Ballot Crowded For Mayor, Council

Three names will appear on the ballot for mayor of Bovina, and three men will be named from a list of ten candidates to the city commission in the April 6 city election.

The names of French Crook and Charles Flynn were filed for mayor by petition and will appear on the ballot along with that of Bedford Caldwell, incumbent, whose name had previously been filed by the same means.

Another name, Billie Sudderth, was filed for mayor on the

same petition with Flynn, but Sudderth has declined to be a candidate for the office. However, Sudderth's name had previously been filed for councilman, along with that of Charles Corn. Both are now serving on the council. Their terms expire next month, along with that of Owen Patton, who has filed for re-election.

To appear on the ballot for councilmen are Norvell Strawn, Vernon Estes, Roy Hawkins, Robert Lee Hopingardner, Allen Cumpton, all filed this week; Travis Dyer, Lloyd Gober, Corn, Patton and Sudderth.

Holdover members of the council are Edward Isaac and C. R. Elliott.







Editorial Comment —

The one per cent city sales tax idea is catching on.

This is true not only over the entire state. but here in our own western part of it.

Farwell, for instance, voted on the sales tax idea this week. Friona recently had a public-invited-type meeting to discuss the proposition. This indicated that an election might be forthcoming there soon.

Muleshoe has already approved the issue and may even be collecting the tax by now.

That pretty well makes Bovina surrounded by towns which are interested in making themselves better through the use of the sales tax, which has been called the "fairest tax of all."

In our opinion, a town, this one included, has nothing to lose by voting in the tax and considerable advantages to gain.

Without the advantages which can come with the additional tax revenue, potential customers are apt to reject a town because of its lack of progressiveness in favor of one which has the tax and is getting full use of the money therefrom.

Nobody likes to pay taxes, of course. And usually there's nothing that will upset the citizenry more than an announced increase

And it sends out a challenge to the young to do better than those before them.





"Christianity hasn't a chance against the Re-publicans and Democrats! They promise heaven on earth without all the hard work!"

"Go Therefore To The Crossroads" (Matt. 22, 9)

These words may be regarded as an intimation of the universal embrace of Christ's teaching. The truths He taught were intended for no privileged class, or caste, or rank. His mission recognized no bounds of jurisdiction, no limits of space and time. To be a disciple of Christ implies the excluding of every sort of prejudice, pettiness and narrowness. To one and all, we are under obligation, like St. Paul.

Not every professed christian sets his course by this chart. Not always do we measure up to the breath and depth and height of Christ's ideal in which we are one-Jew and Greek and Barbarian, bond or free. Some of us set parochial, provincial, national, racial bonds to our sympathies. We are good to kinsfolk, old schoolmates, members of our political party and congregation of our church group; but we show no tolerance for others. In the measure that our sense of fellowship is narrowed by ties of blood, or convention, or personal profit, we are wanting in christian universality. This means that we distort and nullify Christ's teaching.

Please God, help me to unselfishly befriend everyone, admitting no limits by class, or race, or color or wealth, or sympathy. Let me be ever mindful that surely as God is my Father, every man must be my brother.

For the angler who received a new rod or reel for Christmas, here is a suggestion from the fishing experts at Mercury outboards for getting the "feel" of the new equipment before that first spring outing.

If the entire family happen to be anglers, here's another winter activity that is guaranteed to delight one and all.


