

1972 Pheasant Season Starts Saturday

Pheasant hunting, Parmer County's most popular and only wildlife sport, gets underway here Saturday for a nine-day season, which includes two week-ends.

The season begins on Saturday, which is the ninth, and continues through Sunday, Dec. 17.

Hunters of this area, and many out-of-county sports enthusiasts, are eagerly looking forward to the opening day this year.

Reports are that there is an excellent supply of birds this year, but that hunting is expected to be more difficult because of the late

grain sorghum harvest. Although harvest is expected to be 100 per cent complete by time the season opens, few stalk fields have been shredded. This is expected to give the birds more areas in which to conceal themselves than normal.

Legal game again this

season is the male pheasant.

According to Texas law, the limit is two cocks per day with four in possession. Most hunters here expect to have difficulty in filling that limit, according to veterans of the hunting.

Though the pheasant pop-

ulation in Parmer County does not equal that of hunting areas in states north of here, a large number of out-of-county hunters are expected for the event.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Bovina, Friona and Farwell.

Cash prizes of \$30 will be awarded in each town

with \$15 for first place, \$10 for second and \$5 for third.

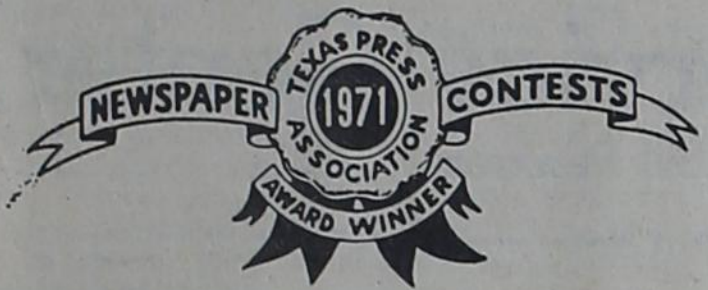
Contest headquarters in Bovina will be Bovina Gin Co.

Hunters are encouraged to turn in their tailfeathers at the gin office where Johnnie Horn, gin manager, is in charge of the contest.

A plaque will be pre-

sent to the hunter who turns in the longest tailfeather in the county. The plaque will be awarded by Parmer County Game Management Association.

Though the nine-day season includes two week-ends, the greatest number of hunters is expected to be in the fields on opening day.

If you don't have your shotgun oiled and ready for this year's pheasant season, don't worry about it. You still have until Saturday morning to get that chore taken care of.

The one forthcoming promise to be another good pheasant season. The birds continue to be more plentiful and that, up to a point, makes hunting more fun. The pheasant population has reached the point now that a good, dedicated hunter with a lot of farmer friends should be able to get his limit of two most any day during the season that he sets his mind to it. (We can afford to say that, you understand, because we don't hunt and therefore don't put ourselves in the position of having to personally prove that's right.)

We've noticed "more birds than ever" this year during trips around the country-side. There's one particular rooster we've become acquainted with by seeing him in approximately the same place on several different occasions that we hope survives the season. He has the appearance of being an older bird and it could be that he's smart enough to stay out of hunters' way during the nine-day season. He's done it before or he's been lucky before, judging from his mature appearance. Since we don't hunt anyway, we're hoping it makes it during the duration of the open season. If he doesn't, though, he'll put somebody in the race for the tail feather contest cash prizes, we're guessing.

This old bird acts more like a chicken than he does a pheasant. When you come around his neighborhood and get too close to the part of it he's occupying at that particular time, he squawks ugly at you as if he's saying, "Get away and don't bother me. This is my part of the country and I aim to take care of it."

We don't know if he'll argue like that with a shotgun or not. If he does, he's a goner, we're guessing.

While pheasant hunting is a lot of fun... and handy... it doesn't carry the enthusiasm and conversation with it that fishing and some other types of hunting.

