Ben Barnes, Texas' young, promising politician who is now serving as lieutenant governor after a successful reign as speaker of the house, is now overly concerned about what he should try to do next.

At least that's the way it looks to us.

Barnes, who received more votes than any one ever did in a race in Texas, when he was elected to his present position, is evidently using, or attempting to, his present position of leadership as a stepping stone to something greater . . . for him.

According to the papers we read, he's considering taking on Preston Smith for the governor's chair or maybe even trying to retire U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough.

Seems that the boy just can't make up his mind.

And we're about to get tired of his indecision and if he just keeps pushing, we could just as easily tire of him.

His name evidently has something magnetic about it when it comes to pulling votes and he does have youth and good looks in his favor. And really we don't have anything against him, but at the same time, the aforementioned advantages he has don't, by themselves, excite us much.

Barnes seems to be worried about what he should do next to help himself. He's leaving the impression that the people of Texas aren't what's important. He's more worried about making the right step up the political ladder than he is in being of service to the people whose money he's now taking.

Like everybody else, all politicians look after themselves first, we'd guess, but we just wish Barnes would be more subtle about what he's trying to do.

As a politician, he'd best be more concerned, at least outwardly, about what he can do for the people than what they can do for him.

All this publicity about chasing around hunting the easiest political race to get into next could possibly leave a bad taste in the mouths of other voters of this great state . . . not just ours.

Barnes hasn't asked us for any advice, needless to say, but when and if he does, we'll tell him he'd better be content to be lieutenant governor for another term or he's apt to find himself among the ranks of the politically unemployed.

With just two more batches of luck in games Thanksgiving Day, the television sports people can look plenty smart. They talked Arkansas and Texas into postponing their regularly-scheduled Southwest Conference football game until the first week in December . . . after the other teams had finished their schedules so they could telecast the event.

The idea was, we're sure, when the deal was made, that the game would decide the Southwest Conference Championship and the host team in the January 1 Cotton Bowl classic. The TV boys were right about that as it turns out. And it just could be that both teams will be nationally ranked and undefeated when "the" game comes off Saturday, December 6.

Almost all season, Texas has been ranked No. 2 nationally while the Razorbacks have been considered the fourth best college football team in the country.

We'd like to see the undefeated air let out of this TV spectacular. Nothing would tickle us more than for the Texas Tech Red Raiders to upset Arkansas and the Texas Aggies outscore TU come Thanksgiving afternoon.

