of the vehicle. It has been the school's policy to purchase one new bus each year.

Insurance for the new elementary school building was discussed, but no decision was reached. Representatives of the four insurance agencies will be invited to meet with the board to discuss the insurance.

The school's audit report for

the fiscal year ending August 31 was approved and publication of the cash receipts and disbursements was approved

for publication in The Blade. The report will appear in the November 22 issue.

The board approved the employment of Tuck Monk as a school bus driver. Monk re-

places Carol Steelman, who resigned.

Bills for the month totaling \$62,809.03, including the building payment, were approved to be paid.

Also approved for employment was Ramon Aleman as custodian, in place of Victor Barrazo, who also resigned.

From Texas Education Agency --

School Here Gets Favorable Report

Texas Education Agency has recommended that the Bovina Independent School District be continued as a fully accredited 12-grade school system.

The recommendation followed an accreditation team visit of the school September 27. A team of two representatives of Texas Education Agency made the survey of the school facilities and operation.

This was the first accreditation visit made here.

At a Monday night meeting of the board of trustees of the school district, a decision was made to comply with the recommendations of the state agency as quickly as possible.

The report indicated an overcrowded condition of the school, but pointed out that a new elementary school building was under construction which "should relieve the overcrowded situation."

L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, said at the Monday night meeting that some of the suggested improvements had already been made.

The full report of the accreditation team follows:

The Bovina Independent School District, receiving its initial accreditation visit, is located in the west central part of Parmer County which is primarily an agricultural area. (Continued on Page 2)

Due Dec. 10 --

Paving Bills Mailed Owners

Property owners in Bovina have been sent statements from the City Commission for their part of the new paving program here in the amount of \$68,211.55.

One-fourth of the amount billed each property owner, or the entire amount, is due Dec. 10. Property owners may either pay the full amount, or if they prefer, one-fourth with the remainder due in three annual payments.

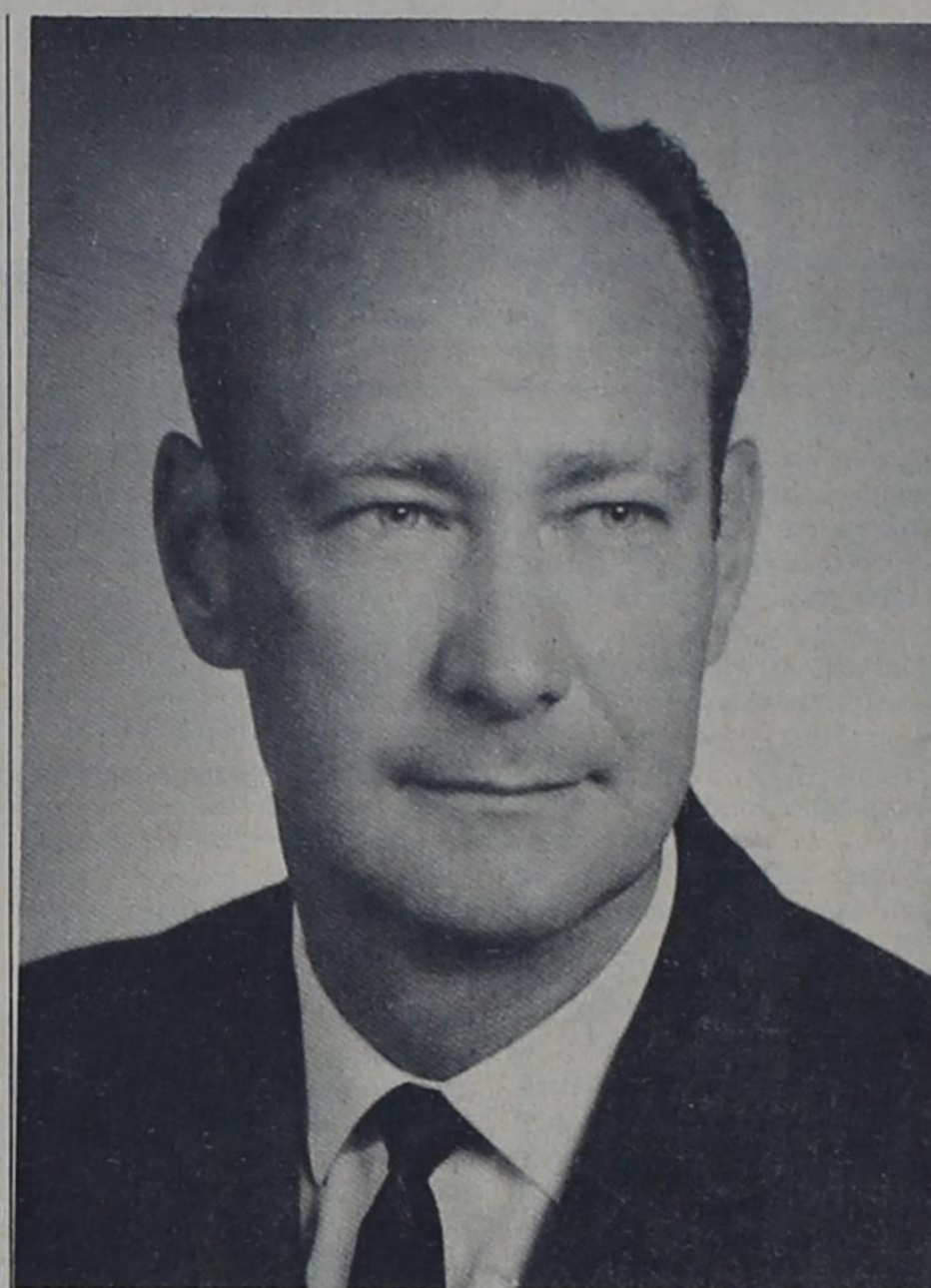
Dec. 10 was the tentative acceptance date of the paving pro-

