Yes, this is a great time for football fans to dream. Incidentally, what's this business we hear about no tickets being available for the Aggie-Tech game in Lubbock?

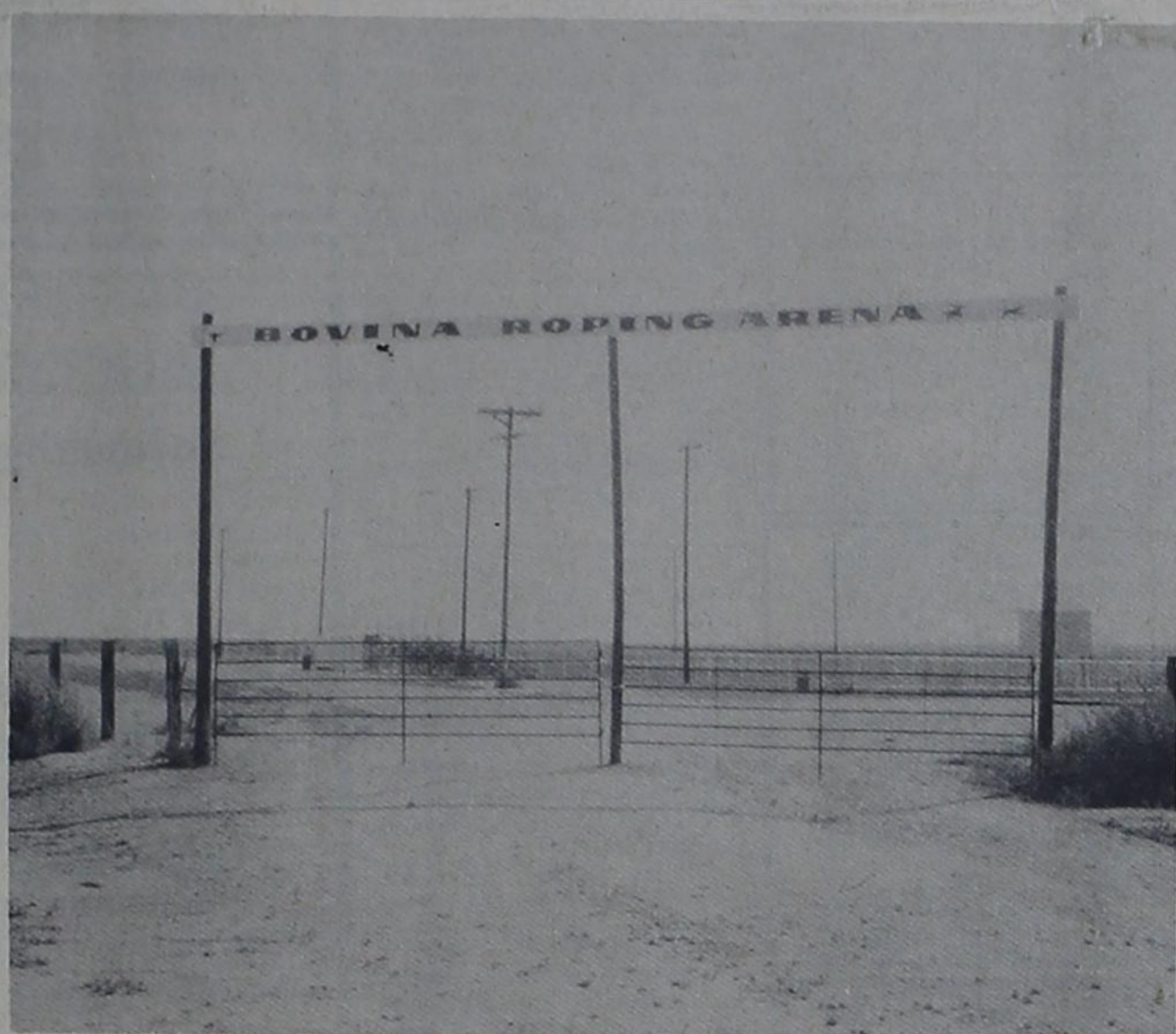
Mention of football brings in to focus the fact that next week will be time for the annual Bovina business football contest to begin.

Indebtedness \$8000 --

New Roping Arena Cost Near \$12,000

Bovina Roping Club's new arena is expected to have a total cost, including the land, of approximately \$12,000.

The arena, put into use for the first time during the Bull Town Days celebration last month, is almost complete at the present time and total expenditures have been \$11,724.17. That announcement was made at a regular monthly meeting of the club Thursday night at Bovina Restaurant by Rouel Barron, secretary-treasurer.