This is due, we guess, to the fact that pheasant hunting in Parmer County is local and handy and a person can hunt birds here and work all in the same day. Some of the romance of hunting and fishing is lost right there. To some sportsmen, the trip to far-away places is a big percentage of the overall picture. We're not knocking that, just pointing out that it might be true.

We heard a professional speak one day last week in Austin on the federal government's new revenue sharing program. That's the one you've read about whereby a part of the country's money trickles back to the counties and municipalities where it originated to be used as the officials of local government see fit.

The program has many pros and cons and it's highly complicated.

However, we think it's good that the money can be returned to the local level and used there in a way that the local people feel it should be. From that standpoint, the program definitely has appeal... locally.

How much money will be received through the program in Parmer County and the municipalities therein is not yet known, as far as we know. The amount will be enough to do some good, however, and we feel it can be better used by local people than Washingtonians.

Time will tell.

Pallbearers were H. J. Charles, E. B. Caldwell, T. O. Lesly, Robert Calaway, O. J. Jones and Travis Lloyd.

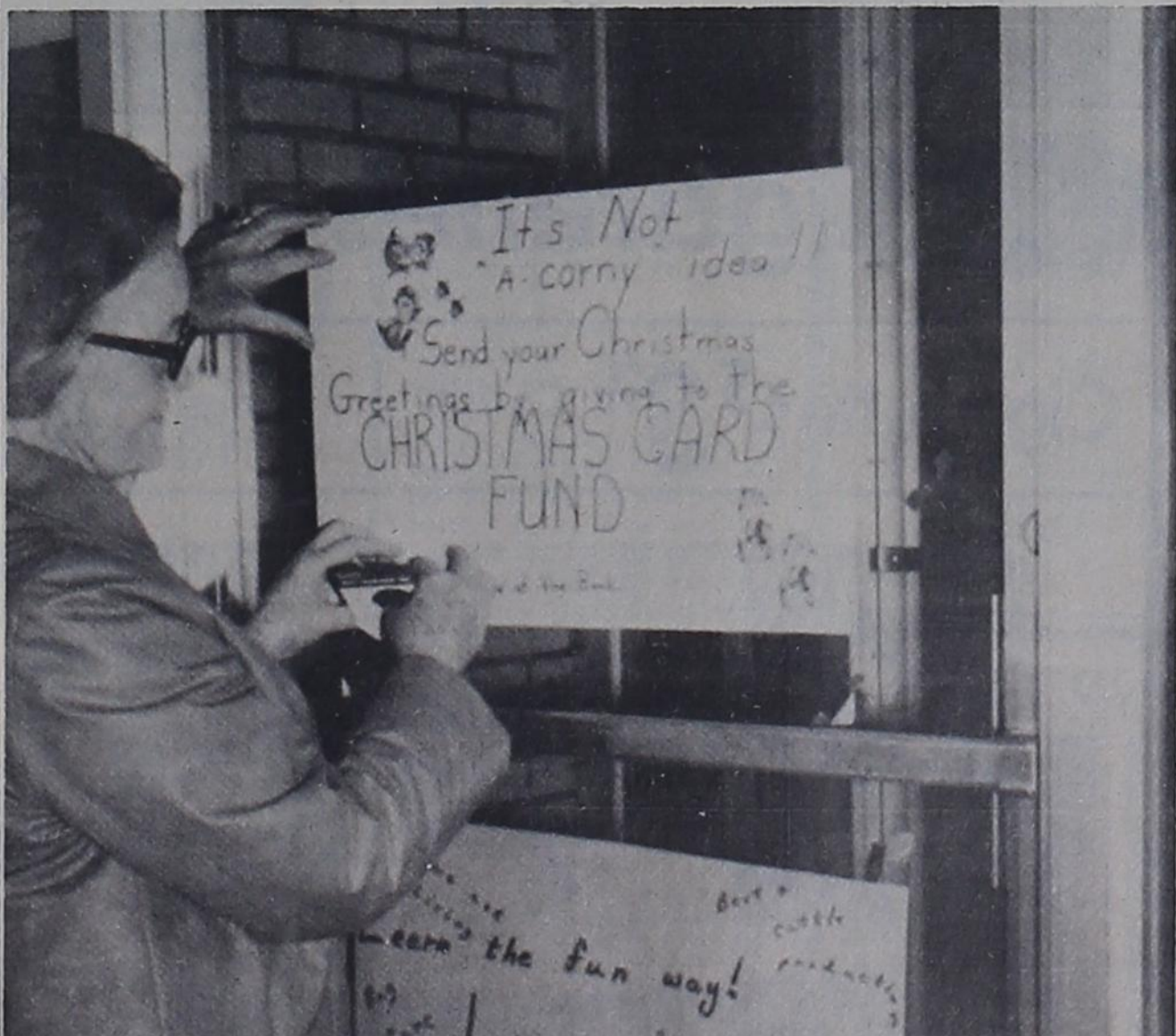
Honorary pallbearers were members of the Men's Sunday School Class of Bovina United Methodist Church.

