Darrel Read, the city man, says there wasn't a good percentage of Bovina dogs vaccinated for rabies during the Friday afternoon session.

"Only about 70 dogs were vaccinated and we have at least 3,000 in this town," says Read.

Bovina has plenty of good sports fans, probably more than its share.

But even in such company, we think we probably hold a record of consistency in attending Bovina Mustangs football games.

If memory serves correctly, we haven't missed seeing the Mustangs play since the season of '58. In other words, we've seen, and written, about all the games from the 1959 season until the present.

Such a record and 15 cents will buy a cup of coffee, we know, and we mentioned it primarily to see if anyone can better it. Maybe that's what all records are for.

The record would be worth more, too, if we could remember more details about the games, records and individual players during those years.

Those seasons span the coaching tenures here of Hallie Gee, Roy Stone and the present football mentor, GIB Hough, who is now in his second season.

During those years, the Mustangs have had good times and bad. They won at least three Class B championships prior to being promoted to Class A competition because of increased enrollment in high school.

The only disappointment the Class B championship brought about was the inability to win a bi-district game. We lost to Groom once in bi-district play in Buffalo Bowl and the Sun-down Roughnecks won over the Maroons two consecutive years in post-district play. One of those games was played at Farwell and the other at Sundown.

All three of the bi-district tilts were good games, but we came out on the short end of the score.

The transition from Class B football to Class A competition was painful for the Ponies, who dropped from the top of Class B into the cellar of the A league.

Time, and increased enrollment, are helping to take care of that problem, however, and while the Mustangs still don't have a Class A championship in their trophy case, they have reached the point where they can be expected to contend for the first place flag on any given year.

Prospects for this year's team look good now, in spite of last week's disappointing loss to Friona. A win this week over the Lazbuddie Longhorns, if it comes about, will send the Mustangs into 3A competition with a 2-1 non-district mark, which is not as good as it could be, but is still "pretty good."

Anyway, if the fellow who can beat our record of consistency in attending Mustangs football games will step forward, we'll take our hat off to him.

We'd be better off going to still more football games than predicting their outcomes.

Last week, we hit six out of 10 . . . again. That makes the average easy to figure as that 's what it was the opening week --- .600.

The only excuse we can offer for not doing better is that we just play for fun, not for the money.

Besides, we set a supposedly easy goal for ourselves in the beginning. That was to get more right than we did wrong. Up to now, we've been successful in doing that.

We're trying to do better this week.

Kress at PETERSBURG --- We've been wrong twice already on the Kangaroos. Maybe the third time is the charm.

Hart at AMHERST --- The winless Longhorns aren't apt to bring their losing streak in the kennels of these Bulldogs.

Farwell at MORTON --- This is probably wrong, but the Indians are Class AA, aren't they?

Claude at VEGA --- We'll give Vega's pre-season publicity the benefit of the doubt here. But we have a notion that the Longhorns won't be as strong as their publicity said.

Sudan at SEAGRAVES --- The Eagles were upset last week. They won't be in the mood for it to happen again.

New Mexico State at SOUTHERN METHODIST --- The Methodists have to beat somebody, surely.

TEXAS at Texas Tech --- We hope, believe it or not, we're wrong, but predicting a Tech win just doesn't seem like the thing to do. The Red Raiders will probably be bigger underdogs than the Aggies were last week against Louisiana State.

People wishing to enter the contest may write their predictions of the first killing freeze date on a post card, with their name, and mail it to The Blade.

