
#### A COWBOY'S CHRISTMAS FEELIN'S.....



# GenTel Telephone **Directory Issued**

New telephone directories for 1976 were distributed through the mail the past two weeks by General Telephone Company to its patrons in Bovina and the surrounding area.

Included in the new directory are listings for Bovina, Friona, Earth, Muleshoe, Olton and Springlake in the GenTel system. Also included are the Hub, Tharp and Parmer exchanges of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc., and the Lariat, Lazbuddie and Needmore exchanges of the Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

The attractive cover of the '76 directory has a bicentennial theme. The painting is the work of the noted American artist Stevan Dohanos, who is represented in many leading galleries and collections. Dohanos is also widely known for his illustrations in numberous publications portraying contemporary American life.

The cover painting depicts the first American flag which the

Continental Congress created June 14, 1977. Because the resolution did not specify an aggangement for the stars, there were many variations in the flags that followed. Historians, however, are in general agreement that the flag depicted on the directory cover represents the first national flag of our Republic, and thus it symbolizes the observance of the nation's 200th birthday.

Because towns are listed alphabetically, Bovina is the first listing in the directory.

The new edition has 450 listings in Bovina, an increase of 10 over last year's total of 440. The number of listings does not include multiple phone numbers for some of the business firms and organizations in



My philosophy has been that, regardless of the circumstances, I shall not be vanquished, but will try to be happy. Life is not easy for any one of us. But it is a continual challenge, and it is up to us to be cheerful--and to be strong, so that those who depend on us may draw strength from our example..."

The above quote could have been from St. Paul or St. Francis of Assissi or Winston Churchill or maybe Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Nevertheless it came from that indomitable Irishwoman, the matriarch of the Boston Kennedys, Rose Kennedy.

While I never particularly cared for the political format of the Kennedy sons, there is no question as to where the former President of the United States and his brothers got their strength and charisma.

To people like Rose Kennedy, simply overcoming in this life is not enough--it is important that one be cheerful, be happy. Oddly enough, happiness is the most sought after and least attained goal of life.

Even in a small town the size of Quanah, the pressures of life, of attaining and sustaining, of getting and keeping, wear through the thin veneer of the frail human psyche.

Young people have more spending money, cars, clothes, and opportunities than ever in history yet we see them as sad, depressed and bored. Their parents are little better off-both work to sustain the standard of living they feel they must have, little time for leisure, for doing things together, for sharing or caring.

The rural towns of America such as Quanah have been the last bastion of casual living. Yet we see people in air conditioned homes, locking their homes and cars like their city cousins do, indifferent to community events that used to command their attention and devotion, indifferent to trashy streets, fearful of young people who flaunt their disrespect at vested authority and displaying the same social syndrome that affects residents of the metroplexes.

Most of us who inhabit the small towns of America do so decidedly by choice. We covet the relaxed life style. We want our neighbors to be interested, concerned--even nosey about us. We like the coffee breaks with our friends, the chat across the back yard fence, the fellowship time at church and the two minute ride to work.

Nothing wrong with small town life that constant fixed vigilance can't cure. However, we do need Rose Kennedy's philosophy. We do need her spirit, the challenge to be strong, but happy. Every ingredient for a successful, happy life can be found in the community in which we live

We remember the mother of Quanah author Winston Estes as a Rose Kennedy type. Mrs. Estes was like the person she often described thusly: "She could be happy with her feet in the fire."

#### Mahon Urges President To Veto

Congressman George Mahon met on December 16 with the President, at which time he urged the President to veto the Energy Conservation and Oil Policy Act of 1975. Mahon joined with nineteen Texas Members of the House of Representatives in opposing the final version of the controversial and long-debated bill, which had been earlier agreed upon by the Senate and House conferees and which passed the House December 15 by a vote of 236 to 160. Action by the Senate is expected

Mahon said that enactment of the bill would be a disater. "If the bill becomes the law, the American consumer will be the big loser because the measure would stifle incentive for increased exploration and production and make the nation increasingly dependent upon high-priced imported oil," said the Congressman.

"The measure has some good provisions, but the roll-back provisions would prove to be disastrous," he continued.

Nazareth was led by K. Acker with 10 points. The visitors were charged


with eight fouls and converted on six of 13 free throws.



An injunction to prevent testimony of strong opposithe USDA from imposing its threat to embargo of Texas breeding cattle was brought into federal district court in Austin by the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association Friday.

The suit, naming as defendents Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz, APHIS Administrator F.J. Mulhern, and Deputy Administrator J.M. Hejl, and Paul Becton, in charge of Brucellosis for APHIS, seeks to obtain an injunction restraining the order to cut off federal brucellosis funds as well as to implement the embargo, according to TSCRA President Hilmar G. Moore.

The suit charges that the USDA has failed to meet requirements in not filing an environmental impact statement on the proposed embargo with the Environmental Protection Agency. Such a statement, required by law, entails a lengthy review and a hearing with an eventual ruling by the courts.