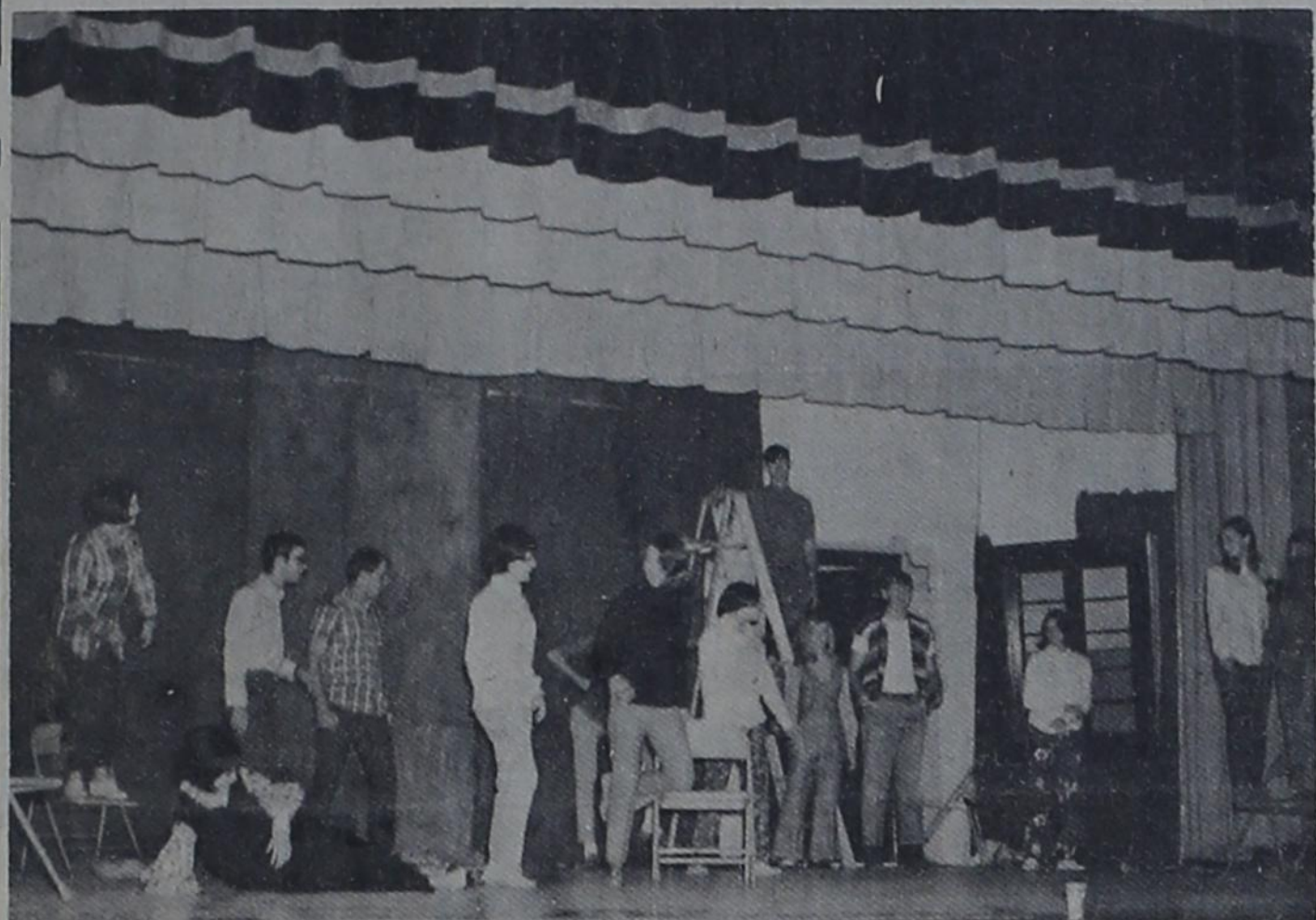

Install Exercise Machine

An exercise machine, based almost completely on the weight-lifting method, is in use at Bovina Schools.

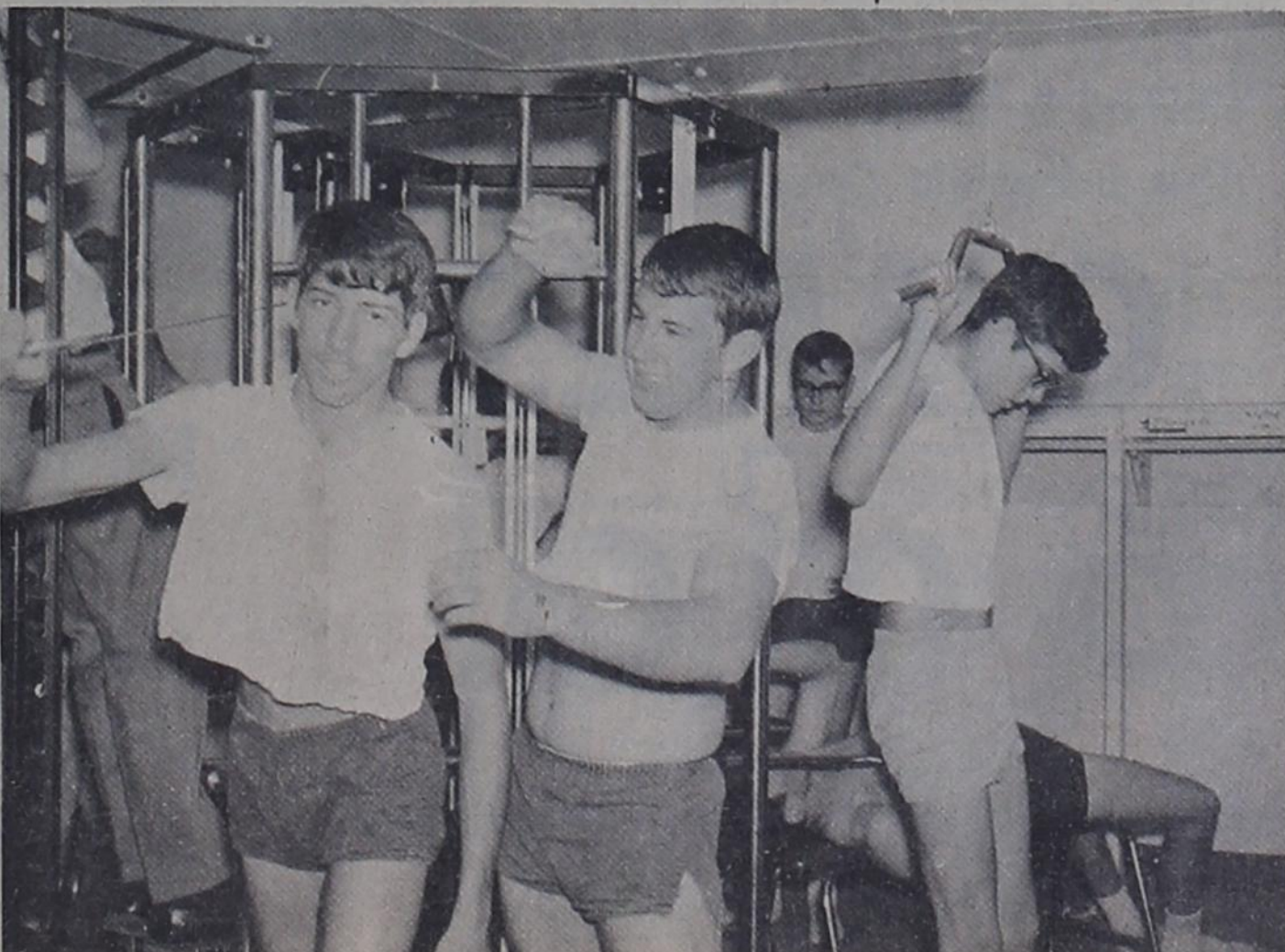
It arrived here Thursday after the machine was ordered by the Mustang Booster Club, which is making financial arrangements for it.

The proceeds from the Zogi Variety Revue here Tuesday night will help defray costs of the machine.