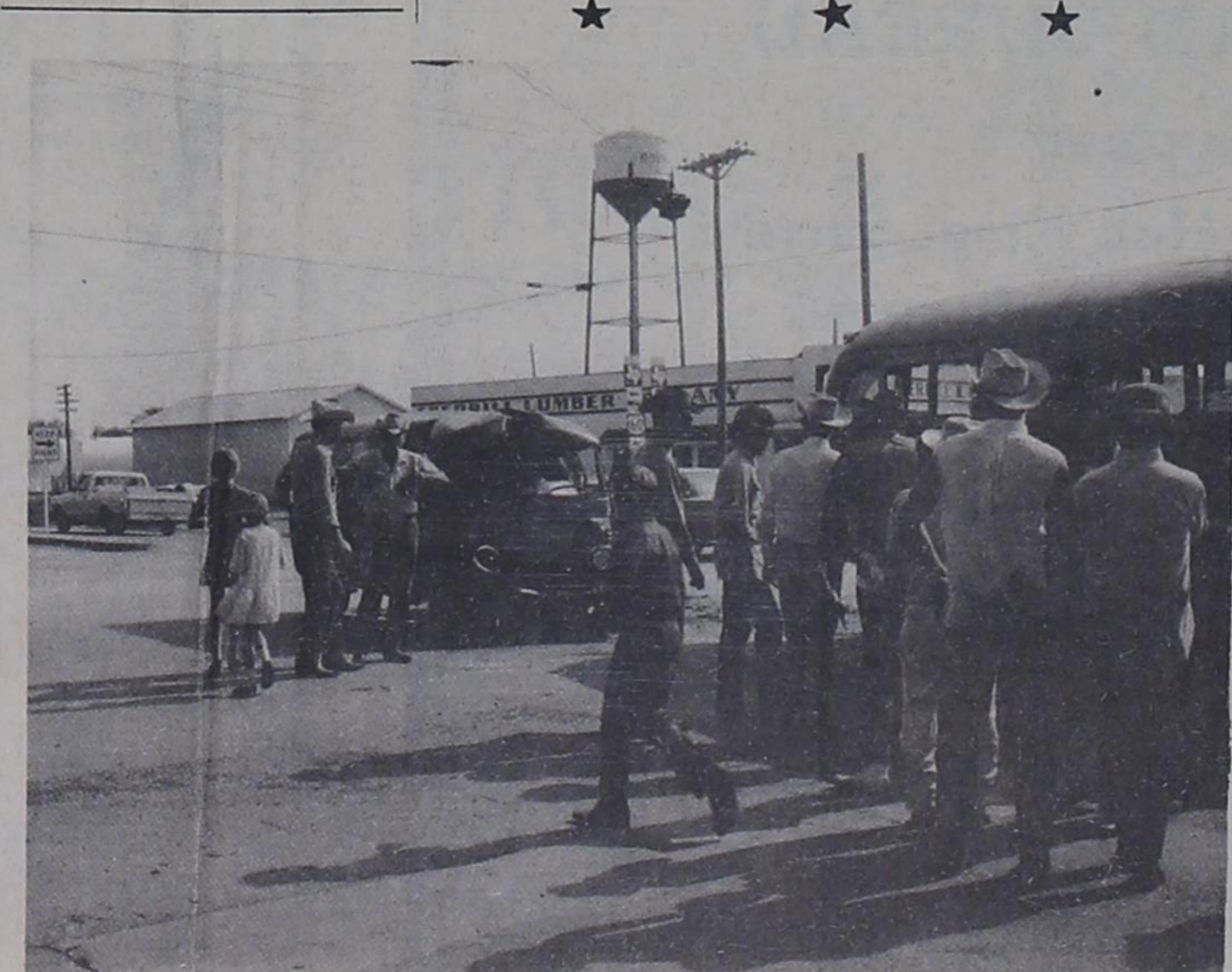
In case of a tie, the entry received first will be declared the winner.

Past Due Taxes Meeting Subject

Taxpayers of Bovina Independent School District owe some \$20,000 in delinquent taxes. That was a subject discussed at a meeting of board of trustees at a called meeting Monday night.

Howard Perdue of Amarillo authority to continue efforts to collect the delinquent taxes and to take further action against taxpayers who have not paid past due taxes or made arrangements with school district officials to do so.

An increased effort to collect the past due taxes was originated last Spring. Since that time, some \$11,000 have been collected, according to L. F. Jacobs, school superintendent.

In other business at the special session, the school board approved Miss Joste Alonzo as truant officer for the current school year.

State law requires that parents see that their children,

age six through 17, attend school, Jacobs points out.

Board members also heard a report from the superintendent on school enrollment, which now totals 708. This lacks seven of equaling the all-time high enrollment figure of 715 which was recorded in the Fall of '66.

Jacobs reports that he expects the enrollment figure to "level off" around the 700 mark.

