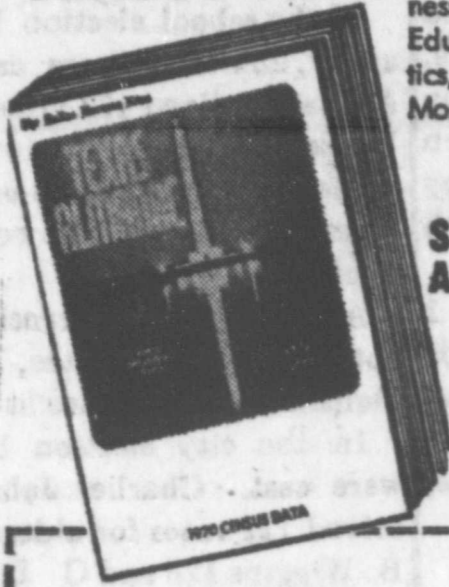

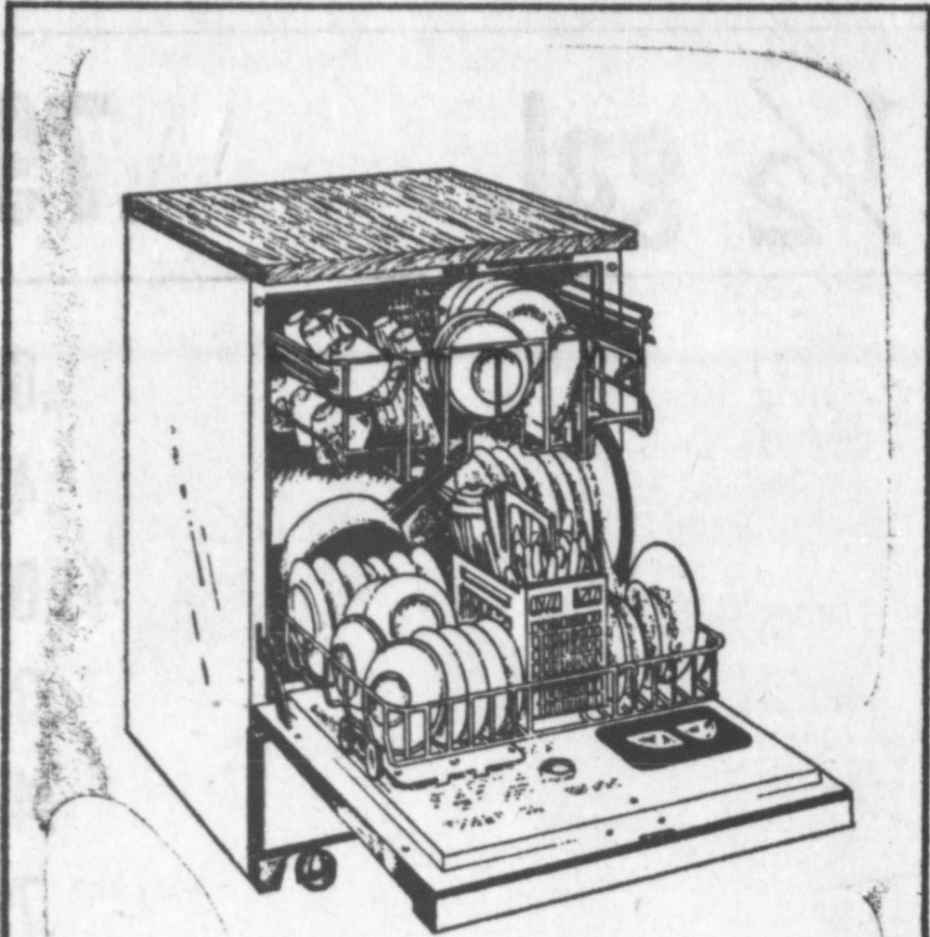

Area I Vocational Homemaking Teachers In-Service Conference

Dr. Blaine Porter, dean of College of Family Living, Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah, gave the opening address, Our Youth, Their Needs, Our Concerns, last Friday evening at Area I Vocational Homemaking Teachers In-Service conference at the Big Texan in Amarillo.

Conference theme, Getting on with Improving Our Teaching, was furthered by Saturday activities at Amarillo's Caprock High School to reach conference objectives: 1 updating information in subject matter areas; 2 realizing the importance of being a professional teacher through program planning, development and reporting; 3 learning through sharing with others

Mrs. Ima Dora Haile, Area I Consultant for Homemaking Education, Texas Education Agency, spent the morning working with

Area I homemaking teachers grouped according to types of teaching programs in which they are working. Included were the three types of occupational training programs CAVE, Coordinated Vocational Academic Education; HECE, Home Economics Cooperative Education; and VEH, and, useful homemaking teachers, teachers of sequence courses of Homemaking I, II, III, and IV, and semester or quarter courses in Child Development, Consumer Education, Home and Family Living, Home Furnishings, Home Management, Home Nursing, and summer programs

Each teacher in a useful homemaking program was allowed to attend three of the eighteen one hour sessions scheduled Saturday morning. These included Teaching Family Living led by Dr. Blaine Porter, Geriatric Nutrition by Dr. Mina Lamb of Texas Tech, Mini-lessons in Men's and Boys' Clothing by Mrs. Nell Ingram of Bethel H D Club Dimmitt, Home Furnishings by Thomas C. Cook of Owens Furniture, Amarillo, Why Teach Child Development to High School Students by Deb-

bie Glasson of West Texas State Careers in Child Development by Pattie Woods, HECE student in Kilgore Psychology Hospital for Children, and others on various subjects including home experiences, FHA, Encounter, and summer programs with about twenty Area I teachers of useful homemaking programs as study leaders to help reach objectives of the conference.

Mrs. Julie Trevino, chairman of Area I Vocational Homemaking Teachers Advisory Committee, presided at Saturday luncheon. Mrs. Billie Chapman, executive secretary, Vocational Homemaking Teachers Assn. of Texas, gave a legislative report. The conference was concluded by Dr. Porter's speech, These Youth, Our Challenge

Mrs. Mary Freeman, Hedley homemaking teacher, found the conference very educational and inspirational.
