Bob Price Speaks At Open House

In remarks given before the Open House Dedication of the Donley County Medical Center in Clarendon March 19, Congressman Bob Price discussed the importance of providing adequate health care for all Americans.

"Our Nation's strength is derived from its people, and Americans living today enjoy the best health and highest standard of living the world has ever known," Price said. "There is a definite role for government to play in the field of health care; government, for example, can finance the research which is necessary to find cures for diseases which claim lives and afflict our citizens. Furthermore, social agencies are able to extend a helping hand to the needy to provide them with health care services they could not otherwise afford," Price said.

The Congressman warned that Americans must not let emotion take the place of reason in providing for health care services. "There are some who would have us believe that our health care system is a failure, and that the answer lies in the establishment of a government controlled health care system," the Congressman said.

"However, I believe the solution offered by these people is no solution since they would place upon the backs of our citizens another great government program, complete with a new bureaucratic army, government regimentation, 'guidelines,' and the high taxes which must unavoidably follow."

"Instead," Price concluded, "government ought to do those things which citizens cannot do for themselves, such as to finance medical research, promote preventive health care services, stabilize the cost of health care services, and finance the cost of health care for those who are not able to meet their needs through their own resources."

The city will have a mayor and three aldermen to elect. On the ballot for mayor will be D. E. Boliver, incumbent, and for aldermen will be Henry Moore, C. L. Taylor and C. D. Walker, all incumbents. Holdover aldermen are Charlie Johnson and W. B. Wiggins.