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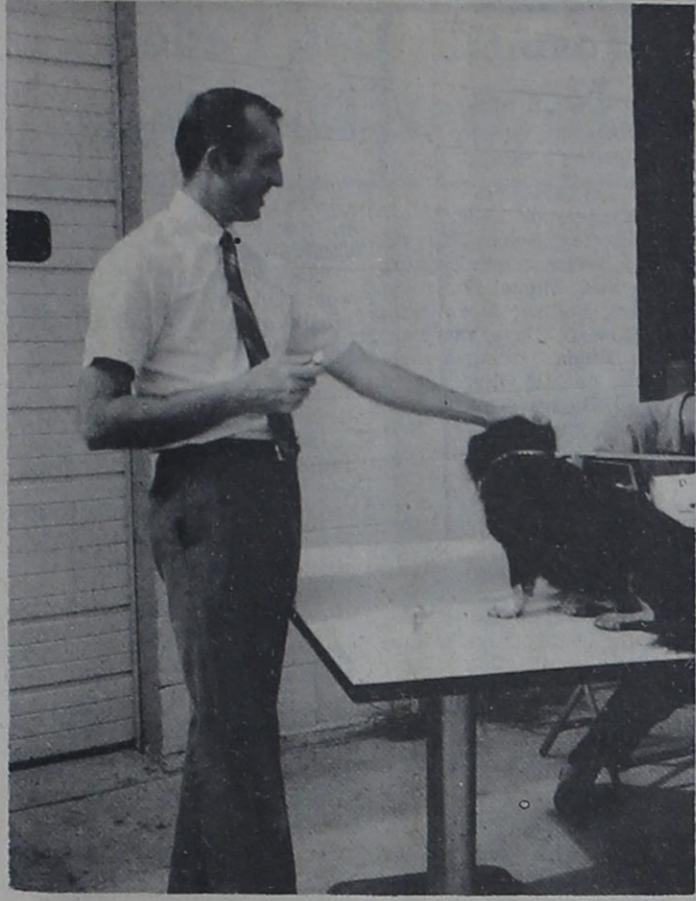

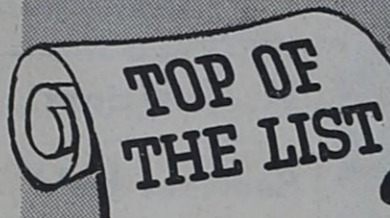

SKILLET OR CARMEL PIE
2 c. sugar
5 T. flour
1/4 t. salt
5 eggs, separated
2 c. milk
3 T. butter
1 t. vanilla
Put 1 c. sugar in skillet and place over low heat to melt. Mix the other cup of sugar, 5 T. flour and 1/4 t. salt in a bowl. Combine 5 egg yolks and 2 c. milk. Put egg mixture together with flour mixture and beat lightly. Pour this into the skillet with melted sugar. Stir constantly, cook over medium heat until mixture is smooth and thick. Lower heat add 3 T. butter and 1 t. vanilla. Pour into a baked pie shell and cover with meringue. Brown pie in a 350 degree oven for 5-10 minutes. Makes one large or two small pies.

BAR-B-Q SAUCE
1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste
1 c. water
1/4 c. vinegar
1/3 c. Worcestershire sauce
1/4 t. hot sauce
1 T. Liquid Smoke
1 T. prepared mustard
2 garlic cloves, (diced)
1/2 orange, with juice squeezed out
2 t. oil
salt and pepper to taste
Mix well and heat, pour over 4 lbs. of chicken. Cook in oven at 275 degrees until chicken is brown and sauce is thick (about 1 hour). If sauce is left over keep in refrigerator.

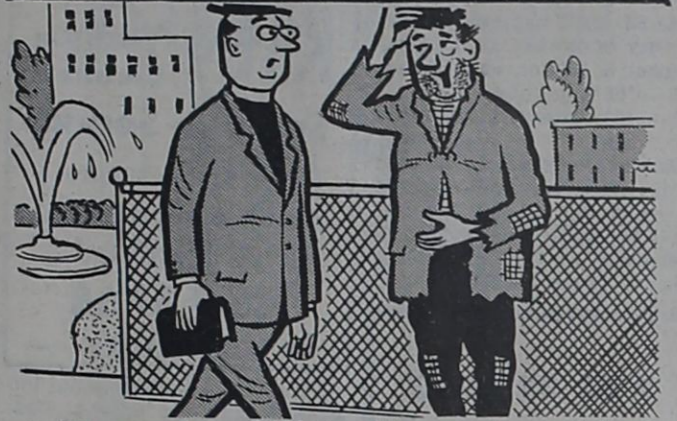

What's Not Wrong With Our Youth

1. They are enthusiastic and young. In every age, the burning zeal of youth has moved mountains and paved the ways for a better civilization, moral and spiritual.

