

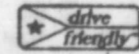
Three blasts do not necessarily indicate that a tornado has been sighted, but they do mean that everyone should watch the clouds and take whatever action seems to be necessary.

18 Year Olds Must Still Register

John Rankin, Chairman of Local Board No. 52, advises all young men that, although inductions into the Armed Forces have ended, they still must register with Selective Service at the age of 18.

A young man may register 30 days before or 30 days after his 18th birthday—but he must register. Failure to do so makes the young man liable to an extreme penalty of five years in prison and \$10,000 fine.

Mr. Rankin urges young men to keep their records clean by timely registration with Selective Service, and added, "If a young man has reached the age of 18 and has not yet registered he should do so as soon as possible."
