(June 1, 1972)-Lone Star Gas Company today asked the city of Hedley to increase local revidential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 10% to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public

The application for rate increase listed increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the income deficiency

COTTON YIELDS DECLINING — Cotton yields have been declining just when cotton is showing a resurgence in the market. This has prompted a Beltwide campaign, spearheaded by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, National Cotton Council, and state Extension services, to obtain "Better Yields of Quality Cotton for Profit and Market Growth." Crops have been below normal for four out of the past five seasons. Across the Cotton Belt, yield per acre averaged 438 pounds in 1961. It rose to a record 527 pounds in 1965 but by 1971 was back down to 438 pounds, the same as 1961. Shields were here last week end from Amarillo.