Actually, the machine is in two parts. One is built on a round base, with equipment for six boys doing six different body-building exercises. Each may be adjusted to the student's strength by moving pins to different lifting weights. This machine has a chinning and stretching bar, arm exercise cables, shoulder builders, leg exerciser, and a weight lifter.

The second segment of the machine has three stations. One is a weight lifter for legs, another a sitting up incliner and the other, another type device controlled by weights.

Athletic Director Gib Hough says a program is being worked out so that the machine will be used for all athletics.

instead of only one. Both are underwritten by the organization.

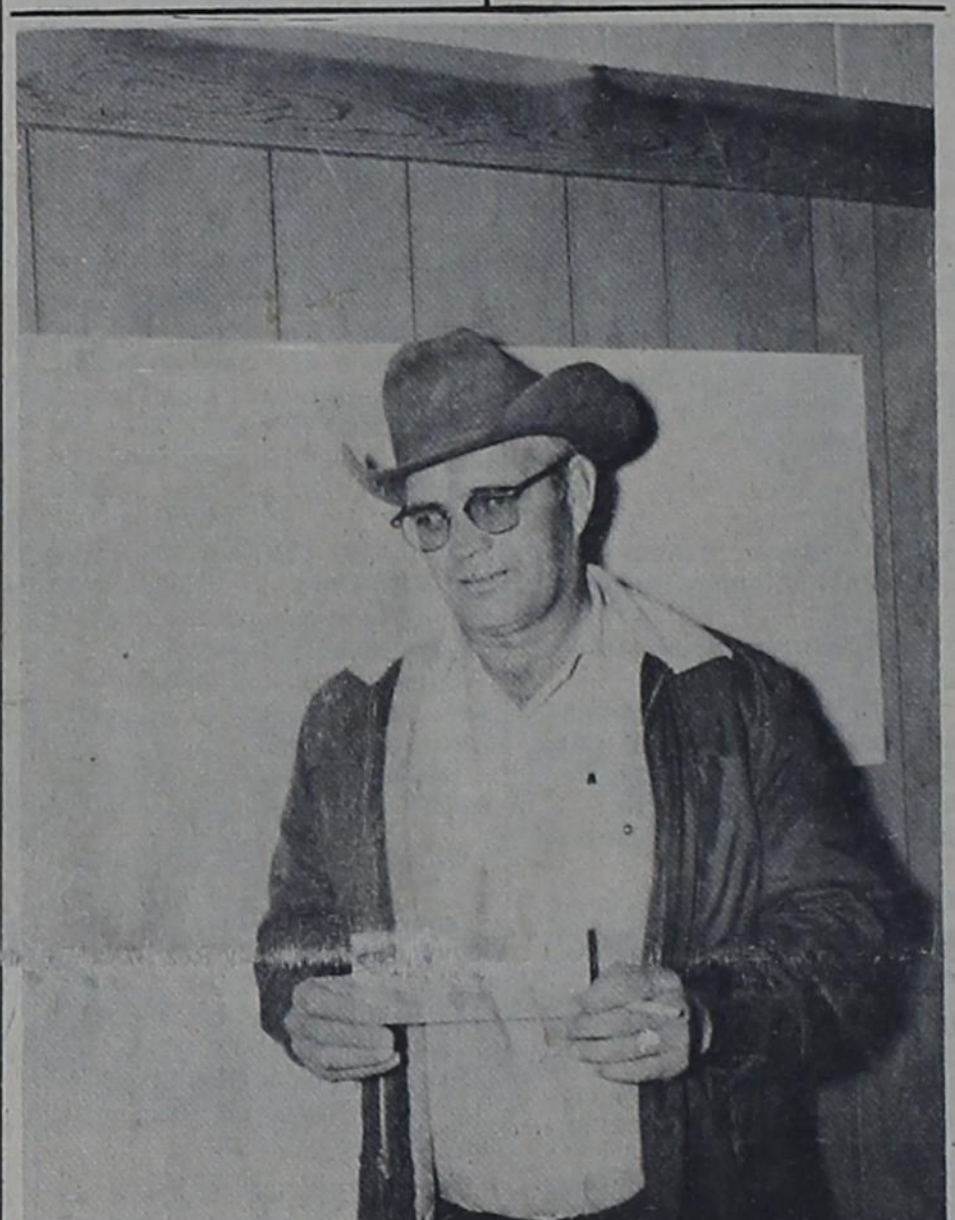
The Grace Paul Opportunity Plan is the more recent project, which provides funds for students attending college. These funds will be repaid with no interest.