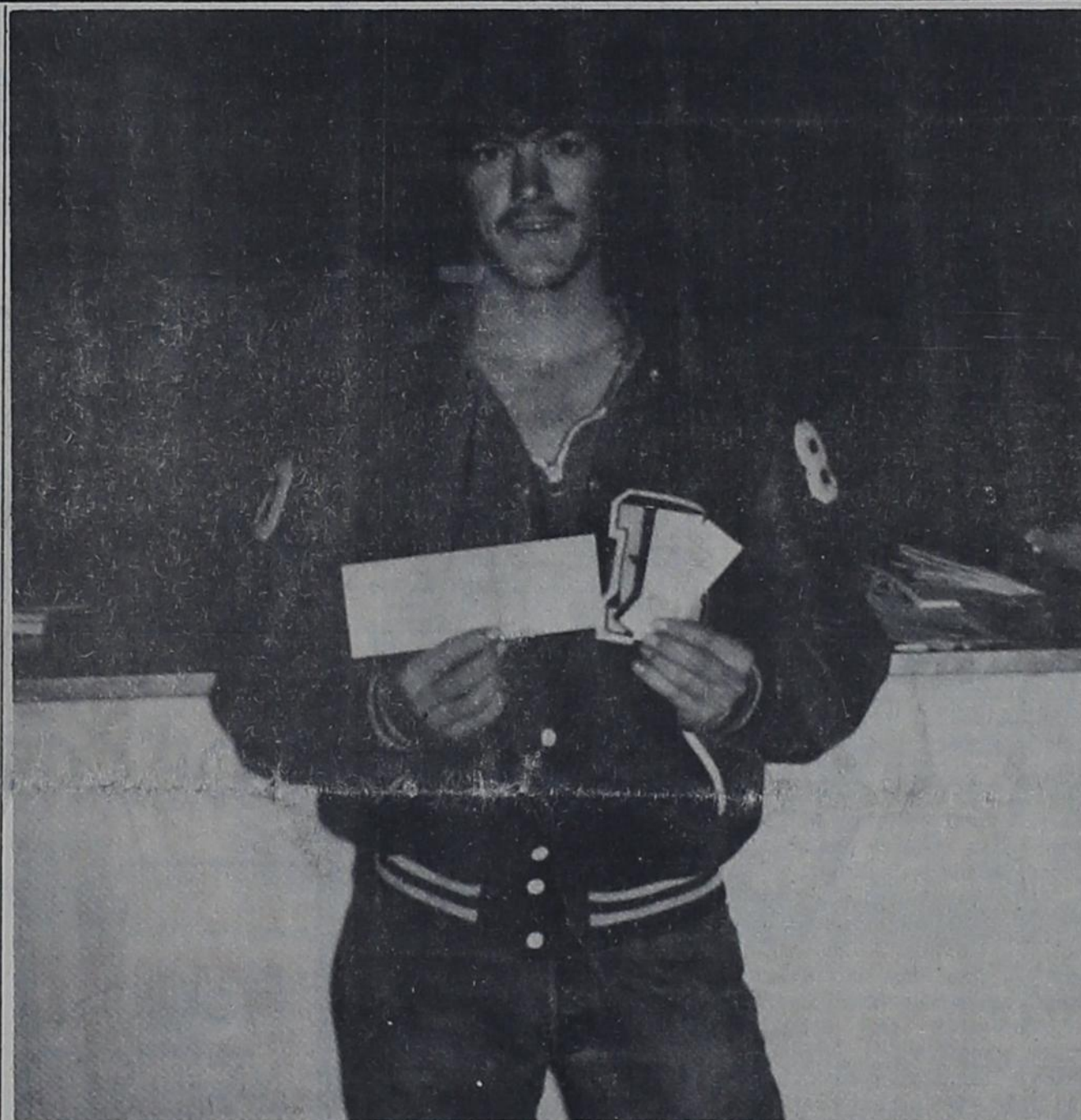
Band Concert Slated Sunday

Gary McCormick Wins FB Contest Grand Prize

Gary McCormick, who was down six points at the end of the seventh week of the 1972 Bovina Businesses Football Contest,

came roaring back in the final five weeks of the contest to gain a tie for the lead and picked eight winners last week to capture the championship.

McCormick nosed out Terry Carpenter of Clovis by two points and Donna Jester by one in the final week. The three had been tied for the contest lead going into the last week.

McCormick, a 1972 graduate of Bovina High School, finished the contest with 93 points out of a possible 129. He will receive two tickets to the professional football game between the Dallas Cowboys and the New York Giants at Texas Stadium Dec. 17, plus \$80 expense money.

Carpenter, who had led the contest since the fourth week, picked six winners to finish with 91 points. Mrs. Jester picked seven to finish with 92 points. Larry Wardlaw, the grand prize winner in 1969, also finished with 91 points.

Bill Moore finished three notches behind McCormick with 90 points and Cindy Morrison of New Deal closed with 89. Five points behind with 88 were George Douglas, Jim Lookingbill, Jim Noyes, Sandra Ware and Paula Whitecotton.

McCormick, who compiled a .721 average, won weekly prize money twice during the 13-week contest. His lowest pick during the contest was four and his high was nine.

A total of 346 people entered the contest at least once this year with 71 of these entering every week.

In the final week of the contest, in which 115 entered, Win-

ston Allison picked up first place prize money of \$5 by picking

Mrs. Leon Schilling, president of St. Ann's Society, said that group would have a social Friday, Dec. 16, in the Parish Hall. Following the social, the

