A majority of Hedley people are cooperating with the city trash hauling, but a few are still not putting their trash in sacks or small containers as is necessary.

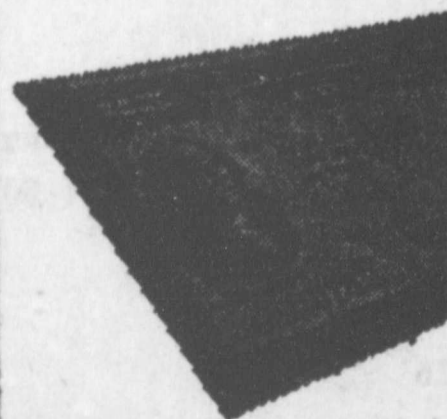
Please put your crushable trash in small sacks or containers which can be handled by one man, and do not include garbage or burnable material in it. Your cooperation would be appreciated.

Free Lunch Program

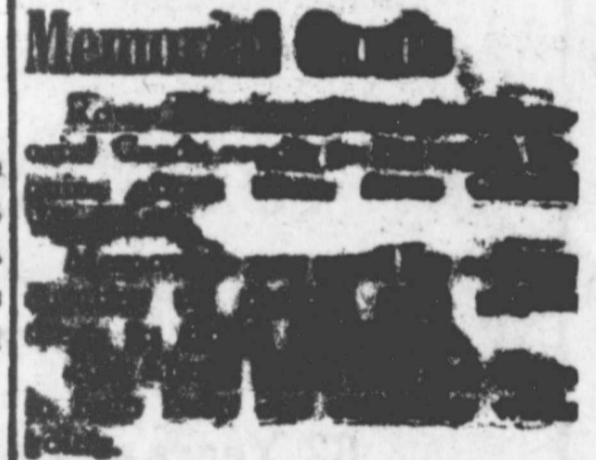
The Hedley school is still working on the program for free lunches. Parents, if you feel you might be eligible for free lunches, please contact Mr. Freeman.