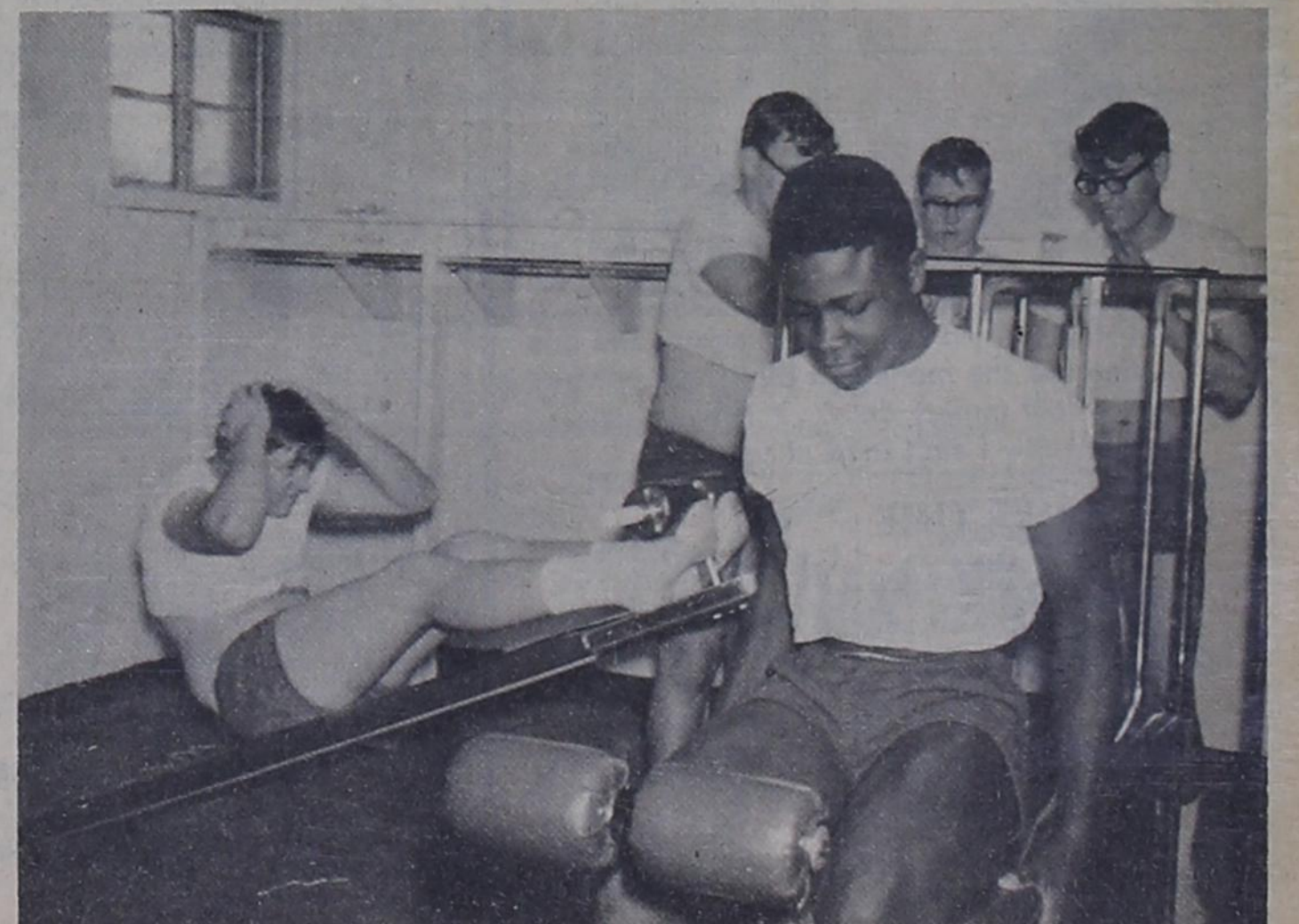
are Glenden Sudderth and Frances Allen.

