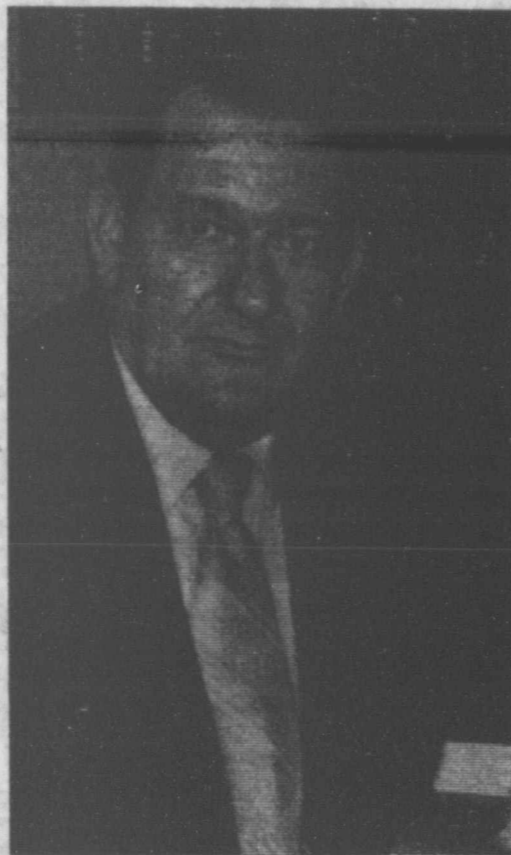
At Fort Polk

Paul Spillman Announces For District Attorney



Paul Spillman, Wellington Attorney, has announced he is seeking the Democratic nomination for the office of District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District, subject to the Democratic Primary.

Mr. Spillman is 47 and graduated from Baylor University Law School in 1950, and has been engaged in the practice of law in Wellington since graduation.

He is now serving his second term as County Attorney of Collingsworth County.

Mr. Spillman stated: "I believe in cooperating with the law enforcement officers and with the court in the handling of criminal matters and helping them with mature experienced advice as to the law which applies in each case. I believe in firm law enforcement and it should always be fair and just. I invite you to examine my record as County Attorney."

Mr. Spillman is associated in the practice of law with his son, Bill, who graduated from Baylor University in the spring of 1971, and whose wife, Norma, is an Elementary School teacher.

He is active in the Kiwanis Club, Chamber of Commerce and has served as Post Commander, 18th District Commander and State Vice-Commander of the American Legion and has held continuous membership in V. F. W. for twenty years.

Membership in the Texas Bar Association and the 100th Judicial District Bar Association is held by Mr. Spillman.

He resides at 2010 East Avenue with his wife, Erma, and two daughters, Cheryl and Lynette.

Phil Cates Of Lefors Is Candidate For Reelection As Representative

Phil Cates, a native of Lefors and incumbent State Representative from this district, has announced he is a candidate for reelection from the 66th Legislative District which was formerly the 79th Legislative District.

During the past 62nd legislative session, Cates served on several committees which included: Oil, Gas, and Mining; Conservation and Reclamation; Livestock; Youth; Selection of Texas State Artist; and Public Education. He is currently serving on four interim committees which are studying Electrolgists Licensing, Texas Water Resources, Nurses Aides Licensing, and Public Education Financing. The Public Education Financing Committee is of primary concern to every citizen in the area as it involves local versus federal control in the public school systems, Cates said.

Cates is an active member of the Board of Consultants of the Baptist General Convention of

Texas Christian Life Commission, Gray-Roberts Farmers' Union, Gray-Roberts Farm Bureau, Gray County Board for Aid to Mentally Retarded Children, Texas Alcoholics and Narcotics Education Board of Directors, and various community organizations which include the Optimist Club, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Pampa Chamber of Commerce, Toastmasters Club, and the First Baptist Church.