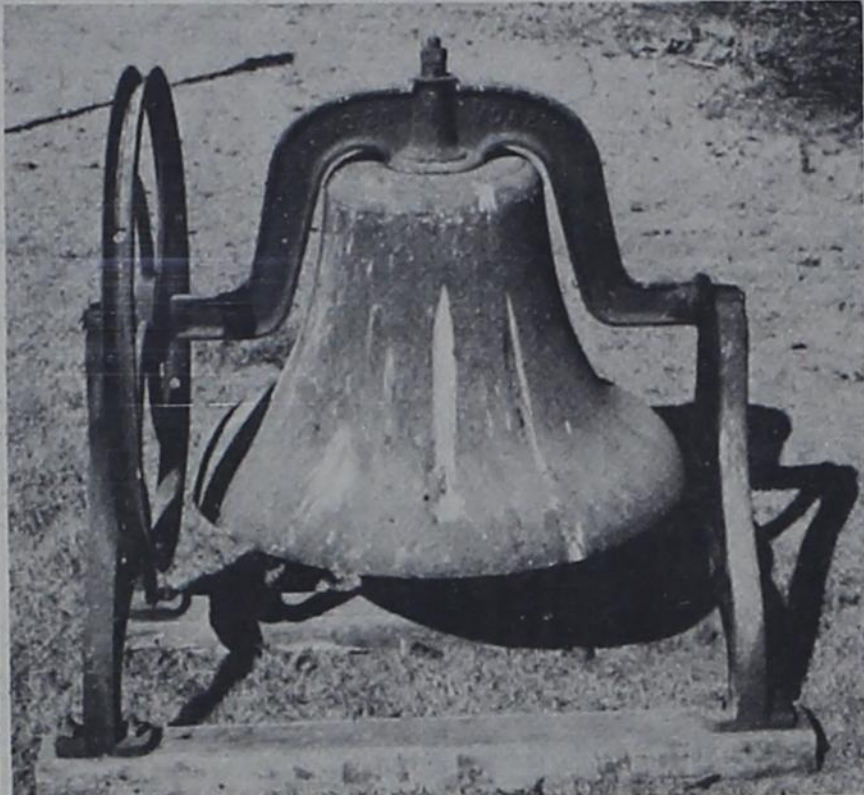
women will prepare Christmas sacks for children of the church. The Santa Claus program will be Sunday, Dec. 17, after the C.C.D. classes.

Burglars Strike Business Firms

Two Bovina business firms were victims of theft during the past week, according to law officials here.

Gaines Hardware on Main Street was burglarized sometime Wednesday night of last week. A window at the side of the building was broken and the thief, or thieves, took two electric can openers and a piece of luggage, according to City Marshal Ronald Mitchell and Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter, who investigated. Several vases were found outside the building.

Bars over the windows prevented entry from being made into the building, Mitchell said, and the thief took only what he could reach from outside.

Twenty-two junk batteries were taken from L. L. Rhinehart's Fina Station on Highway 60 before daylight Monday. The batteries were outside the building. A car was reportedly seen at the rear of the station early that morning. Minter investigated the theft.

Minter is also investigating the theft of a saddle from the J. A. Rushing farm south of Bovina.

The fire alarm was sounded falsely about 7 p.m. Monday, according to Dan Koelzer, fire chief. It is the third such instance recently.

"We don't want to file on someone for 'meanness,' but at the same time, we don't need to discourage our firemen from answering the alarm," stated Mitchell. The false alarm is a nuisance to volunteer firemen. Mitchell pointed out that turning in a false alarm, or sound-

ing the fire alarm falsely, is a felony, punishable by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 and/or a sentence of not more than five years in the state penitentiary.

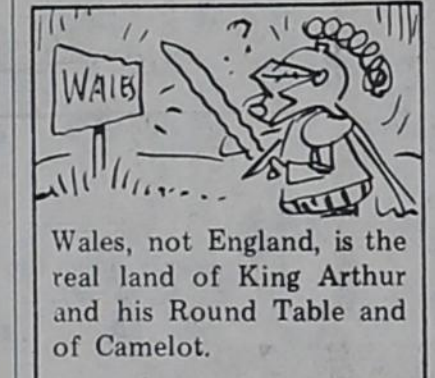

For 1973 Crop --

No Control On Sugarbeets

Proportionate shares (farm acreage allotments) will not be established for the 1973 crop of sugarbeets, according to a release from the Parmer County ASCS office at Farwell.

This determination was made recently by the Secretary of Ag-

riculture in accordance with applicable Sugar-Act requirements, said Prentice Mills, manager of the ASCS office.

"This means that sugarbeet growers will not be limited to any specific acreage for the

1973 crop year," said Mills. He stated that farmers planning to grow the beets in '73 should

contact Holly Sugar Corp. in Hereford and enter into an acreage (grower) contract with the company.