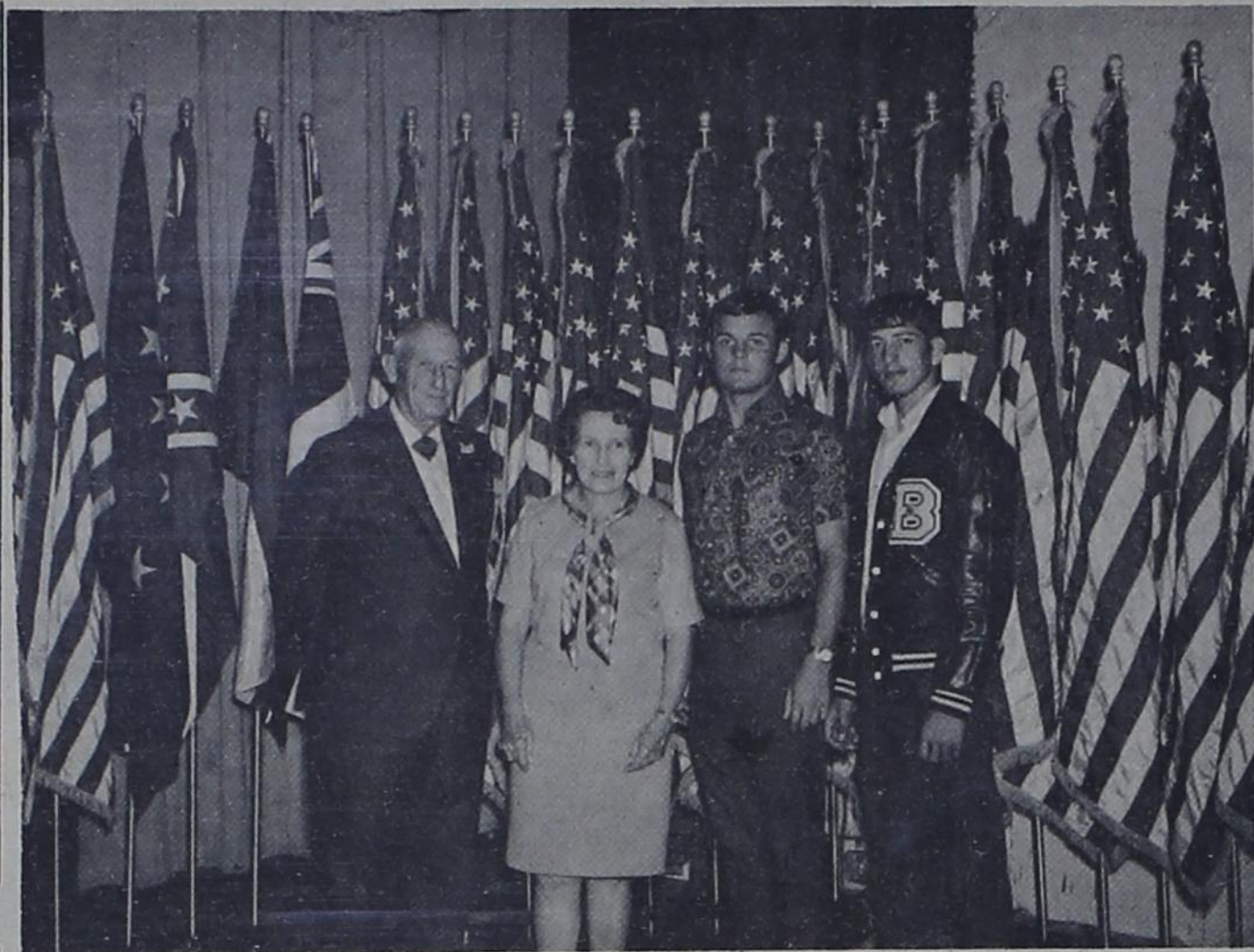

Present Flags Veterans' Day

"Flags Over America" was the Veterans' Day program presented Bovina students Tuesday afternoon of last week.

The largest private collection of flags in existence, 90 in all, was displayed for the students in the school auditorium.

Charles R. Oakley and Mrs. Oakley of Clovis, N. M., provided the program Veterans' Day.

In describing the flags, Oakley told of the couple's travels in obtaining historical information about the flags.

While seeking patterns at the Smithsonian Institute, the Oakleys learned their collection exceeded that of the institute.

Therefore, the flags will some day be given to the institute.

The Oakley collection was nearly entirely made by Mrs. Oakley. In his speech, Mr. Oakley demonstrated the method of cutting a perfect star from cloth. He said because Betsy Ross knew this method, she was given the opportunity of making the nation's first flag.

In addition to United States flags, from the first to today, Oakley described about 10 other flags which have flown over this nation, and how they came to be in existence. He also has flags of all 50 states.

Stuart McMeans, president of the Student Council, gave a history of Veterans' Day. Bruce Caldwell introduced the speaker.

The invocation was given by Rev. J. B. Fowler and the benediction by Mickey Patterson. LaJuana Hastings played the "Star Spangled Banner" as the flags were presented.

30 Per Cent Behind --

Vehicle Checks Moving Slowly

AUSTIN -- Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that motor vehicle inspections in Texas are running almost 30 per cent behind the inspection rate at this time last year.

"Unless the inspection rate increases, there are going to be some awfully long lines at inspection stations prior to the April 15 deadline," Speir said. During the year which ended August 31, some 6.3 million vehicles were inspected in Texas. Since September 1, only 538,000 have received the required inspection.

The State Motor Vehicle Inspection Act was amended by the Legislature to provide that

inspection stickers issued after September 1 will expire 12 months from the date of issue. However, the law requires that all motor vehicles display a new sticker before April 15, 1970.

Speir noted that the new stickers are being placed on the driver's side of the windshield and contain a number tab showing the month of expiration. The old stickers are on the passenger or right-hand side and have no number tab.

"The inspection program is intended to discover vehicle defects which may lead to an accident. We urge all Texans to have their vehicles inspected soon to make sure they are safe for winter driving," Speir said.



On The Farm In Parmer County

HIGH PLAINS IRRIGATION SURVEY NOW AVAILABLE

Facts and figures that describe irrigation in Parmer and 41 other High Plains counties are now available from the County Agricultural Agent's office. These irrigation facts are published each year by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in the High Plains Irrigation Survey.

Although special emphasis is placed on 1969 irrigation, long term trends for major crops, number of wells, pumping capacities, and irrigated acreage are also included in the survey. This information is combined to show changes that have taken place in High Plains Irrigation over the years.

In Parmer County, approximately 2,937 wells pumped water to 310,647 acres of thirsty crops during 1969. In addition

to the wells, 349 tailwater pit and playa lake pumps were used. These two low-lift water sources offer economical irrigation and contribute significantly to crop production and water conservation. More playa lake water should be used for irrigation.

Of the major crops in Parmer County, 145,094 acres of grain sorghum, 48,000 acres of grazing forage were irrigated during 1969. These acreages alone show the importance of Parmer County irrigation.

