Estlack Named WTU Mgr. At Clarendon



Local Manager Allen H. Estlack of Hedley assumed the duties of WTU Local Manager in Clarendon on April 1 following the retirement of Local Manager C. A. Pitts.

The change in management in the Clarendon Office was announced by District Manager J. C. Randel of Childress, who stated that the Hedley Office will continue to be under the supervision of Mr. Estlack and will be open from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. each day Monday through Friday.

Employed by WTU for the past 10 years, Estlack began his career with the Company as a groundman on a distribution crew and a few months later was transferred to the service department in Clarendon. He was working as a serviceman when he was transferred to Hedley as local manager in 1966.

Born in Electra in 1938, Estlack has lived in the Clarendon area most of his life. He is a 1956 graduate of Clarendon High School. He attended Clarendon College one year and then transferred to Texas Tech where he received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1961.

During his four years residence in Hedley, Estlack has been one of Hedley's leading citizens. He is the immediate past president of the Lions Club and scoutmaster and district committeeman for Boy Scouts of America. He is also first aid and water safety chairman for the Red Cross; is a trustee of the Methodist Church and is serving as Worshipful Master of the Masonic Lodge.

The parents of the groom hosted a rehearsal dinner on Wednesday evening at Mrs. Ruby Bromley's Dining Room in Clarendon.

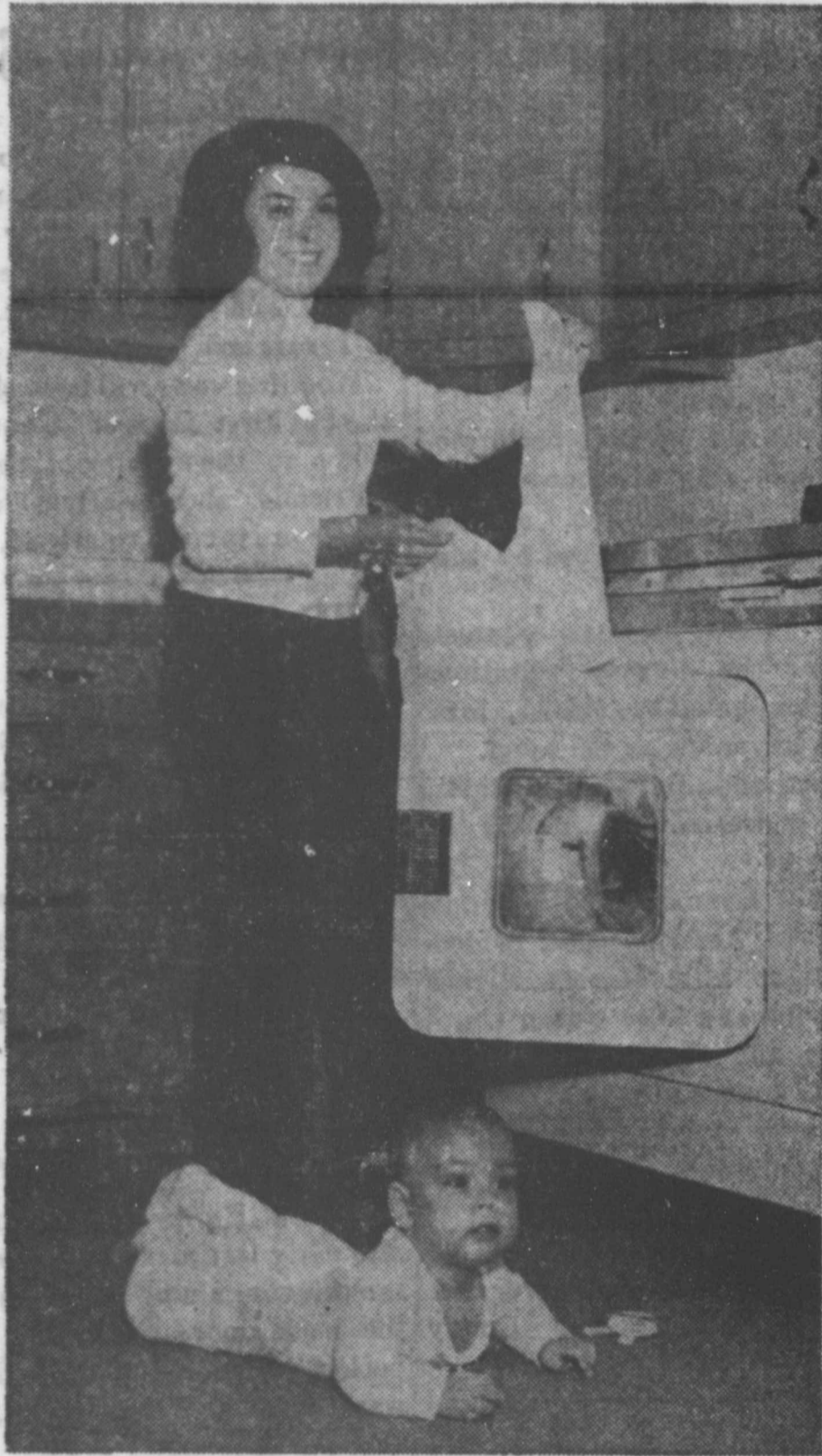

Announcement has been made that grazing privileges may be modified on cropland taken out of production and designated as diverted acres under the 1970 Programs. This is the second year USDA has taken such action to enable additional grazing of spring forage. The additional optional non-grazing period would run between May 14 and Oct 15 permitting spring grazing two weeks later than possible under prior programs.
