FFA News

The Hedley and Quail FFA chapters were well represented at the regional judging in Lubbock on April 19. A total of 20 boys participated in the judging.

The Hedley dairy foods and milk quality team placed 4th in the Tech contest and 3rd in Area I. Four teams in this contest are allowed to go to state judging at Texas A & M on April 26. Therefore Hedley qualified this team. Members of the team were John Lemley, placing 9th in individual competition, Stuart Messer, Bryan Hill, and Randy Shaw alternate.

The livestock team of Jimmy Stewart, Bob White and Michael Darnell won first in the beef cattle judging division of the contest. The contest is composed of swine, sheep, and beef cattle judging and grading. This was a very fine showing as over 100 schools were in competition in this contest. In the beef cattle judging Jimmy made a perfect score of 100, Bob made a score of 97, and Michael made 92.

The dairy cattle team participated and members of this team were Jess Freeman, Billy Talley and Phillip Wiggins. Results of Greenbelt competition will be posted later.

The Quail dairy foods team placed 9th and members of this were Brian Barton, David Russell and Johnny Needham.