Additional income from irrigating these and other crops contribute heavily to the county economy. Irrigation water contributes heavily to the wealth of many people in the county, whether received directly by farmers or indirectly through

Cook's Corner



MRS. LONNIE JOE FOWLER

A resident of the Bovina area for nearly six years, Mrs. Lonnie Joe Fowler is thoroughly related to the life of community and agricultural activities. The wife of a farmer, Mrs. Fowler is as interested in the family's hog-raising ventures as she is in her other duties. She and Fowler, an Abernathy product, were married in Floydada, her home town. They moved to Silvertown about three years later, where they lived 13 years. Six years ago the Fowlers bought land four miles west of Bovina and moved here in January.

Mrs. Fowler is active in work at the United Methodist Church, where she is a member of Women's Society of Christian Service and teacher of the Young Adult Sunday School class. The couple have two children, Nancy, a sophomore at South Plains Junior College, and Robert, a senior in Bovina High School.

Robert actually got the family started in the hog business through his FFA projects. The Fowlers now have 17 brood sows, four of which belong to Robert, and about 50 pigs three months old or less. Mrs. Fowler is currently bottle feeding a little pig, one of a litter of 13. Of the hog business, Mrs. Fowler says, "I've never worked so hard in my life."

She says Fowler married her because she could make biscuits

and therefore, submitted her recipe along with others. Biscuits

2 c. flour
4 t. baking powder
1/4 t. soda
1/2 t. salt
1/4 c. shortening.
Work with pastry blender until crumbly. Add 3/4 cup buttermilk, (may need a little more). Knead a few times on floured board. Pat or roll out. Cut, place on well oiled baking sheet. Bake 450 degrees about 12 minutes.

3. Add 1 large can mushroom pieces; 1 pimento (chopped); 1 onion and 1 green pepper which have been cooked until soft in a little oil; 1/2 cup ripe olives (slices); 1 can mushroom soup; and the boned chicken.
Combine and put in large

baking dish. Sprinkle 8 ounces grated sharp cheese and a 4 ounce package slivered almonds (which have been lightly browned in small amount of oil) over mixture. Heat in oven until heated through and cheese melts, about 25 minutes at 375 degrees.

(Makes six dozen)
Cream together:
2 sticks oleo
1 1/2 c sugar
2 eggs

2 t cream tartar
1 t soda
2 3/4 c flour
1/8 t salt
Roll in balls the size of walnuts. Roll balls in mixture of 1/3 c sugar and 2 T cinnamon. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes.

Poppy Seed Salad Dressing
Mix in blender jar or mixing bowl:
1/2 c sugar
2 T salt
2/3 c vinegar
3 t onion juice
Beat continually while slowly adding 2 cups salad oil. Mix in 3 T poppy seed. Store in refrigerator. Especially good with shredded cabbage. Omit onion juice and use with fruit salad.

Rich Brown Stew
Brown 2 pounds stew meat in hot fat in Dutch oven. Pour on juice of one lemon, then 2 cups strong, black coffee and simmer for two hours, covered.
Add:
1 large onion, chopped
4 medium potatoes, cut
4 carrots, cut
1 T Worcestershire sauce
2 t chili powder
Salt and pepper to taste.
Continue to simmer until tender, about one hour.

