Greenbelt News

The January 1974 water pur-Authority showed an increase of almost 4 million gallons over January 1973. While the member cities of Childress, Quanah, Clarendon and Crowell showed a decrease in water consumption Hedley showed a slight increase. In January 1973 Hedley used 1,161,-000 gallons and in January 1974 we used 1,199,000 gallons The increase came from the Red River Water Authority, which covers the rural areas, and Bestwall at Acme.

The Red River Authority's water usage jumped from 3,191,000 gallons in January 1973 to 11,076. 000 gallons in January 1974 Bestwall at Acme used 3 510 000 gallons in January 1973 and 5,453 000 gallons in January 1974.

Greenbelt water is now being used about 15 miles past Crowell Rural water lines have been built or are being built along most of the line One line will run almost to Turkey.
