Harvesting of the crop which has made Parmer County famous is already underway on a limited basis and is expected to get into full swing in a week

or so, weather permitting. If the crop turns out like some observers feel it will, yields of 9,000 pounds peracre won't be unusual this year. The area over, the crop seems to offer great potential and possibly it will be the best ever from a yield standpoint.

While grain sorghum often takes a back seat of late in publicity and conversation to other crops, it is certainly still the primary and leading crop of this area.

The fact that it traditionally does so well here may be, oddly enough, the reason that it is often ignored conversationally in favor of more speculsugar beets and vegetables.

Parmer County, the state's | tion of wheat, have disadvantleader in grain sorghum ages and drawbacks that cause them to lack consistency in producing top yields. And wheat has suffered in recent years because of a depressed market.

The milo price this year promises to be in the \$2 per hundred category or better. Opening markets have been around \$1.05. The price is difficult to pinpoint, however, until harvest gets underway.

The expanding area cattle feeding industry has created more demand for the crop in recent years and has brought about a higher and more stable grain sorghum market.

About the only blemish on this year's milo crop has been an infestation of damaging insects, including spider mites and greenbugs. These insects have been controlled to a great extent by insecticides and the damage is expected to be slight from an overall standpoint.







The contest is conducted because of the widespread interest among residents of the area in the first freeze date. This interest is brought about by the effect the first freeze has on overall agricultural crop conditions.
