Couch Heads Program John R. Saunders

The Gallup-McKinley County, N. Mex., schools, in a joint effort with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, are conducting a special 6 weeks enrichment summer school for the disadvantaged Indian primary children of the Ramah area. It is a pilot program of 80 pupils, 5 teacher aides and 5 teachers and Bob Couch, formerly of Hedley, has received the position of head teacher.

Special activities will include a train ride from Gallup to Albuquerque, returning by chartered plane, a trip to Carlsbad Caverns, and experimental work in creative dramatic arts with a \$10,000 purchase of video tape machines, and monitors. The 6 week program will begin July 6, and will also work with the latest motivational educational toys due to a special grant of \$5,000 for this purpose.

Notice of Highway Construction

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvements on Farm to Market Road 1260, extending from the end of F. M. Road 1260, 5.0 miles North of U. S. Highway 287, East and North. Since the Administration of the Highway Department has approved the route and design proposed for the development of this project, work will begin on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project.

The proposed design will provide a 20 foot roadway surface, and a 28 foot crown width, with a 26 foot roadway width bridge on the Salt Fork of Red River. The right of way width on the proposed project will be a minimum of 100 feet.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Texas Highway Department District Office, P. O. Box 909, Childress, Texas, 79201.

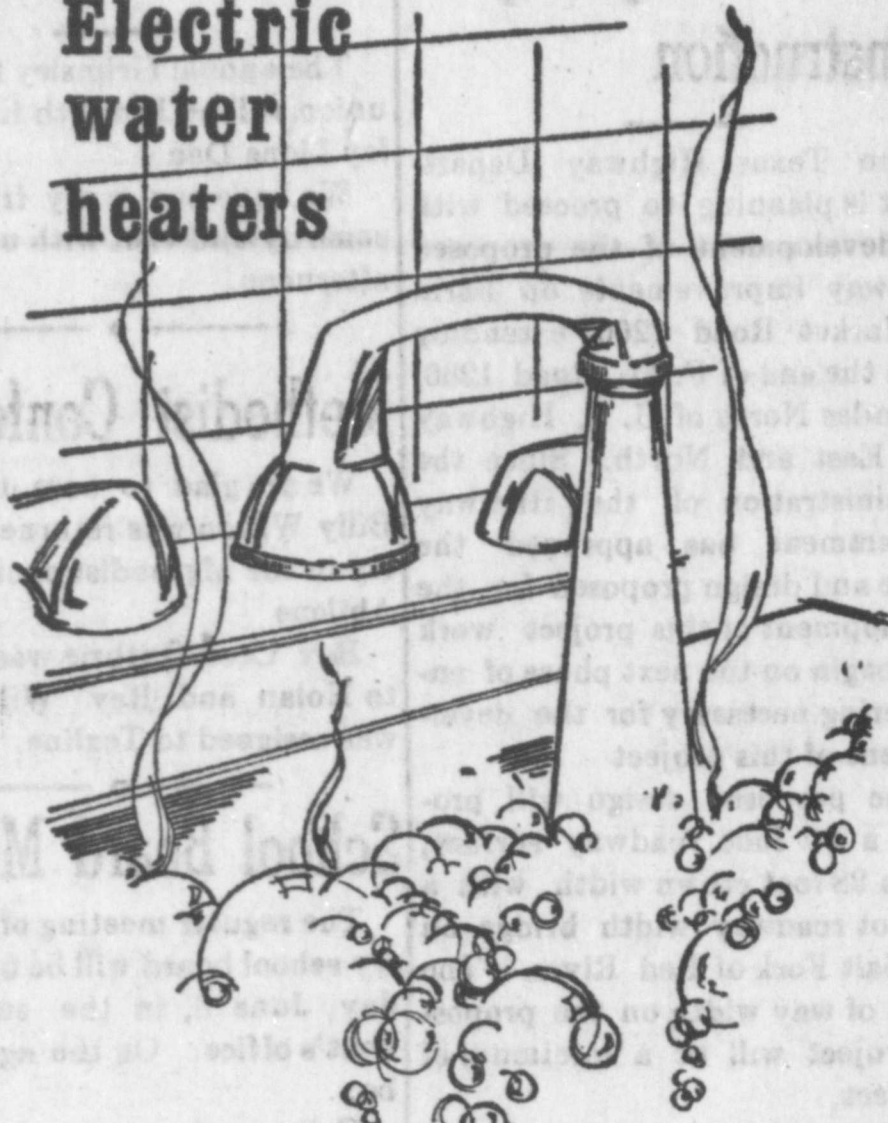

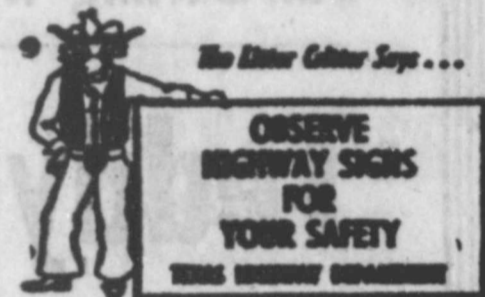

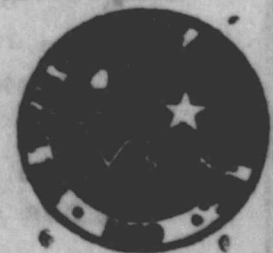
