
"Okay, we won't talk politics, but just let me say this...."

Two Killed At OL In Saturday Wreck

With the death of Eliseo Salinas, 47, around 11 p.m. Saturday night, the death toll was two from a noon accident Saturday at the intersections of FM145 and FM1731.

He was the driver of a pickup truck involved in the crash. Killed instantly in the accident was his wife, Mrs. Anita Salinas, around 50. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Parmer County Justice of the Peace Wilbur Charles of Farwell.

Six other persons were injured in the accident at the intersection about nine miles south of Bovina.

DPS Officer Bob Dorris of Friona said the pickup truck, which was driven by Salinas was southbound on FM1731 and the large cattle truck driven by William H. Carothers, 43, of Texico, was eastbound on FM145.

The Salinas family, reportedly living in Bovina, were enroute to a field at the time of the accident.

Hospitalized at Clovis Memorial Hospital were Carothers and his son, Charles Adkins, age seven. They were reported to be in good condition.

At the time of the mid-intersection crash, the pickup spun around on the highway and threw all six occupants of the vehicle out. The pickup did not overturn, although it was virtually destroyed on impact.

It was tentatively determined that several members of the Salinas family were perhaps riding in the bed of the pickup at the time of the crash.

On impact, the tractor-trailer rig, driven by Carothers, veered off the roadway to the right and ended up in a cornfield. The trailer of the empty truck overturned, but the cab remained upright, although the cab was torn apart when the truck struck concrete pipe stacked in the edge of the cornfield. Carothers and his son were injured at that time.

Five members of the Salinas family were brought to Parmer

County Community Hospital in Friona for emergency treatment and three were transferred to two hospitals in Amarillo for intensive care treatment. Salinas was unable to be moved due to the severity of his injuries and he died around 11 p.m. Saturday. In Parmer County Community Hospital, Olivia, age seven, was listed at presstime as being in fair condition.

Still critical at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo is Marie, 14. Hospital officials said she is in intensive care with severe head injuries.

At High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo, intensive care unit officials said Felix, 10 and Celia, 13, are in critical condition. Both the boy's legs are fractured and he has severe head injuries. The girl has a head injury, fractured pelvis

and shoulder and lacerations.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Salinas were taken to Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home in Friona where relatives moved them to Corpus Christi for funeral services and burial.

Reportedly, the Salinas made their home in Alice and came to the county to work vegetable crops. They were reported to be working in the onion fields at the time of the fatal accident.

IN NEW MEXICO

Ex-Resident's Sister Stabbed In Robbery

Mrs. Dessie Leach, 57, sister of Mrs. Cash [Mildred] Richards of Bovina and Lubbock, died Tuesday afternoon of last week after being stabbed several times during the robbery of the State Line Bar, which she and her husband owned and operated, at Glenrio, N.M.

A 31-year-old Army soldier, John Wayne Lee, was arrested by Texas law officials near Vega less than an hour after the robbery and stabbing was reported to New Mexico officers.

Lee waived extradition and was taken to Tucumcari late the night of his arrest after undergoing questioning in both Vega and Amarillo.

District Attorney Norman Runyan of Tucumcari tentatively set a preliminary hearing date for tomorrow [Thursday] for the suspect, who said he is from Knoxville, Tenn., and currently stationed at Ft. Bragg, N.C. Bond was set at \$50,000 at his arraignment on armed robbery and murder charges.

After being furnished a description of the suspect by an Amarillo couple who had been

in the bar and a description of the man's vehicle by Mrs. Cornelia Topia, who lives in an apartment behind the bar, New Mexico state patrolmen broadcast a pickup order and Oldham County deputies and highway patrolmen were enroute to set up roadblocks west of Vega when they stopped the suspect's car about four miles west of Vega.

They confiscated a .38 caliber revolver, a .22 caliber automatic pistol and a long-bladed pocketknife from the car, as well as \$100 wadded into the man's pants pocket.

Mrs. Topia, who furnished a description of the car, said she was preparing to go to work about 2 p.m. when she saw Mrs. Leach come out of the back door of the cinder block bar.

She said the front of Mrs. Leach's dress was covered with blood and she had both hands over her upper abdomen. Mrs. Leach reportedly said, "I've been robbed. I'm shot," and then she fell down.

A neighbor said Mrs. Leach "a small lady all crippled up with arthritis, was the kind of lady that would have just

opened up the cash register and told him to help himself.

"She couldn't have done nothing to stop him anyway, she wasn't big enough. If he'd of just asked, she'd of given him everything in that cash register. That's the kind of lady she was."

Mrs. Leach, member of a pioneer ranching family of the area, moved to Glenrio in 1956 from San Jon.

Services for Mrs. Leach were held Friday afternoon in Dougherty-Douglass Funeral Chapel in Tucumcari with Rev. Gene Richardson of Center Street United Methodist Church officiating.

Burial was in the family plot at the San Jon Cemetery.

