READ THE LABEL

Speaking of "Jumens," you'll find that all light bulbs have three ratings on their packaging. Lumens tell you what the light output or performance of the bulb is. "Watts" tell you how much electricity is needed to produce that light, and "bulb life" is the estimated length of time it will take the filament inside the bulb to burn out. When brightness is more important than butb life-for reading, studying or working-choose the "standard" life bulb that gives you the most lumens for its wattage,



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


