The 1971 pheasant season has evidently been a good one

up to the midway point.

Most of the hunters were out opening day --- Saturday --according to information we pick up on the streets and in the coffee shops.

We get the impression that good hunters with sufficient dedication were able to get their limit of two or at least get one bird to prove that they didn't waste their time.

Hunters seem to be in agreement, however, that the birds are harder to find this year due to the fact that little of the grain sorghum has been shredded. This gives the elusive birds more places to hide. The wet weather is a help for the birds, too, in that hunters can't drive to as many remote places to start hunting as they otherwise could.

One hunter even remarked that the pheasants are reading The Blade, He saidhe had plenty of game spotted, but then the story came out in the paper about when the season was and they disappeared.

One non-hunter we quizzed about hunting allowed as how if he couldn't make enough during the week to buy chicken for Sunday dinner he wasn't going out and bother the pheasants

Be it good, bad or indifferent, the season, and especially opening day, brought several strangers to the county. We're inclined to believe that this is good if the visitors are good sports and have proper respect. for the landowners. We have the birds anyway and legal hunting of them doesn't hurt the population. Those visitors are just bound to spend a few dollars with us before they depart. We daresay that if you figure how much they spend and how many birds they take with them, they're paying a pretty high price per pound for their pheasant meat.

But that's just our idea and certainly we have no way to prove it.

People who have hunted in Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota and such places which have greater pheasant populations than we have say there is no comparison in the hunting. It's easier in those pheasant places, they tell us.

They admit, though, that hunting here is more challenging and a heap handier, so it's still a good deal.

Down through the years, we've promoted in this space hunters.

However, we've about given up on the idea.

In the first place, we never did get anybody to agree with us that it was a good idea and in the second place, we never could figure out how to make it work. The pheasants are not respecters of property lines and the hunters have a tendency to go where the birds are, especially if it's just across a fence row or a turnrow and the pheasants are visible.

The land operators didn't seem to be in favor of charging for hunting, eventhough they want to retain control of their land and certainly the hunters weren't interested in paying if they could get all the places to hunt they wanted just by asking. 
inion that the Winter of '71-'72 is going to be a severe one. Willie, for instance, doesn't say that in so many words, but he leaves the impression

Flynn Continues As Manager --

Flynn, who has owned and managed the business here since its beginning in 1958, will continue as manager under the new ownership for a period of one year.

Flynn says his decision to sell the business was based on his "health and age." He expressed pleasure in being able to sell to a large, reputable firm such as Griffin and Brand. "They're big operators and good people," Flynn commented about the firm which has purchased the business. "They'll be good for the com-

The business will continue to operate under the Gatweay name as a corporation of Griffin and Brand.

Griffin and Brand has its main offices in McAllen and also grows and ships vegetables at Hereford, Mexico, Crystal City, Los Cruces, N.M., Rocky Ford, Colo. and Caldwell, Ida-

Flynn says he expects the new ownership to continue to handle the same variety of vegetables that he has in the past as well as onions and carrots.

During the just past shipping season, the business here processed 1709 loads of vegetables at an average of 30,000 pounds per load.





Patterson is presently minister of Fourth Street Church of Christ in Portales. He was minister of the Church of Christ here in 1958 and '59.



Hunters were in the fields in full force Saturday for open-


Reasonable amounts of success were reported by hunters eventhough they were of the opinion the birds were more difficult to find than usual because of more grain sorghum stubble this year.

Fillies drew a bye in the first round of tournament action and will meet the winner of the Filly B and Pep game at 9 p.m. Saturday.



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
