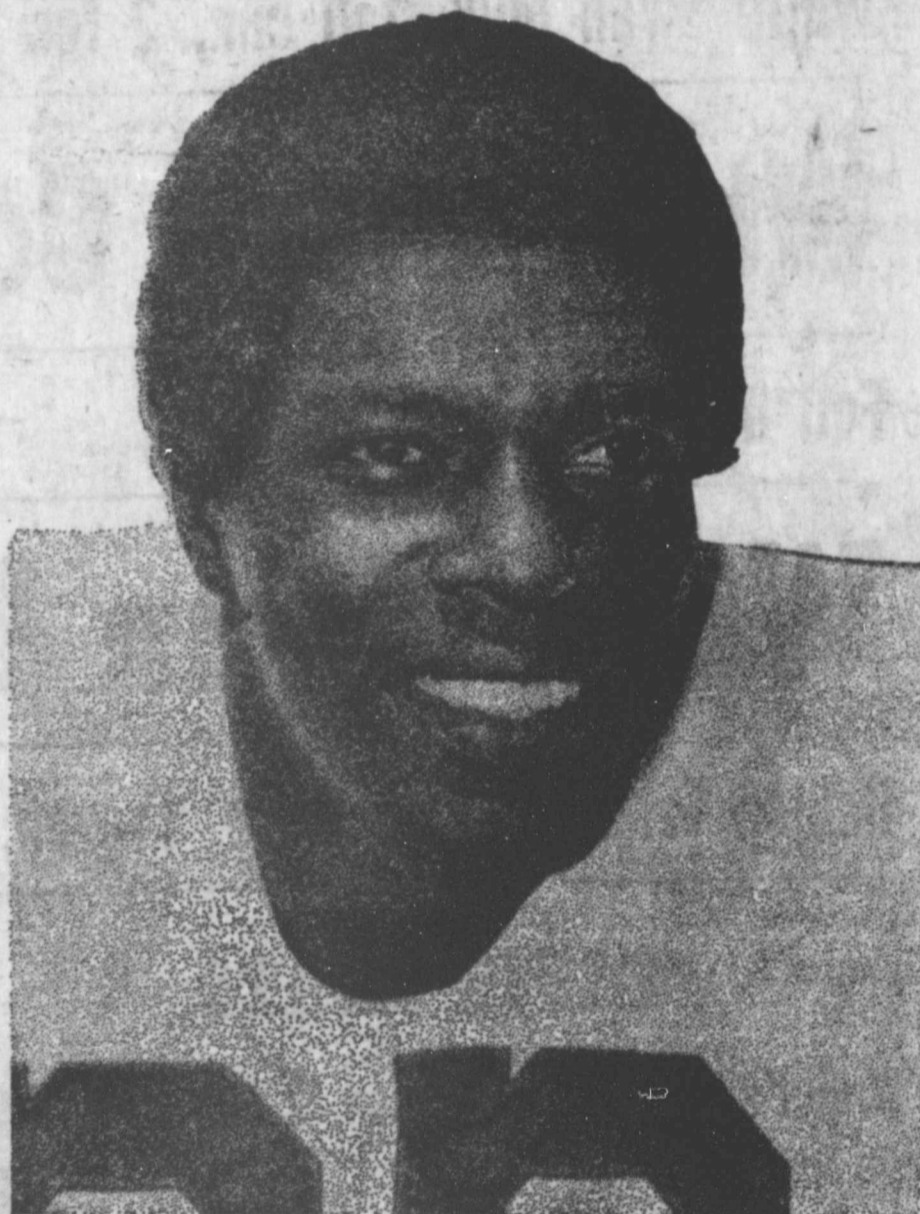

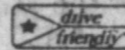

City To Pay More For Greenbelt Water

Beginning with the new fiscal year July 1st, the City of Hedley will be paying the Greenbelt Water Authority \$1176 per month for water, an increase of \$146 per month over the present rate of \$1030. An increase is being made on all the cities in the Authority to take care of bond payments.

The Hedley city council is hoping to make the increased payments without raising the price of water to the consumers. Hedley now has one of the best rates in the Authority for the consumer.

Our present rates are a minimum of \$6.00 for the first 2,000 gallons, 50¢ per thousand for the next 10,000, 40¢ per thousand for the next 10,000, and 30¢ per thousand and for all over 22,000 gallons. This rate was designed to make the minimum as low as possible and still make the payments, and to make the rate on additional water cheap enough for everybody to use extra amounts.

You will help your city and yourself by using lots of water, which will help to make the increased payments without raising the rates.

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway construction of F.M. Road 3257, extending from U.S. Highway 287, 2.0 miles Northwest of Clarendon, North a distance of 3.2 miles, in Donley County.

Since the Administration of the Highway Department has approved the route and design proposed for development of this project, work will begin on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project.

The proposed design will provide a two-lane bi-directional facility with 10-foot paved travel lanes and 4 foot shoulders on a minimum right of way width of 100 feet. There will be no relocations on the proposed project.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design, environmental studies, and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the office of E. H. Monroe at Clarendon, Texas.
