Lake Water Soon To Be a Reality For Clyde and Eula Residents

A long awaited dream will soon become a reality. Residents of Clyde soon will have water from Lake Clyde piped to their homes, and residents of Callahan County will have access to recreational facilities in close driving distance. Les Ethetton, of the Soil Conservation Service, stated this had been made possible through the hard work and determination of the Local County Sponsors which include the City of Clyde, the Callahan County Commissioners Court, and the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District.

In the early 1960's, City Official of Clyde became interested in developing a better water system for the city and additional recreational facilities. At the same time the local Landowners, the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service were interested in providing flood control to the overflow areas along Pecan Bayou. Plans were then formulated to include a multi-purpose flood water retarding dam in the proposed Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed Project. In 1965, the project was adopted and wheels began to turn. Lake Clyde, one of a series of flood water retarding dams, was completed in the spring of 1970. Ethetton explained that it was different from the other lakes in that it provided extra storage for municipal water and had recreational facilities included in the work plan.

Presently, Harold Holden, water superintendent of Clyde, reports the pipeline from the lake to the city is 95% complete. The work remaining to be done consists mostly of installing water meters. The water treatment

plant is expected to be completed by June 1st. Holden feels residents of Clyde will have lake water piped to their homes in June.

C. Lee Smith, the mayor of Clyde, says this water system will presently serve 718 meters in Clyde. Mayor Smith went on to explain that the Eula Water Supply Corporation will purchase water from the City of Clyde and plan to tie on to the water system. An additional 250 meters will be served by the system in the rapidly expanding rural areas of Eula, Denton Valley and Potosi. The City of Clyde helped finance their water system through a HUD Grant while the Eula Water Supply Corporation received a loan from Farmers Home Administration.

Recreational facilities are to be constructed at Lake Clyde with the Soil Conservation Service and the City of Clyde sharing the cost. M. M. Tabor, City Councilman, said picnic tables, barbecue pits, boat ramps, a community pavilion, and a sandy beach will be among the attractions of the lake. Lake Clyde has approximately 449 surface acres of water and 230 acres of land on which the recreational facilities will be installed. Tabor hopes this construction will be completed this summer. The Texas Highway Department is going to pave a road from Farm Road 604 to the lake.

Ethetton feels this as a unique situation in which conservation is serving a while spectrum of the public. Farmers, ranchers, and other taxpayers in the overflow areas downstream will receive the benefits of a high quality water supply. And finally, all of the residents of Callahan County and the surrounding ones will benefit from a well planned recreational facility.

BAIRD — The program entitled "First of its kind," that was set up here in Baird in 1966, has continued through the years and still is termed a great success. This program consists of an organization supporting and sponsoring of youths in various project. This organization is the Baird Chamber of Commerce, and the work it has done with the local FFA Chapter.

The two boys, pictured above are involved in the system this year. The Chamber of Commerce sponsors these boys, and this year they have been joined by Baird Lions Club. They help the boy in selecting a project, showing, feeding and financing. It is a good program, and at one time was the only one of its kind in the State of Texas.

Mrs. Lena Dooley Added to County Extension Service Staff Position

BAIRD — A new 4-H program assistant has been added to the Callahan County Extension Service Staff, announces County Extension Agent, Greg Gerngross. She is Mrs. Lena Dooley of Clyde.

In the newly designated position, Mrs. Dooley will be working through volunteer 4-H leaders in the county to extend the 4-H and youth program to boys and girls between the ages of 9 - 19 who are currently not being involved in the program. She will be concerned with recruiting and training volunteer 4-H leaders, assisting with the organization of now 4-H clubs or groups, and supporting the overall 4-H expansion effort.

According to Gerngross, the new 4-H program assistant position was established last fall through money funded by the federal government. A total of 46 counties in the state have been allocated such a position based on the potential of reaching boys and girls not previously active in 4-H and on the need for assistance in conducting more effective 4-H and youth programs.

A major 4-H expansion effort is underway in Texas. There

are more than 2,500,000 youth in the state eligible for enrollment in 4-H and youth programs. With about 125,000 boys and girls enrolled in 4-H in Texas at present, the statewide goal is to double this number by 1980.

A total of 125 boys and girls are enrolled in 4-H in Callahan County out of a potential of 1600. So there is room for continued expansion in 4-H and for the development of programs and activities that will provide youth with information, guidance and challenges to make life more meaningful and worthwhile.

New License Plates Now Available At County Tax Office, or Substation

AUSTIN — Texas motorists can pick up license plates for the faithful family car now at the county tax office of substation in the county in which they live.

The motorist may register his vehicle in person at his county tax office or substation by bringing in the entire handy 3-part form he received in the mail from the Texas Highway Department. It takes only a few minutes to process the form, collect the fee and send the motorist on his way with new plates.

Drivers also can get new plates by mail if they send in the complete three-part form, the registration fee plus one dollar for each vehicle to their county tax office prior to March 1st.

After March 1 it will be necessary to go to the county tax office or substation in person as 30 days are required for mail

delivery. In any case, owners will save themselves time and trouble by using the computerized forms.

With this form, a certificate of title and last year's registration receipt are not needed.

Whether the driver uses the mail or applies in person - the important thing for him to remember is to be very careful NOT to separate the three-part application form. The entire form must be mailed or taken to the county tax office or substation. A stick-down strip showing the new license number is attached to all sections of the form. The tax office separates the form, returning part of it as a receipt for the owner.

Applications for license plates should be sent only to the local county tax office. Motorists should NOT send their payments to the Texas Highway Department because this will delay their registration.