Other survivors include her husband, Kenneth; a son, Nolan Terrill of Pinetop, Ariz.; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Crenshaw of Melrose; her mother, Mrs. Ollie Lasater of Portales; one brother, M.L. Lasater of Cuervo, N.M.; four other sisters, Mrs. Nola Milsap of Copperas Cove; Mrs. Nannie Hendrix of Sweetwater, Mrs. Louise Nicholas of Kenna, N.M., and Mrs. Minnie Roberts of San Jon; and six grandchildren.

OVER LAST YEAR

Bank Deposits Show Increase

Deposits in First State Bank of Bovina as of June 29 totaled \$4,887,225.18, an increase of \$1,113,747.07 over the same period a year ago.

Total deposits as of June 30, 1972, were \$3,773,478.11.

The June 29 deposits show an approximate \$10,000 increase in deposits from the March 31 figure, which was \$4,876,888.14.

Total assets at the bank were up, also, by one and one-half million dollars from a corresponding time a year earlier.

The total asset figure on the present quarterly statement amounted to \$5,822,171.78, which was a gain of \$1,514,904.68 over the figure of a year earlier, which was \$4,307,267.10.

Loans at the end of last month totaled \$4,053,762.33, up \$1,230,294.29 from the '72 mark of \$2,823,468.04.

The bank's official statement of condition appears in this week's issue of The Blade.

TEN YEARS AGO—JULY 17, 1963

A new street sweeper is the latest addition to City of Bovina's equipment list.

At a city council meeting last week, decision was made to purchase a new Wayne 600 street sweeper from Browning-Ferris Machinery Co. in Lubbock. The present street sweeper owned by the city was traded in on the new one. Difference to be paid by the city is \$10,000.

There is no more indebtedness on Bovina's lighted baseball field.

Final payment on a note which was used as partial payment for the field's construction was made to the bank here, which was charging only three per cent interest for ballpark financing. Mrs. J.W. Harris, who has charge of the concession stand at the field, made the payment plus interest to Alfred Moody, bank cashier.

In fast school board action Tuesday night the resignation of Bobby Phillips, high school principal here last year, was accepted as was that of his wife, who taught a second grade section, and Alan Staley of Eastern New Mexico University at Portales was signed to replace Phillips. Mrs. Staley was elected homemaking instructor for coming year.

Cable TV for Bovina is being studied again. H.K. "Pudge" Kendrick, one of the owners of Friona's cable TV system, met with city commission here at a meeting last week requesting that his company be allowed to survey Bovina in regard to cable TV here.

Otho Hammonds, owner of Hammonds Electric Co. who has been considering constructing a cable TV system here for the past few years, said this week that his plans still were not definite.

Two more vacancies on faculty of Bovina Schools were filled Friday afternoon at a special meeting of board of trustees. Mr. and Mrs. Jay Boothe, who taught last year at O'Donnell, were signed to elementary positions. The remaining vacancies are slated to be filled within the next few weeks.

Elke Steffens, exchange student from Germany, will leave July 19 for Washington, D.C. She will leave August 1 for Europe.

The community's drive to raise \$50,000 for construction of a medical clinic is continuing at a non-spectacular rate, unofficial reports indicate.


The total is now in the neighborhood of \$12,000 to \$14,000, according to publicity-type "thermometers" displayed in public places.



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

Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hawkins of Bovina and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Peace of Friona.



A.M. Harts Celebrate




A NEGLECTED TRUST

We have heard of some complaints expressed recently about paying teenage girls to work in the concession stand at the softball games at Bovina's ballpark.

Those doing the complaining may have a point, but we have a question. Who is willing to work through the softball season? Considering that we are into the third week of the six-week season and we've only had a Lion Clubber in the announcers booth one time, that we are aware of, and no help in keeping the score book, where do you reckon we could get several Lions willing to dispense cokes, make popcorn and sno-cones and clean up afterwards?

There has been a notable absence of Lions at the ballpark during the Lion-sponsored softball games thus far and the season is already half over.

The dangerous Oklahoma Lane crossroads has claimed two other victims as of this weekend.

We wish we had kept a scorecard of accidents and fatalities at that particular intersection just since we moved to this area some 10 years ago.

One gets the impression from the run-around various civic organizations have gotten from the Texas Highway Department in all inquiries and expressions of concern regarding the intersection that the department is slightly more calloused about the loss of life and the destruction of entire families than most residents of the community.

If we remember correctly, the official highway department position is that the highways there are not heavily traveled enough to warrant a flashing light.

Baloney! Traffic on FM 1731 is becoming increasingly heavy with Bovina Feeders and Missouri Beef Packer trucks traveling the highway in ever increasing numbers.

It is difficult to see at the intersection and, particularly at night, the signs are not adequate to warn of a stop ahead. We've heard of more than one stranger in this area claiming that he never saw the stop sign until too late. We will also admit, now, that when we first arrived in Bovina, we ran through the stop sign several times at night before we even realized it was there.

It's a very dangerous, deceiving intersection and it's hoped that residents of the community will make their feelings on the subject known before we lose another life there.

The price of a flashing light shouldn't be placed at a higher value than one, much less more, human lives.

Issues New Cards


Social Security local offices are no longer issuing new social security numbers, according to Carl H. Thompson the manager of the Clovis Social Security office.