gram here, set on Nov. 3 in a special session of the city commission.

At that time, the total amount of \$80,167.88 will be due the contractor, Jake Diel of Muleshoe.

The city's part of the paving program, intersections and alleys, will total \$11,956.33, plus legal and advertising fees.

Property owner's portion of \$68,211.55 includes 15,661 feet of paving at \$4.30 per foot, and 295 feet of paving where curbs

Amendment Election Counts Light Vote

Although the voters in Texas approved all amendments, with the exception of No. 6, which remained doubtful early this week, Bovina and Parmer County did not go along with the rest of the states voters on all issues on the election ballot Saturday.

A total of only 276 turned out in the county to register their opinions; 52 of them voted in Bovina.

Bovina voted against Amendment No. 1 to the tune of 32-18, permitting counties to put all county taxes into one general fund; against No. 3, 29-22, extending the Veterans Land Program; against No. 5, 36-15, providing for funds and selling bonds in the amount of \$75 million to acquire lands for state parks; and against No. 6, 26-15, permitting non-elective

state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective positions under the state or United States government where there is no conflict of interest and where the state will benefit.

Bovina approved No. 2, 26-23, permitting hospital districts to establish and maintain mental health services; No. 4, 32-19, authorizing counties to pay medical bills of law enforcement officers injured in the line of duty.

Parmer County as a whole approved four amendments, one through four, and voted against two amendments, five and six. Largest number of votes cast was in the Friona box, where 99 turned out to vote against all the amendments.

The county vote is shown by precincts in this issue.

Bovina Veteran Program Speaker

Students in Bovina Schools were presented a Veteran's Day program Friday morning in the school auditorium. J. T. Hammonds, World War II veteran of Bovina, was the principal speaker.

Bovina High School Band opened the program with a march, then played "America" while the colors were posted by Boy Scouts Dale Johnston and Allen Cockerham. Johnston led the audience in the "Pledge of Allegiance."

Master of ceremonies was Bill Caldwell, president of the senior class, who introduced the speaker, Sharon Pierson sang the "Star Spangled Banner" accompanied by the band.

The invocation and benediction were given by Rev. J. B. Fowler, pastor of Bovina Methodist Church.

Galen Hromas, president of the student council, told the meaning of Veterans Day, He

said that the 26 million veterans range from 20 to 80 years of age, but in spite of their diversity, share one thing. They have had the desire to serve their country when it has been in dire need, and have placed service above self.

"America will continue to stand," Hromas said, "giving the greatest promise for the world today."

Hammonds told the students that Nov. 11 was called Armistice Day following the end of World War I, which was to have been a war to end all wars. When this was found to be a mistake, it was changed to Veterans Day.

