Leader Sold

Last week's issue of the Donley County Leader announces the sale of the Leader by Mr and Mrs G. W. Estlack to Dean and Cindy Singleton, publishers of the Clarendon Press.

Mr. Estlack has been connected with the Leader since its beginning in 1929, and both he and his wife, Ruby Dell, have worked on the paper since their marriage in 1936.

Effective date of the sale was Dec. 1. Under the terms of sale the Estlacks will take over all commercial printing equipment of the Press and will operate the Clarendon Office Supply and Printing in the present Leader location.

The Press will be issued on Thursday and the Leader on Sunday making the new publication a semi-weekly.

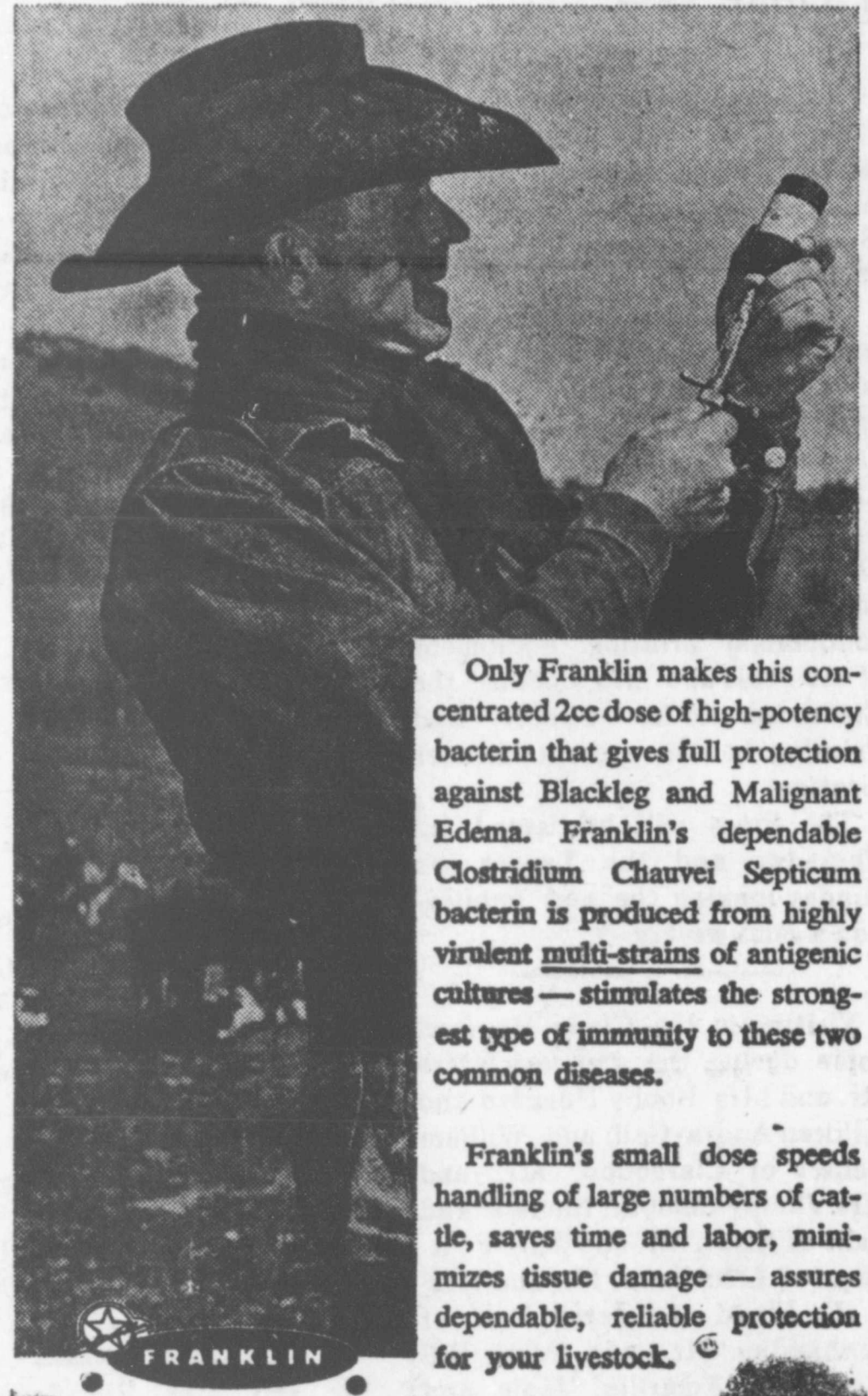