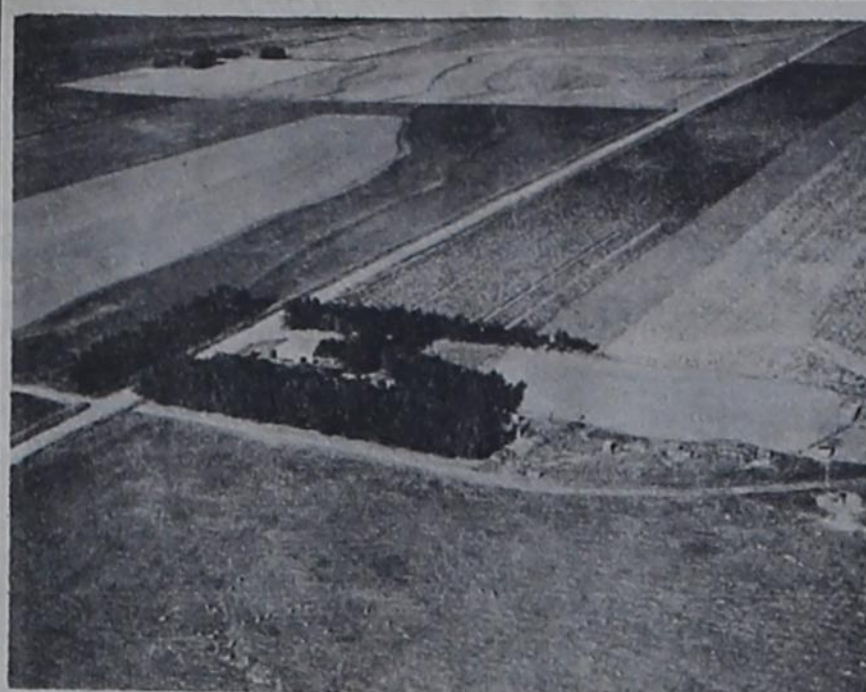

Says SCS --

Windbreaks Give Protection

Now is the time to begin planning and planting windbreaks, according to Soil Conservation Service officials at Friona.

Windbreaks planted on the south and west sides of fields and buildings will protect areas from prevailing winds, says Herb Evans, district conservationist. North windbreaks will protect areas from drifting snow and provide good protection for livestock.

Other benefits derived from windbreaks include increased crop yields by reduced evaporation, blow-out protection of crops from wind, reduced loss of livestock during severe winds and blizzards, reduced feed requirements for livestock in winter, provides food and shelter for wildlife, reduced home heat-

ing costs in winter, prevents wind erosion of top soil, beautification of eyesores such as waste treatment areas and increased sale value of land.

The Farmer County Soil Conservation Service office in Friona has helpful tips on preparation, seeding and care of windbreaks, says Evans.

SCS Developing Farm Contracts

"Great Plains Conservation Program contracts are being developed by the Farmer County Soil Conservation Service office for anyone wanting to establish practices such as grass, diversion terraces, parallel terraces, grassed waterways, ir-

rigation pipelines and bench leveling on their farms or ranches," Kenneth Ferguson, soil conservationist, said this week.

Upon a complete conservation plan for their operating unit. The cost-share is set up in a contract over a scheduled period of three to 10 years, depending on the needs of the farm or ranch operation and financial ability of the producer," Ferguson said.

The plan of conservation operations developed with the landowner or operator includes a schedule of land use adjustment and conservation measures considered needed for the most efficient operation of the farm or ranch unit. Technical assistance is provided by the SCS for the planning and installation of the necessary conservation measures.

This program supplements and fits into other programs such as those of the Soil and Water Conservation District and the Agricultural Conservation Program, Ferguson explained.

Public Law 1021, enacted by the 84th Congress, set up the Great Plains Conservation program in 1957. The SCS was given the responsibility of administering the program. Congress voted in 1969 to extend the GPCP through Dec. 31, 1981. Farmers interested in cost-share assistance for conservation practices should contact the Friona office of the SCS, Ferguson reminded.