The veteran is unique, Hammonds continued. He is a happy man because he enjoys the freedom for which he contributed much. To the 26 million veterans, 15,000 are added each week.

The school district contains 208 square miles.

Total assessed valuation was \$21,457,524, estimated to be 33 1/3 per cent of actual value. The total school tax of \$1.83 provided \$1.26 for maintenance and operation and 57 cents for retirement of the district's \$963,000 bonded indebtedness.

ADMINISTRATION

The school board had developed, duplicated, and made available to all school employees and to the public, the policies that covered the operations of the school.

The board of school trustees held regularly scheduled meetings and kept official public records properly filed in the office of the superintendent. There were no written administrative policies governing the operations of the school.

All employees seemed to understand the nature of their duties and were supervised by the superintendent or his representatives.

Provisions for professional growth and development of staff members were provided through local in-service training, area workshops, and regional service center conferences.

INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM

There was a well-balanced instructional program in the elementary grades designed to meet the needs of individual pupils. Grouping of pupils for instructional purposes was practiced in these grades.

The high school curriculum was well balanced in the field of fine arts. Band was the only music offered.

The agricultural shop was limited in space to the extent that some of the boys had to work outside. There was not enough room to freely maneuver materials without coming into contact with power tool equipment. Safety goggles could not

Bids For Clinic To Be Received

Bids from five contractors for a new Bovina medical clinic will be opened here Friday. A representative from Sears-Roebuck Foundation will meet with the temporary executive committee in Bovina.

Plans and specifications were recently handed five contractors and these are to be in by Thursday, according to a member of the committee.

If bids are acceptable, members say a contract may be awarded Friday for the construction of a new clinic on the site donated the Bovina Clinic Fund by the Joe F. Langer family located on the Oklahoma Lane highway.

Citizens in Bovina have raised a total of \$43,000 in land, cash and pledges for a medical clinic. This is for the construction of a clinic and the securing of an AMA approved doctor for the town.

out of their field of preparation; however, each had Deficiency Removal Plans on file.

PLANT AND FACILITIES

The plant was neat and clean and seemed to be well kept. The existing building seemed to be overcrowded; however, a new elementary school building under construction should relieve the overcrowded situation.

Even though the visiting team found in general a good instructional program in operation, and facilities being provided to relieve the overcrowded situation, it is strongly suggested that immediate attention be given to the correction of deficiencies described in this report.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Bovina Independent School District be continued as a fully accredited 12-grade school system.

Sears-Roebuck Foundation accepted Bovina for its help after a survey last November showed the need for a doctor here. The Foundation has advised the temporary executive committee on its drive to raise money for the project, has furnished plans for a clinic building, and will aid in contacting prospective doctors.

It is hoped that a doctor can be secured by the time construction of the clinic is completed, but it may take a longer time to secure a physician since the demand is larger than the supply.

When a doctor is secured for Bovina, he will be given an option to buy the clinic building.

Cattle Company Completion Set

Although Parmer County Cattle Co. has already received 891 head of cattle, completion of the new feed lot is not expected for another 30 days, according to Stanley Klimek, office manager.

Located southwest of Bovina, ultimate capacity of the operation will be 30,000 head.

However, it will be another 30 days before the mill is ready for operation, along with other work still to be done.

When work is completed at the feed lot, another 13,000 head of cattle is expected, Klimek said. Pens are in readiness for the initial shipment of cattle here.

The first load of cattle, 582 head, arrived here Oct. 31. An additional 198 head were received Nov. 2, Klimek said. These are mixed bred steers.

"Cap" Naegle, who was formerly associated with Janss Cattle Industries of Roswell, N.M., is the feed lot manager. Bill Brigham, also of that company in Roswell, is mill superintendent.

Klmeek is from Phoenix, Arizona.

Seven persons are now employed at Parmer County Cattle Co., but when operations are in full swing, the number is expected to increase to 20.

Construction of the feed lot was begun here last Spring on Jack Dunn land four miles southwest of Bovina and south of Highway 60 and Running Water Draw.

Corporation formed to construct and operate the feed lot here is made up of G.D. Anderson, Jr. of Bovina; John Douglas Pitman and Owen Seamond, both of Hereford, J.R. Dillard, Jr. of Wichita Falls, and Naegle, in conjunction with Jack Dunn of Clovis.

