GenTel Asks Rate Increase

Our present rates are a minimum of \$6.00 for the first 2,000 gallons, 50¢ per thousand for the next 10,000, 40¢ per thousand for the next 10,000, and 30¢ per thousand for all over 22,000 gallons. This rate was designed to make the minimum as low as possible and still make the payments, and to make the rate on additional water cheap enough for everybody to use extra amounts

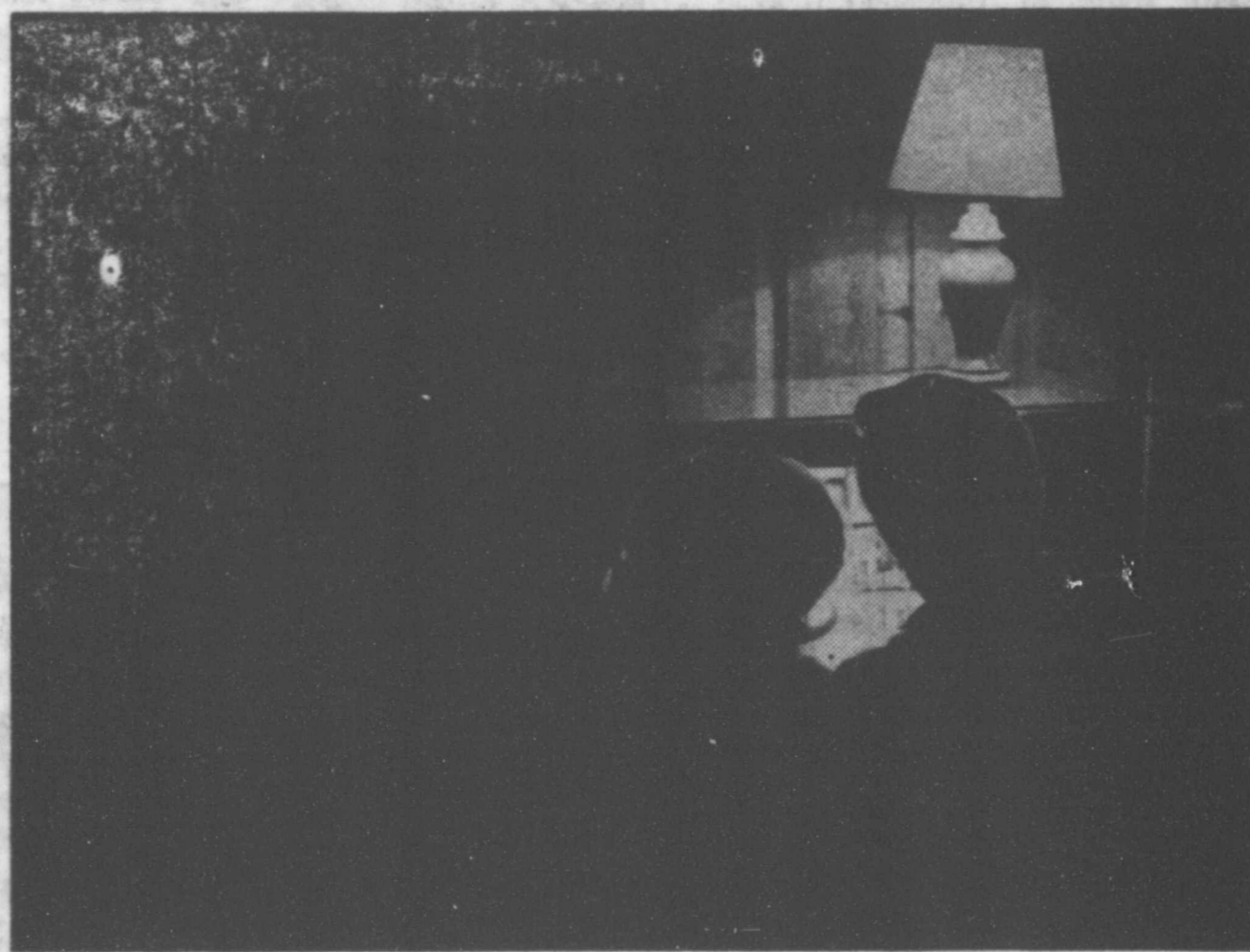

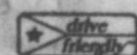

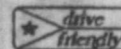
