## Old Man Winter Makes Return Visit to County

COUNTY—The bitter cold wave that immobilized much of the Midwest and Northeast of the United States, rolled into the area over the weekend leaving a blanket of snow and ice.

Sleet and three inches of snow fell in the county late Saturday night and Sunday morning making driving hazardous as temperatures dipped into the teens. No gas curtailment was issued,

however.

State Department of Highways and Public Transportation crews were kept busy during that time.

The schools in Clyde and Baird were open Monday, but the buses did not run in the morning. Cross Plains schools closed Monday.

Monday, temperatures rose to the upper 40's relieving much of the area's ice and snow cover.

## County Citizens Meet, Discuss Ambulance Problems

COUNTY—Thirty-five to forty interested citizens from Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains met in the Peoples State Bank in Clyde Monday night to discuss the growing concern for ambulance service in Callahan County.

Dr. William Walton, Clyde dentist, served as committee chairman of the meeting.

Mr. McAllister of Abilene, Region 4 Inspector E.M.S. Division of the Texas State Department of Health, was present for the meeting to explain state and federal regulations on ambulance service. State regulations contain the minimum requirements for ambulance service and federal regulations offer guidelines to follow. A county ambulance would have to comply with state regulations.

McAllister estimated the cost per unit to be between \$17,000 to \$22,000 and o-

peration and other expenses would amount to \$128 per day. He outlined how several area towns are handling their ambulance services and related that the operation and maintenance costs of the Colorado City ambulance are split between the city, county and the hospital.

C. Lee Smith, Clyde mayor, expressed the belief that it would almost be impossible for any town in the county to handle the responsibilities of an ambulance.

Jack Scott, mayor of Cross Plains, stated that the city of Cross Plains was given an ambulance by the funeral home, but had no one qualified to operate it.

In conclusion, the committee decided to meet with the county commissioners in their regular meeting February 8 to discuss the possibility of the county accepting responsibility of providing ambulance service.

## Sequestered County Jury Began Hearing Trial Monday

BAIRD—After a week of jury selection, 12 Callahan County residents began hearing evidence at 9 a.m. Monday morning in a case in which a 30-year-old Clyde woman is charged with murder in the alleged beating death of her 2½-year-old adopted daughter.

Jury selection for the trial of Josephine Marie Marks began last Monday, and chosen jurors were then sequestered and moved to the Pioneer Lodge in Baird.

Choosing the 12 jurors was a slow process and many people were required to be at the courthouse from Monday through Friday. Prospective jurors played dominoes and cards to help pass the time.

Finally at 5:30 p.m. Friday, the 12th juror was chosen. The eight man-four

woman jury includes: Maxine Franklin Campbell, Calvin Lynch, Betty Workman Jennings, Gaylon Williams, Pat McKennon, Alfred Lee Hunter and A.H. Ringhoffer, all of Baird; James Ray Switzer of Cross Plains, Darrell Young and Betty Hamilton Farmer, both of Clyde; Kathy McFerrin Caton of Rt. 1 Abilene; and Frank W. Bradshaw of Rt. 2 Abilene.

The case is being heard in 42nd Dist. Court.

Asst. Criminal Dist. Attorneys Patrick Millar and Patricia Elliott of Abilene are prosecuting, assisted by Callahan County Atty. Donald Wilson. Defense attorney Bill Thomas is assisted by Allen Glen of Abilene. Judge Don Lane is presiding.

## Health Clinic Receives Good Community Response

BAIRD—Sixty-five to seventy people visited the free health clinic at the Baird Community Center Monday, Jan. 31. The clinic was sponsored by the Baird Chamber of Commerce, the Housing Authority and the Texas Department of

Health Resources.

People ranging in age from 18 on up received blood pressure screening, diabetic screening, TB skin testing, anemia screening and weight screening.

TB skin test readings will be checked Thursday, Feb. 3, from 1-3 p.m. at the Community Center.

The free health clinic received good community response and may be offered again in the future.

## Radiological Training Feb. 8

BAIRD-Use of radiation detection equipment by emergency personnel will be the subject of three days of Radiological Monitor training beginning February 8, 1977 in Baird under the sponsorship of the Division of Emergency Medical Services of the Texas Department of Health Resources and the city of Baird Civil Defense.

The February 8-10 school will be held in the Central Fire Station in Baird from 7:00-10:00 p.m. Further information may be obtained by contacting Mr. Larry Newton of the Fire Department.

The instructors from the Emergency Medical Services Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources in Austin will be Mr. Barry S. Lister and Mr. Lee Hancock.

This training will assist local officials to develop a monitoring capability to cope with a Nuclear Emergency. Also, use of radioisotopes has increased greatly in Texas, and the risks of an accident involving transportation or use of these substances also has increased, strengthening the need for emergency personnel trained in using monitoring devices.

It spots 330 feet from the south and 3,028 feet from the west lines of Section 78, BBB&C Survey.