The club's indebtedness on the arena is \$8000. This amount is owed to First State Bank of Bovina, according to Edwin Lide, club president, who presided at the meeting.

The Thursday night session consisted primarily of discussion of the club's financial condition.

Barron indicated the club came out of the Bull Town Days celebration, of which it is co-sponsor with Bovina Chamber

of Commerce and Agriculture, in reasonably good financial condition. Through the sale of and other income, the club netted in the neighborhood of \$800.

Now 662 --

Enrollment Figures Continue To Climb

Enrollment in Bovina Schools has increased by 30 students since classes began Monday of last week.

Total enrollment as of Monday was 662, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs. Enrollment on opening day was 632.

High school enrollment increased by two over last week with 168 now on the rolls. Enrollment in junior high increased to 164, up nine since opening day. Elementary grades show the largest increase with 330 now enrolled, up 21 over opening day.

"We seem to be holding the same course as last year," Jacobs commented, "and run-

ning a few over last year's total which was 656 at this time." Jacobs pointed out that it will be several weeks before the final count is known. Last year's peak enrollment count showed 708 students.

"We believe our personnel can handle the situation right now," Jacobs said. He added there could be some changes later in the month.

LEGAL NOTICES

--LEGAL NOTICE--
 All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations indicate.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

The County Clerk of each county shall have this act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of 90 days. The act shall be published on the effective date, August 30, 1971, and thereafter for 30 days.

It is the obligation of the County Clerk to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location on the animal in each county. Therefore, no two people in a county may record the same brand in the same location. It is also the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than \$50 (Article 1486 P.C.).

The law applies to all counties in the state of Texas and shall take precedence over any special statutes heretofore applying to individual counties pertaining to recording and re-recording of brands.

Bovina softballers dropped a doubleheader to Cannon Air Force Base Flyers Wednesday night of last week, 6-2, and 6-5.

Second game was tied 5-5 at end of scheduled five innings with the winners shoving across the winning run on a pair of Bovina errors in seventh inning.

SIX YEARS AGO
September 1, 1965

Bovina Schools, which opened for the '65-'66 school year Monday morning, registered another record enrollment. A total of 632 students had been enrolled in the 12 grades through Tuesday morning.

For the third consecutive year, Jim Heard has produced Bovina's first load of new crop milk.

This week marks the beginning of Bovina Businesses 1965 Cotton Bowl Football contest. The first contest of the 13-week series appears in this issue of The Blade.

Teachers of Bovina Schools had their annual breakfast last Friday morning. Thirty-five teachers and Mrs. Pearl Dodson, school tax assessor-collector, attended the affair in home-making cottage.

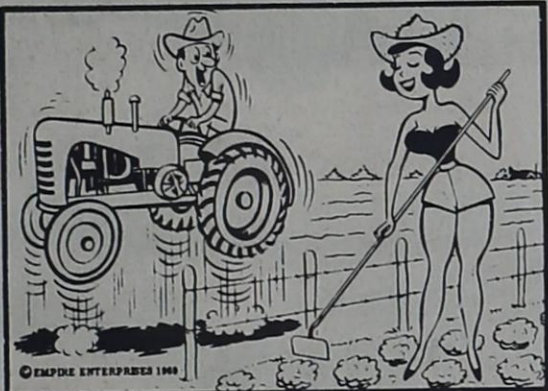

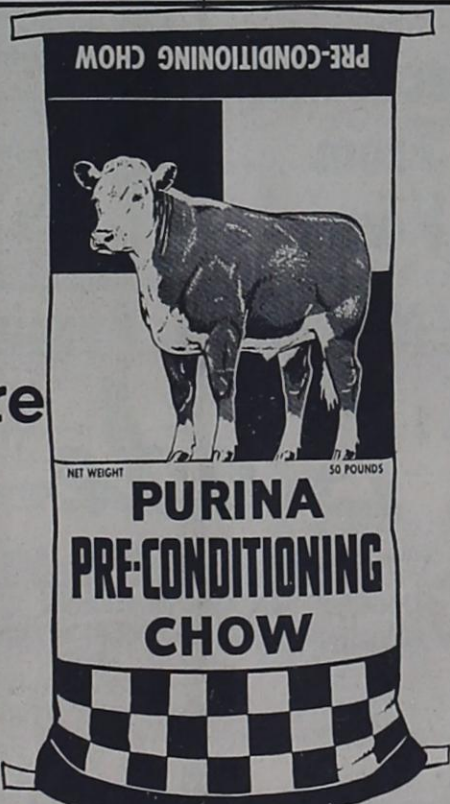

Bright colors in the nursery are stimulating and exciting. But more important, vivid colors provide a happy environment for babies. Babies love intense hues, and learn very young to distinguish colors if the colors are clear and bright.