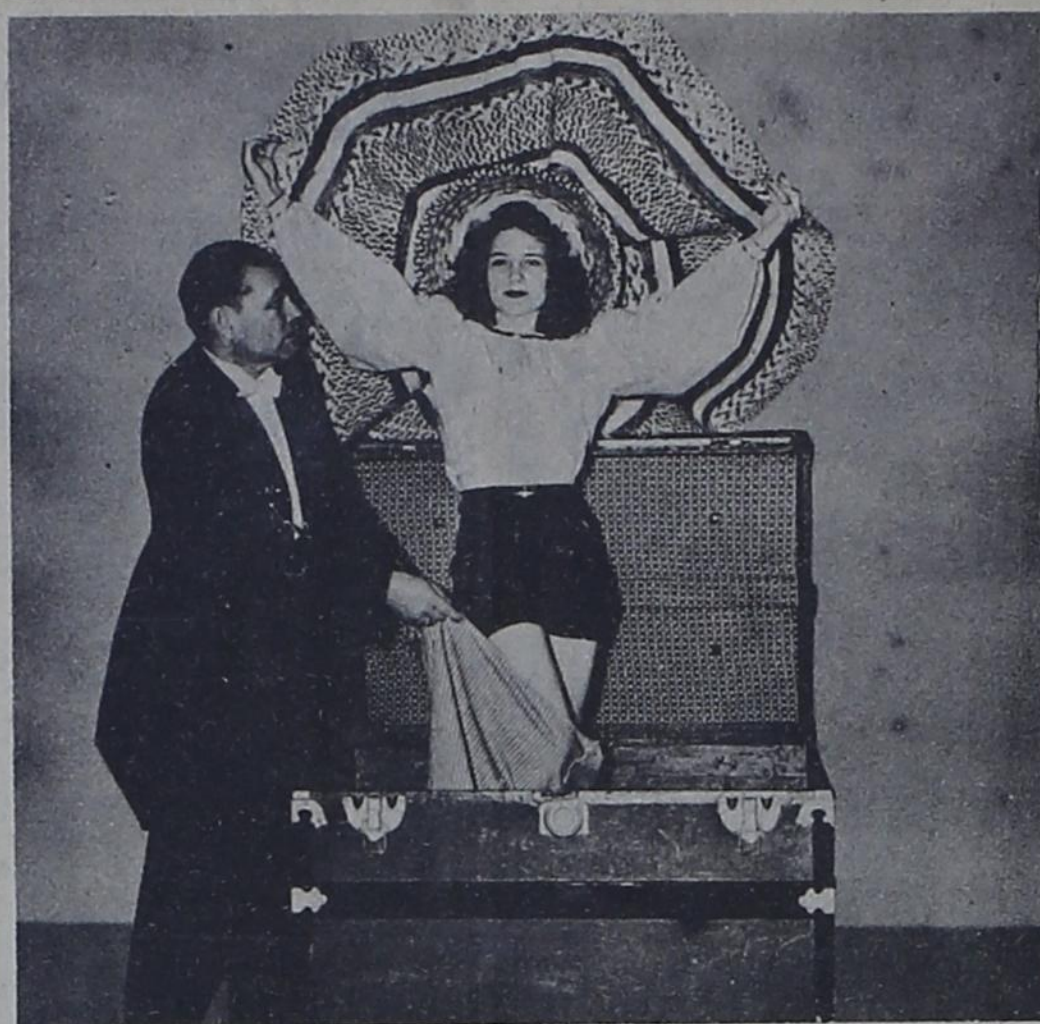

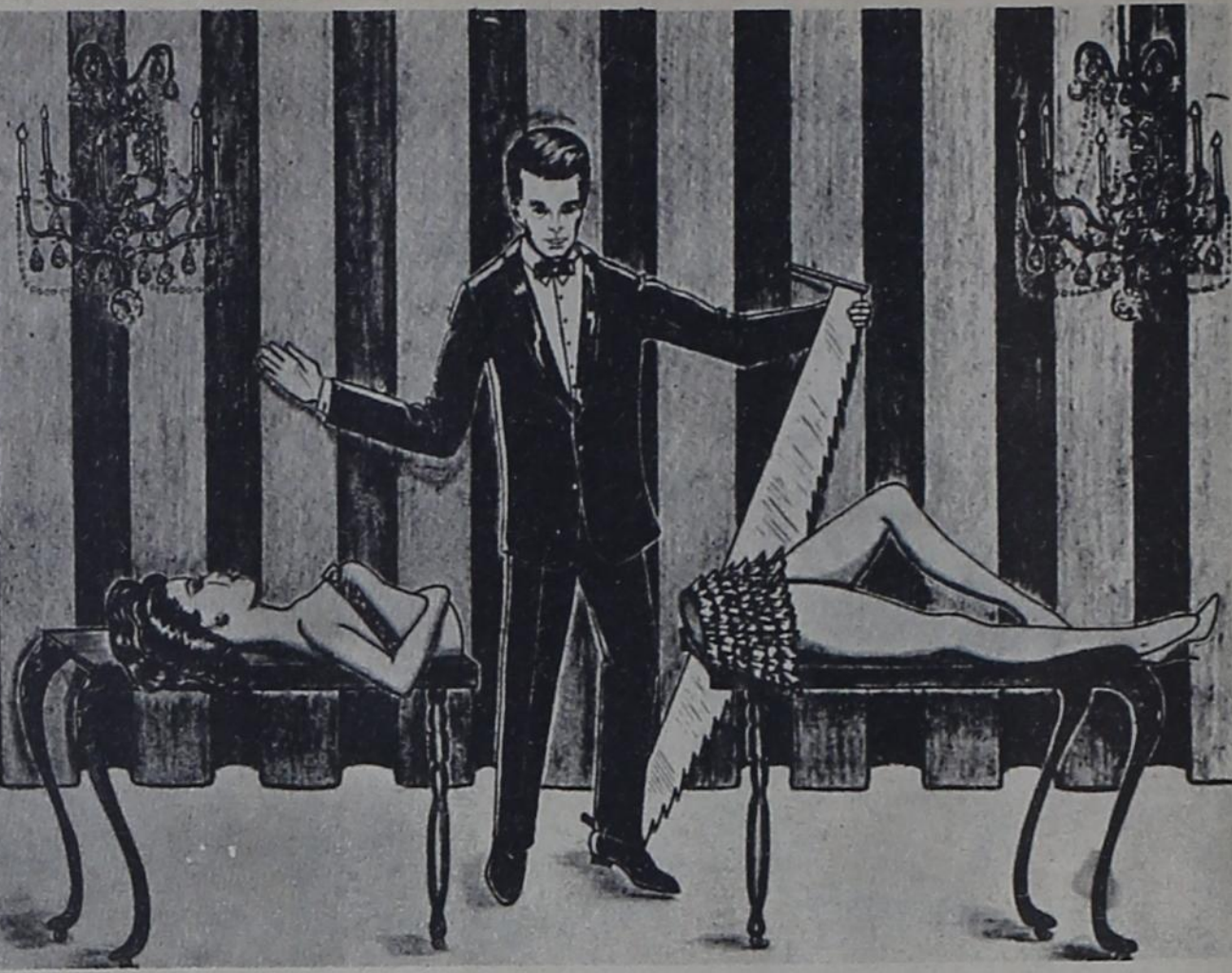

Season Record 4-6 --

Vega Scores Late, Mustangs Lose Final '69 Football Game

The Bovina Mustangs closed the 1969 season on a sour note Friday night at Vega. The Longhorns, scoring with only 1:28 remaining in the game, came out on top of a 20-19 count.