C.B. Urban of Abilene will drill No. 2 Robert L. Dugan in the regular field four miles north of Clyde on an 80-acre lease.

Having a proposed depth of 1,990 feet, it spots 150 feet from the north and 1,270 feet from the west lines of Section 72, BBB&C Survey.

Staked in the regular field six miles north of Baird was Lewis Production Co. Inc. of Abilene No. 8-A Jackson Estate.

The planned 950-foot venture is on a 140-acre lease.

It spots 1,134 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of Section 15, ETRR Survey.

Another regular field project was staked two miles southeast of Putnam as H.L. Cavender of Snyder No. 5 J.T. Davis Estate.

Slated for 480 feet, it spots 450 feet from the south and 1,770 feet from the west lines of Section 4, BOH Survey.

The lease is composed of 22 acres.

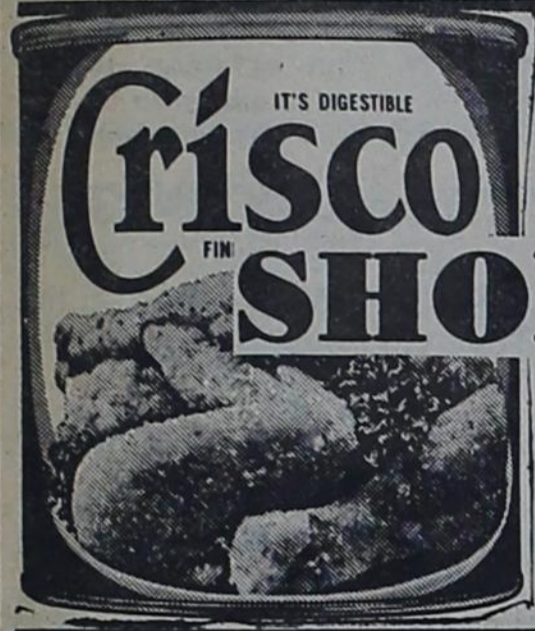

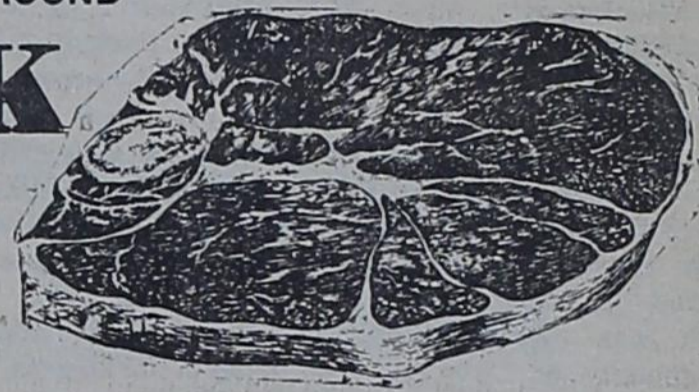

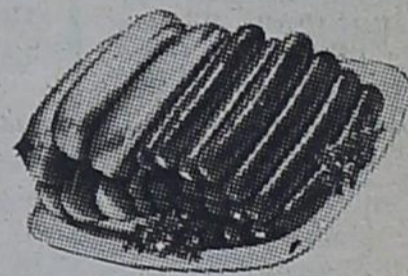

## Adaptible Fruits Help Production

COUNTY — Gardeners planting fruit and nut trees with little attention as to their adaptability are in for a rude awakening, says Greg Gerngross county Extension agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most beginning gardeners want the fruit trees that produce what they see in the supermarket. The common fruits and nuts found on grocery shelves are grown elsewhere and are not suited to Texas climates.

Concord grapes, Bartlett pears, Elberta peaches and the Stuart pecan are examples of crops not suited to Texas weather, explains Gerngross. Northern varieties of apples, cherries and peaches require a certain number of "chilling hours" (hours below 45 degrees F.) before they bloom in the spring. Temperatures even in Northern Texas do not come close to supplying the chilling requirements of these northern varieties.

Many other varieties of fruits are more susceptible to diseases in the humid, temperate areas of Texas. The Bartlett pear is often afflicted with "fire light," and the Concord and Thompson Seedless grapes are killed by Pier-

ce's Disease.

Fruits and nuts that are adaptable to the whole state include Orient and Keiffer pears, Eureka, Hachiya, Tane-Nashi and Tamopan Japanese persimmons, Methley and Bruce plums, Mohawk and Cheyenne pecans, Broad-viv walnuts, Black Spanish and Champanel grapes Brazos and Comanche blackberries, and Celeste and Texas Everbearing figs, adds Gerngross.

Certain other varieties are adapted to particular areas of the state, including varieties of apples, peaches, sour cherries, apricots, blueberries, strawberries, muscadines and citrus.

The agent suggests that anyone interested in planting fruit and nut trees contact the county Extension office for additional details on adapted varieties.

### APPENDIX A

#### Statement of Nondiscrimination

Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations.
