There was no way to tell if Ed was aware that our tiesales resistance was low, but he selected a couple from the display which he assured us were "just right" for us. We noticed they were sur-nuf wide enough to be called stylish even by today's fashions and Ed was getting

real close to making a sale. When he reluctantly volunteered to "charge 'em," he had a deal made and we were the proud owner of two new wide ties.

Now we wish we could say that happiness and satisfaction reigned forever and that was the end of the story. But it isn't.

We admired the ties in the closet for a couple of days and then, come Sunday morning, we decided to put the prettier of the two in use. Tying it like we know how to tie a tie ---- and we always thought that was about as good a way as any ---- didn't leave much of the fabric left over to protrude from the knot. He was loquacious, we thought, about our lack of knowledge of tying nice new modern ties and he inffered explanations that we never did understand about how such ties should be tied. We kept interrupting him and asking how about bringing them back for a cash refund. He discouraged that, since they were charged in the first place, but finally agreed, "for only a few more dollars to tie the ties right" for us.

His offer was appreciated and we may take him up on it if we don't do any better the next time or two we try than we did on that original attempt.
