Emergency Loans

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced the designation of 24 Texas counties as an area where the Farmer's Home Administration may make emergency loans. These loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers through June 30, 1971.

The counties involved are: Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

This designation is based on the damage resulting from the severe drought this spring and summer. Also certain counties suffered from hail and wind storms and the tornadoes. Thousands of farmers and ranchers have suffered losses and the lack of feed and pasture is affecting livestock producers. The farmers and ranchers can apply for loans at their local FHA county office.