2. They love living. It is a glorious adventure of which they are determined to make the most. They still are able to see that silver lining to the dark clouds we older folk talk of but seldom find. Mostly, they are optimistic, and are easily captured by a vision of need and service. This love for life and quick devotion to a worthy cause are priceless assets. We older folk need to copy here too.

3. They are frank and open. Sometimes their brazen frankness is to be admired. Maybe they are out in the open what we (parents) are in secret! When they rebel against things that have gone unquestioned by the older for years, they do it with candor. Generally, I like the openness characteristic of them.

4. They are good, fundamentally. They are more free from prejudice than we older folk are. They believe in fair play, and in democratic rules, in God, and more often than not, they believe, firmly, in themselves.

5. They didn't make the world in which we live. We older folk made it and forced it upon them, just like our forefathers did to us, and they are doing their best, in most cases, to make it the best they can with their inheritance. Our youth are the duplicates of their parents, and if they are not perfect (and they are not) why are we going to be surprised? When we older folk set the right pattern and attitudes then our youth will, Solomon said, "Train up a child in the way that he should go, when he is old he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6). "Fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." (Eph. 6:4).

Mustangs Miscues Make Chieftains 27-7 Winner

Take away three "breaks" and the Bovina Mustangs played the Friona Chieftains on even terms there Friday night in the second game of the season for both teams. Since the "breaks" can't be eliminated from the tilt, however, the score was 27-7 in favor of the Class AA Frionians.

The Chiefs got three charity touchdowns courtesy of Mustang miscues. One was a pass interference call which gave the Chiefs a first down on the Bovina one yard line in the first period and the other two were bad snaps from center as the Mustangs were attempting to punt from deep in their own territory in the third quarter.

The host team had a 7-0 lead at halftime. That TD came in the last minute of the first quarter as a result of the aforementioned pass interference call.

The Mustangs' marker came late in the fourth quarter after the Chiefs were enjoying a 27-0 lead. The Bovina offense showed flashes of brilliance in the scoring drive covered 62 yards.

After Friona scored its final touchdown for the 27 point margin, Roy Ramirez fielded the following kickoff on the 30, returning to the 38. After an incomplete pass from Quarterback Mike Hough to Jimmy Harris, Hough threw a short pass to Halfback Mike Beauchamp, who made a great 33-yard run to the Friona 29. Beauchamp then lost a yard on first down, but Ramirez

passed to Harris for a 10-yard gain to the 20. Fullback Leroy Pearson blasted for three yards and a first down at the 17. Pearson then picked up three more and then six to the eight yard line.

Bovina's hopes for a TD for the evening's work faded on the next play, however, as Hough was dropped for a 17-yard loss while back to pass. That brought up fourth down and the ball was on the 25.

Hough then faked a handoff to Harris, who did a good job of getting the attention of the defense, and then threw a strike in the endzone to Ramirez for the tally. Harris' extra point kick was good to trim the mar-

gin of the score to 20 points. Friona's first score, after the interference call, was made by Donnie Lewellen. The extra point was kicked by Bobby Drake.

The Chiefs' second six-pointer came with 6:40 remaining in the third quarter. The Ponies received the kickoff to begin the third period, but failed to pick up a first down and went into punt formation on fourth down. Ramirez, back to punt, received a groundskinner snap from center and wasn't able to get the ball away. The Chiefs took over on the Bovina 22 and scored in nine plays. Quarterback Don Fortenberry went the final two yards on a keeper. Drake's place kick boosted the score to 14-0 and it still looked as if the Mustangs were in the ballclub if they could get their offense in operation.

After the following kickoff, though, it was the same story, except sadder. Again Bovina couldn't move the ball and again Ramirez went into punt formation. This time, the snap sailed over his head and he fell on the pigskin at the one yard line. It took the Chiefs three plays to score from there, but on third down Wesley Clark blasted over for the counter. Drake's kick failed this time, leaving the score 20-0.

A stubborn Mustang defense saved another touchdown early in the final quarter. A 51-yard pass play gave the Chiefs a first down on the seven yard line. Four plays later, the Mustangs took over on their own nine. They lost possession three plays later, however, on a fumbled pitchout at their own 30. The Chiefs scored in eight plays with Mike Royal getting the final two yards and the TD. Drake again kicked the bonus point.

An oddity of the game was that the officials who were scheduled to call it failed to arrive. The game was officiated by volunteers.

The starting time was delayed some 30 minutes while arrangements were made for substitute officials.

The loss made the Mustangs' season record 1-1 after their opening win over Boys Ranch, 32-7.
