Bro. Crawford Honored Hill-Floyd

Rev. L. J. Crawford was honored on Sunday, Oct. 24, with a family reunion in honor of his 90th birthday. All his seven children and their families were present, and one son, Rev. Noble Crawford, preached at the morning service at the First Baptist Church here. All enjoyed a noon meal in the Fellowship Hall.

Rev. Crawford was born Oct. 23, 1881, at Saint Jo, Montague County. He started preaching in 1898, and moved to this area in 1906. He has held pastorates at Quail, Hedley, Shamrock, Liberty and Plaska, and has preached at every Missionary Baptist Church in Donley, Hall, Childress and Collingsworth Counties.

He was married to Miss Lula Lanier in Bonita Nov. 14, 1900. To this union seven children were born. Mrs. Crawford passed away June 22, 1957, while the family lived in Shamrock, and in July, 1958, Rev. Crawford married his brother's widow, Mrs. Lena Crawford.

In addition to his seven children, Bro. Crawford has 9 step-children, 15 grandchildren, 28 great-grandchildren and 6 great-great-grandchildren.

His children are Mrs. V. F. Wade of Hedley, Mrs. Lillie Moore of Amarillo, Noble Crawford of Sao Paulo, Brazil, Mrs. Houston Hardy of Follett, W. J. Crawford of Temple, Mrs. Juanita Henig of Tulia and Warren Crawford of Vernon.

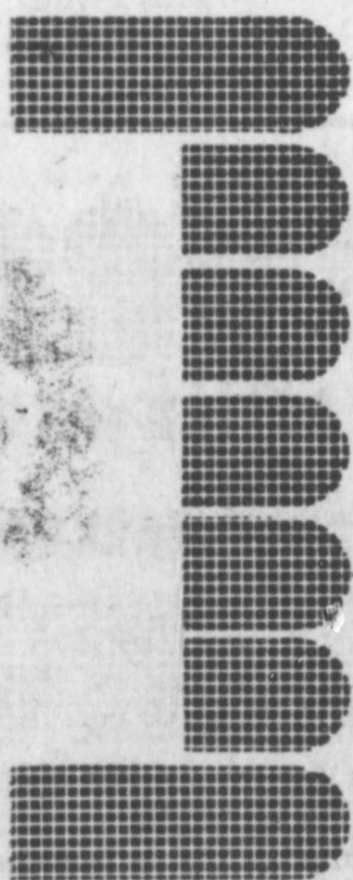

WHY GROWERS NEED BETTER COTTON YIELDS IN 1971...

Bolster net income, increase payment yield, and preserve markets

- * Demand for cotton is strong—domestic and foreign.
- * Failure to meet demand could jeopardize markets and the farmer's investment in land, equipment, and other production resources.
- * Higher yields spread overhead cost and reduce cost per pound.
- * Cutting harvesting losses can mean up to 10 per cent more cotton, or \$15 more per acre.
- * Better yields in 1971 can increase cotton farmers' yield for payment purposes in 1972 and 1973.
- * If sufficient cotton can be made available to meet demand, the way would be open to greater markets in the future.
- * Mill use of cotton depends heavily on its availability and price stability.
- * Strong demand for cotton corduroys, print cloths, denims, and knits has led some mills to shift to all-cotton. Prospects of a low carryover and uncertainty about supply and price could quickly drive these customers back to blends.
- * When the supply of cotton falls short, prices become non-competitive and mills turn to other fibers.