And, the nursery can also be planned for easy care. According to suggestions from noted interior designers, use olefin fiber rugs and the new nylon wallpapers. Washable olefin rugs are warmer in cold months than hard surface coverings; in addition to being washable nylon wallpapers are available in cheerful, bright patterns.

Furniture manufacturers are now producing cribs with highly improved safety features. Cribs with deep drop sides, closely set spindles, plastic teething rails and finishes of non-poisonous materials are available. Other features for convenience include drop side locks, fast releases for drop-sides, adjustable position springs and bearings to permit noiseless raising and lowering of sides.

Mrs. Slabaugh suggests using toy chests and wicker baskets in natural or color finishes for accessories. Or, install low bookshelves for collections of nursery books and storage of other items.

A mother can choose as many units for the nursery as required --- cribs, hutches, armories and dressing tables --- in her choice of styles, ranging from Modern, Spanish, French Provincial, Country French and Colonial.

On the practical side, the specialist reminds that some children's furniture can be taken apart and rearranged as the child's needs change.

Bovina Mustangs will get their second taste of outside competition Thursday afternoon when they scrimmage Claude, a Class A squad. A and B teams will both see action.

The Mustangs met the Clovis sophomores here Friday night in the season's first scrimmage action prior to the regular season kick-off game September 10 with the Boys Ranch Rough Riders.

In the Clovis scrimmage, the Mustangs scored five touchdowns to four for the Clovis squad. However, all four of Clovis' scores came against the freshmen and sophomores on the Mustang squad.

"Overall we looked pretty good," commented Coach Gib Hough. "How much talent we have remains to be seen but teamwork and desire at this stage is excellent," he states. Two of the Mustang scores

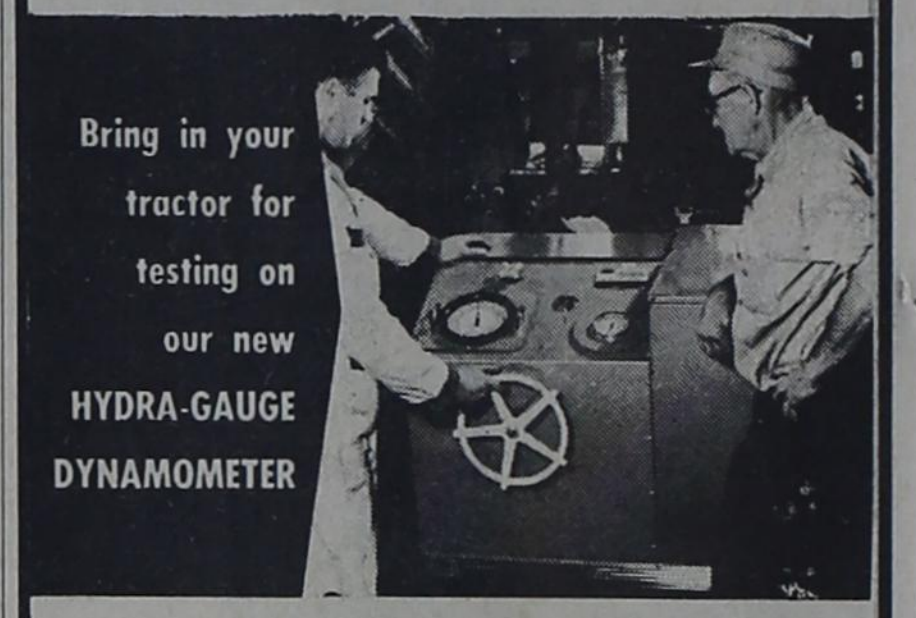

All residents of Parmer County may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential order of August 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, according to Louis Welch, Chairman of the ASC Committee.

County ASCS offices throughout the United States have been chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

Parmer County ASCS Office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in Parmer County who wants or needs precise information

should get in touch with the county office, Welch said.

The Parmer County ASCS Office is located at 114 - 9th St. in Farwell. The mailing address is Box H, Farwell, Texas 79325. The telephone number is area code 806-481-3311. In charge of the offices is Prentice L. Mills, County Executive Director. The office has a staff of seven persons.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," Welch said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

or guesses be made by ASCS county people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't know the answer to a specific question, they will say so. If a member of the public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the question will go by phone or mail to the nearest IRS district office," Welch said.

Normal function of ASCS county office is to administer farm action programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the local level. County Committee Chairman Louis Welch said ASCS service to farmers will continue without interruption.

"Our county office people welcome the opportunity to serve their country and are happy to make the extra effort in this crucial period," he said.
