State School Laws

Among the state laws passed by the 62nd session of the Texas Legislature referring to Texas public schools are:

Senate bill 97, House bill 232

Loitering on school property
Signed April 26, 1971, for immediate effect—Prohibits loitering on school property—Makes it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$200—Defines 'school property' as grounds of any public school and any grounds or buildings used for school-sponsored assemblies or activities

Senate bill 226, House bill 186

School disruption
Signed May 18, 1971, for immediate effect—Prohibits disruption of the educational process on school property or on public property within 500 feet of school property—Defines 'school property' and 'public property'—Makes violation of the law a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$200—Defines "conduct which disrupts the educational activities of a school" as including:

1. Emission by any means of noise of an intensity which prevents or hinders classroom instruction; 2. Enticement or attempted enticement of students away from classes or other school activities which students are required to attend; 3. Prevention or attempted prevention of students from attending classes or other school activities which students are required to attend.

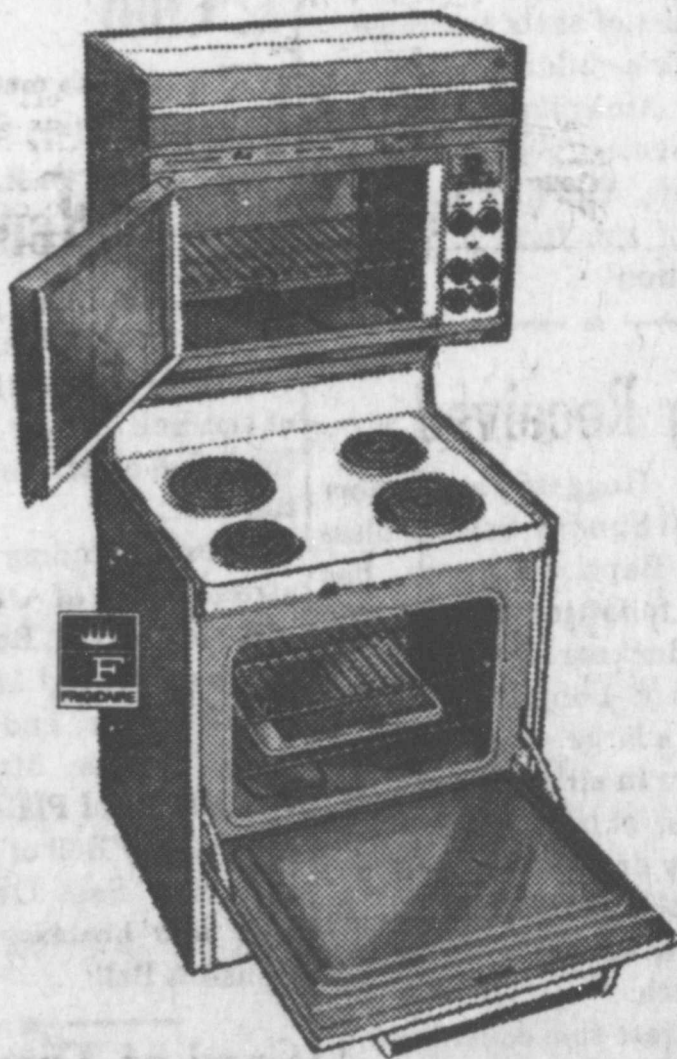
