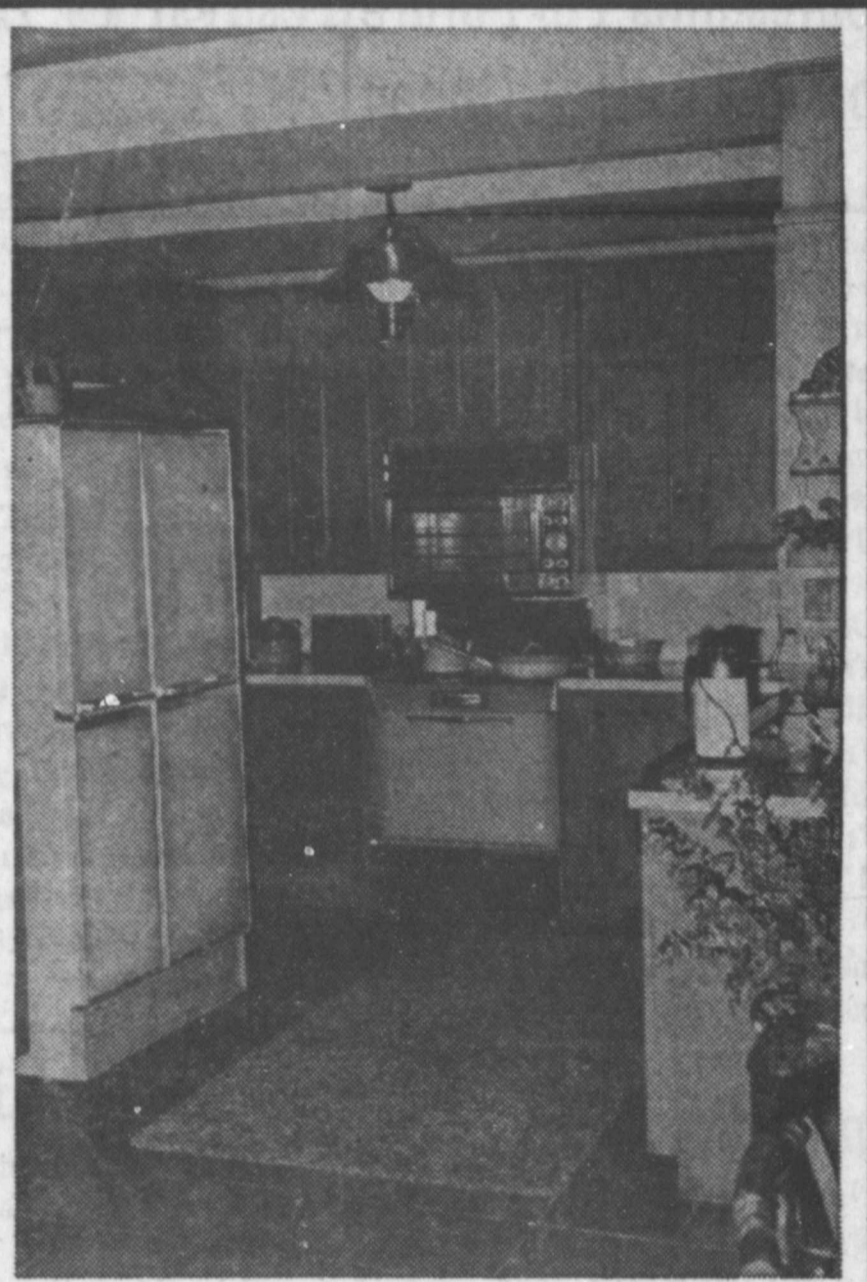

State Brush and Range Field Day

A Statewide Brush Control and Range Improvement Field Day will be held at Vernon on Oct 4. The field day will feature a tour of the historic Waggoner Ranch in the morning (full tour at 8 a. m short tour at 9:30 a. m.) and a program on brush control research in the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium at 1:30 p. m. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has conducted brush research on the ranch since 1941, according to C. E. Fisher, Experiment Station scientist in brush control. The field day will provide ranch men with the latest brush and weed control recommendations,

regulations, and a research-in-progress report.

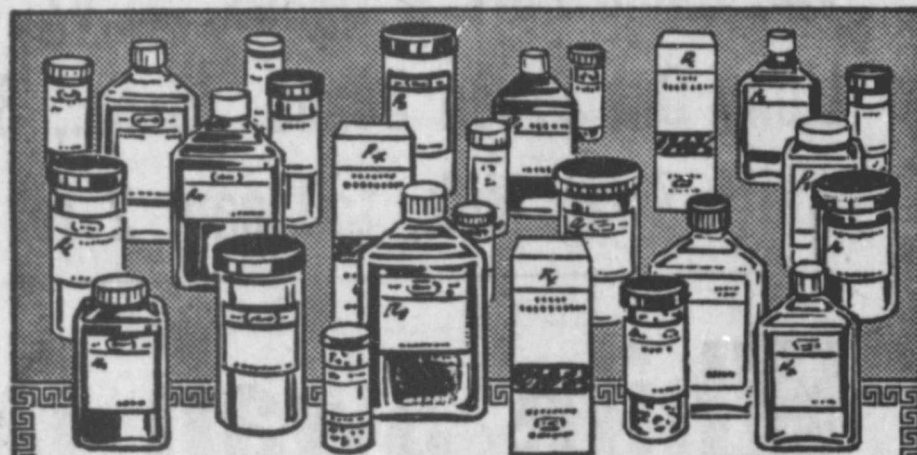
A field representative of the Social Security Administration will be at the courthouse in Clarendon from 9:00 to 12:00 on the following Thursdays:

He will be available to help on any matters relating to Social Security.

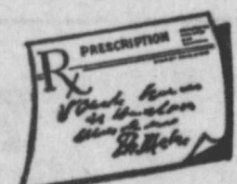

The library should be a center of learning. The school district tries hard to make books available. Children need to be encouraged to make use of the materials available.