Construction of the cattle company near Bovina is expected to give the area economy another boost.

Shortly following the announcement last Spring, Missouri Meat Packers and Friona business leaders announced plans for construction of a packing plant southwest of Friona. Construction of that industry is also underway.

But Why Don't YOU Pray To The Saints?

Praying to the Saints, we know, is almost solely a Catholic practice.

Many other people, it seems, regard the practice as silly, futile and even idolatrous. They imagine that all prayers must be addressed directly to God, and that there is no need for such intercessors and mediators as Saints. Some seem to think Catholic veneration of the Saints is in opposition to the doctrine that Christ is the one Mediator between God and man.

If it is hard for others to understand why Catholics pray to the Saints, it is equally hard for Catholics to understand why other Christians do not so pray. It is a custom which has been observed in the Church since the time of the Apostles. Its merits are clearly indicated in both the Old Testament and the New, and Catholics the world over can testify that God does, indeed, listen with special favor to the prayers addressed to Him in our behalf by the Saints.

It sounds illogical to Catholics to recite in the Apostles' Creed, "I believe in... the Communion of Saints..." and then to scoff at prayer to the Saints. The difficulty, it seems to us, is that there is confusion concerning just what the Saints are. There is certainly confusion concerning the Catholic attitude toward Saints, and Catholic customs with respect to them.

Belief in the Saints depends upon the conviction that we can help one another with our prayers. Catholics have no doubt about this. We read, for example, in Genesis, God's instructions to Abimelech to ask Abraham to pray for him: "He shall pray for thee, and thou shalt live" (Genesis 20: 7,17).

God had mercy on the children of Israel because Moses prayed for them. At another time God said

...and my servant Job shall pray for you; for him I will accept" (Job 42:8). The new Testament contains equally convincing testimony. St. Paul asks repeatedly for the prayers of the faithful. In the Epistle of St. James, we find: "And pray one for another, that ye may be healed" (James 5:16).

If God heeds the prayers offered by sinful mortals in behalf of one another, how much more surely will he listen to his friends, the Saints in Heaven, who are in a position to know the needs expressed in our prayers to them? High-Flying Eagles Soar Over Mustangs

Seagraves' high-flying Eagles indicated why they have been rated all season as the No. 1 Class A team in Texas Friday night as they battered the Bovina Mustangs by a 52-0 count. The game, which ended regular season play for both teams, was at Seagraves.

For the Mustangs, it was the end of the 1967 campaign. They closed out with a record of 2-8, identical with their mark of 1966. This was the second year for the Bovina squad to compete on the Class A level.

The Eagles scored early and often as they raced to the easy win which left their season record without a blemish. They scored the first time they had the ball, after receiving the

opening kickoff, and then racked up two scoring plays during each of the four quarters to bulge their game total to the 52 points.

The Mustangs were never able to rub out the '0' on their side of the scoreboard. Their only serious threat was made in the third period, and they were trailing, 35-0, at that point. They banged out a 64-yard drive which went from their own 29 to the Seagraves' seven yard line. The ball went over on downs back at the Eagle 11. Fullback Carl Harris and Halfback Lynn Murphy did the bulk of the ball carrying in the drive which included three first downs. The longest play of the drive was a 27-yard scamper

by Murphy which went from Seagraves' 37 to the 10, Harris made 22 yards in one series of three consecutive carries.

The Eagles broke over the half-century mark in scoring with a field goal in the fourth quarter. It was a 17-yarder by Dick Webb, who also booted five extra points. Seagraves also made one two-point play following a touchdown.

Bovina's ground game couldn't work consistently enough to produce a score and the passing attack was almost halted by the Eagle defenders. The Ponies completed only one toss. That was a 12-yard aerial from Punter Mike Grissom to Murphy on a fake punt play.

It came as the third quarter ended, giving the Mustangs a first down at the Seagraves 39. Representing the Bovina club as captains for the tilt were senior members who were playing their last football game for the Maroon and White, Daryl Kirkpatrick, Rex Cumpton, Kent Stanberry, Grissom, Murphy, Tommy Sisco and Harris.

Last season, the Eagles downed the Mustangs, 52-0. The teams are not scheduled to play next season.

Seagraves plays its bi-district game this week against Aspermont, winner of District 6-A in Snyder. Seagraves is the champion of District 5-A.