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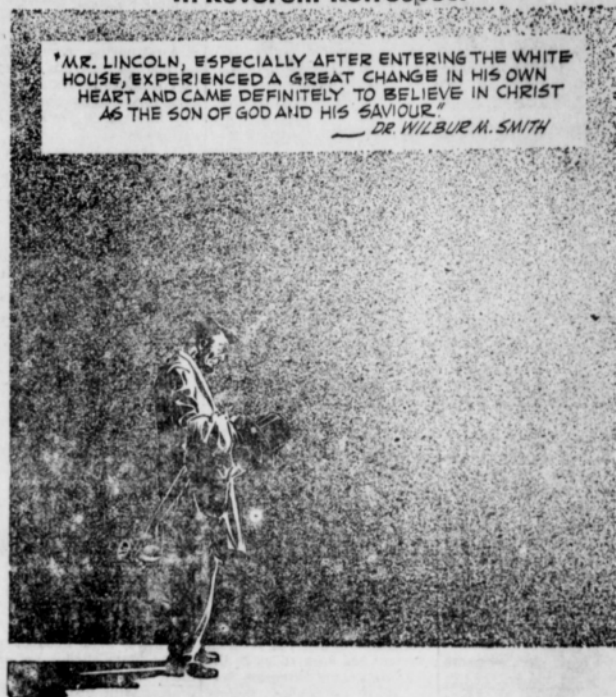

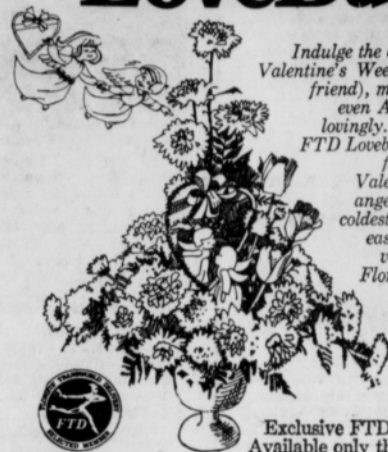
Eighth Grade Girls Defeat Cisco 52-20

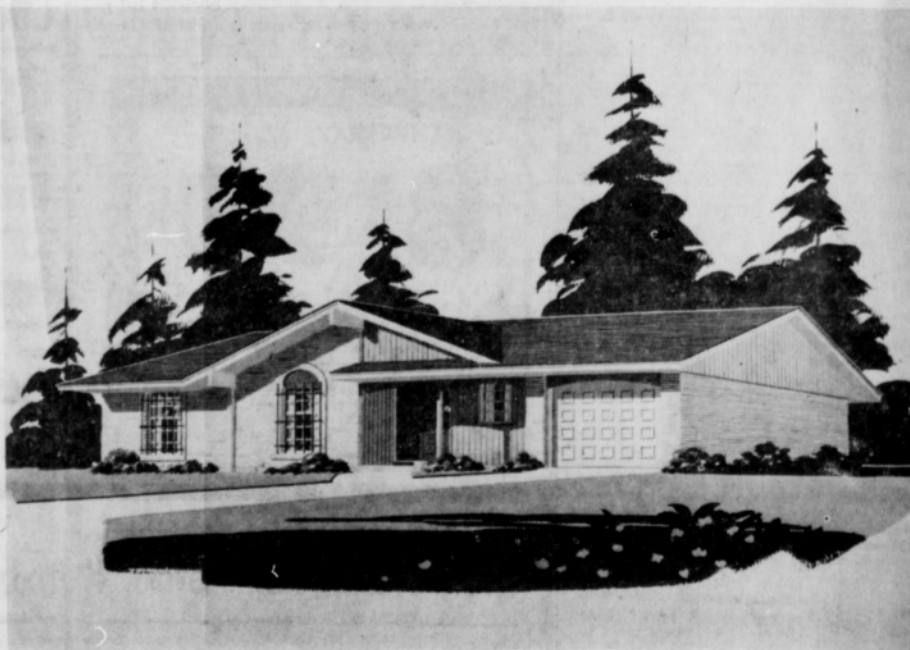

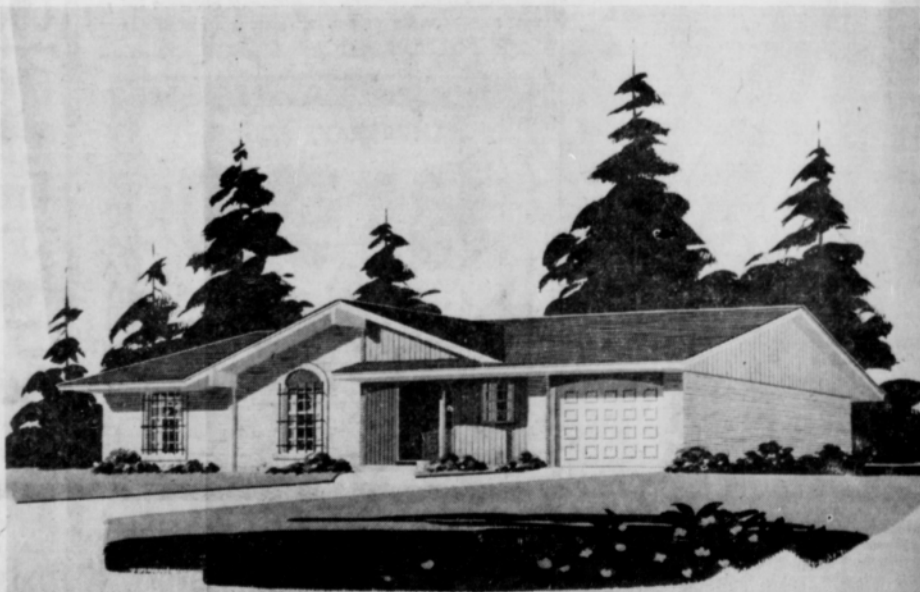
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Clyde Girl Scouts Annual Cookie Sale Starts Feb. 14, Thru Feb. 24