The loss left the Mustangs 0-5 in district competition and 4-6 for the season.

Vega's winning drive, which was time-consuming as well as killing to the Mustangs victory chance, covered 75 yards. The drive started on the Vega 25-yard line after the Mustangs lost the ball on downs at that point.

During the march, the Mustangs suffered what was probably their most damaging penalty of the year. Vega bogged down on its own 45 and the Ponies had the host team stopped on fourth down when a personal foul penalty set the Mustangs back 15 yards and, even more important, gave the Longhorns a first down on the Bovina 41. They went in for the winning score from that point in six plays. Halfback Preston Davis got the tally from three yards out.

The key play in the drive was a 26-yard pass play---from the 29 to the three---from Quarterback Bronco May to Halfback Jackie Richardson. That gave the 'Horns, who were celebrating homecoming, a first and goal on the Bovina three. Davis

banged over on the next play to give his team a 20-19 lead with less than 90 seconds remaining in the 3-A tilt.

The Mustangs roared back after the following kickoff and still had a chance to grab off the victory, but a fumble killed the effort at the Vega 19.

Jimmy Harris fell on the Vega kickoff at the Bovina 39. Wingback Mike Beauchamp was stopped for no gain and Roy Ramirez, the Mustangs' sophomore quarterback, threw incomplete twice to bring up fourth down and 10 from the original point and it appeared the Mustangs were done-for. On the fourth down effort, Ramirez' pass was again incomplete, but interference was ruled against the Longhorns, giving Bovina a first down at the Vega 35. With time running out, the Mustangs hurriedly tried to move the ball in for the teedee that would win the game or at least for a good shot at a field goal, which would give the same winning result. Ramirez carried for four to the 31. Beauchamp blasted for 11 in two carries to the 20, but on a second-and-seven situation from that point, the ball was fumbled, recovered by Vega, and Bovina's hopes of a District 3-A win during the '69 football season vanished like a puff of cigar smoke in the high, cold wind which was blowing throughout the game.

Vega used up the less-than-30-seconds remaining on the clock and that was that --- the Mustangs were one-point losers in a game they felt they should have won and could have with just a little more luck.

Bovina's effort was further handicapped by an ankle injury to Stuart McMeans, hard-running tailback who has been the workhorse of the infantry forces all season. He sat out the third quarter with the painful, but-not-believed-to-be-serious turned ankle, and saw limited action in the final stanza.

Most of the game's scoring came in the first half. The

Mustangs, counting with surprising ease, put 19 points on the scoreboard in the first 24 minutes while Vega managed for only 14 and that's the way it stood at the halftime break. The third quarter was scoreless.

Bovina received the opening kickoff and moved methodically downfield to the eight-yard line. A fumble there gave the ball to the Black and Gold boys and that might have been an omen as to what was to come for the Mustangs. However, they got possession of the ball back via the fumble route on Vega's first offensive play. May broke loose on a 32-yard run and then fumbled as he was tackled on his 40-yard line. Stuart McMeans recovered for the Mustangs there and they went on about their touchdown-scoring business which had been interrupted just seconds earlier by the fumble. In two carries, McMeans got 12 yards and a first down on the Vega 28. Beauchamp then, showing fine running form, zigzagged his way into the endzone for a 6-0 Bovina lead. McMeans was halted on the running attempt for the dual extra points.

The score came with 6:30 remaining in the first quarter. Vega came back quickly to tie it up. On the fourth play after the kickoff, Richardson broke for 52 yards to knot the count. The attempted extra point kick was no good and the score was 6-6 with 4:20 still to be played in the first stanza.

Featuring a solid, rolling ground attack, the Mustangs came right back for their second six-pointer following the kickoff. With McMeans, Beauchamp and Fullback Royce Sisk having equal success at moving the pigskin, the Ponies scored in 13 plays. Ramirez went the final yard on a keeper. Harris' kick on the extra point try was true and the Mustangs had a seven-point edge, 13-6.

The Longhorns didn't want to disappoint the sparse home-

coming crowd, however, and scored their second touchdown without losing possession. Richardson, one of the classiest runners the Bovina team faced

all year, returned the kick from his own 10 to the 49. The score came in seven plays with Davis going the final 14 yards.

May ran over the extras and the Horns were out front, 13-14.

Bovina's third touchdown came with three minutes re-

maining in the first half on a two-yard burst by Sisk. The Mustangs got a break for that one. The Longhorns, deep in

their own territory, fumbled and Bovina's Tony Foster latched onto the ball at the Vega two. The first play from that point

failed to gain, but Sisk sailed into the endzone on second down. Ramirez failed to make the extra points on a running attempt to leave the score at 19-14.

Vega knocked on touchdown's door again as time ran out in the half. Richardson took a pass from May and the pass and

run covered 51 yards before Bruce Caldwell, Mustang safetyman, knocked him out of bounds at the one and the dramatic, almost-successful scoring effort was killed.

In the third period, the host team moved down to the Bovina four-yard line before losing the ball on downs. That was the strongest scoring threat either team made during that period. Beauchamp was the leading

Bovina ballcarrier with 90 yards in 17 tries. McMeans made 80 yards in 14 scampers. Sisk carried 11 times for 36 yards and Ramirez kept the ball on 10 running plays and picked up 51 yards.