#### 7 Accidents Occurred In Parmer County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of November, 1975, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and nine persons

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 11 months of 1975 shows a total of 125 accidents resulting in one person killed and 74 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for November, 1975, shows a total of 530 accidents resulting in 14 persons killed and 258 persons injured, as compared to November, 1974 with 497 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 229 persons injured. This was 33 more accidents, four more killed, and 29 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths for the month of November, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Two each in Swisher and Wilbarger; and one each in Clay, Crosby, Lubbock, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wichita, Hutchinson, Oldham and Wheeler.







# 1975 -- Crises In Agriculture Main Theme

# Old Year To Become History Next Week

By LOU NUTTALL Editor, Bovina Blade

The year 1975 may be remembered in this agriculture-oriented community as one in which farmers had to cope with one crisis after another-including a depressed market in most instances, in spite of better than average yields for most crops with the exception of cotton, increased operating expenses, adverse weather which seemed to strike at odd times, and the natural gas crisis which for a time threatened to put a number of farmers out of business.

In spite of all that, Parmer County remained one of the top five counties in the state in production of corn, milo and cattle--perhaps a testimony to the stamina of farmers.

With the United States launching its bicentennial celebration this year, Bovina was designated an official bicentennial community and plans were made to begin a museum and construct a new city park as part of its bicentennial program.

Several residents of community brought Bovina's name into the state and national spotlight for a variety of reasons.

Tammy Christian became the first



"Miss Bovina" and was one of the 10 semi-finalists, as well as being named "Miss Congenialty", in the 1975 Wheatheart of the Nation Contest at Perryton, Ted Stallings was one of the top pilots, as well as the youngest, in a national aerobatics competition in Wisconsin

the Bull Town Days air show.

Sonny Jones, Tony Neal and Joe Smith qualified for the national finials in Feedlot Roping Contests in Neveda for the second consecutive year. Lee Hicks, former manager and part-owner of Bovina Feeders, Inc., was named Commercial Feeder of the Year at a national convention in Las Vegas, Nev. "Crazy Frills," a thoroughbred owned by C. E. Trimble of Bovina, won a number of races at tracks in New Mexico, including the Gay Dalton Sweepstakes at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque, the Sunland Thoroughbred Futurity and second in the big Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

Pat Shepherd, only a freshman at Bovina High School last year, represented the Bovina Fillies at the state track meet in Austin, bringing home a third and sixth place in the Class A shot and discus.

Several civic organizations in Bovina received state and national recognition for their work this past year. Bovina's Young Homemakers was named the top new chapter in Area I, which covers a 38-county area; Bovina's Jaycees received state and national recognition for being the first chapter to ever quadruple its membership in the first year; and Bovina's Little Dribbler teams, sponsored by the Jaycees, won regional and advanced to the state tournament for the first time ever. 



He reached down into a saddle bag. The pint bottle was frigid, the contents almost syrupy. Warmth of lips and gullet thawed the firey







Shiny, plump cranberries add sparkle to holiday celebrations as ingredients in punch, turkey stuffing,

fruit salads and desserts. Americans have loved cranberries since the first Thanksgiving feast when Indians gave the bright red berries to the Pilgrims.

Cranberries, when harvested during fall and winter, are readily available all year frozen, canned, in jellies, whole or in juice form with or without added

Recipes for many festive cranberry desserts are available in my "Christmas Time at Home" (B-254) bulletin, for 35 cents, from my office in the court house in Farwell.

**Cranberry Crunch** 1 cup uncooked rolled oats 1/2 cup flour

1 cup brown sugar 1/2 cup butter or margarine 2 cups cranberry sauce (whole or jelled)

sugar. Cut in butter or margarine until crumbly. Place half of this mixture in an 8-inch greased cake pan. gallon. Cover with cranberry sauce. Top with remainder of mixture. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees F. Serve hot in squares topped with scoops of vanilla ice cream. Serves

Hot'n Spicy Cranberry

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon allspice 3 tablespoons tea 21/2 cups boiling water I pound can clear cranberry

11/2 cups water 3/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup orange juice 4 cup lemon juice

Tie nutmeg, cinnamon, bag. Put into 21/2 cups boiling water. Cover and water. Remove spice bag from steeped tea. Add

sugar, hot cranberry liquid, orange and lemon juice. Serve hot. Serves 8 to 10.

Cranberry Eggnog 4 cups cranberries 4 cups water 3/4 cup sugar

6eggs 1 pint heavy cream ground cloves

Cook cranberries in water until skins pop open. Strain and chill. Separate eggs, beat yolks until frothy; add 1/2 cup of sugar and beat until smooth and shiny. Fold yolks into whites; pour in cream and juice. Mix well. Sprinkle with cloves if

desired. Serves 8 to 10. Lemonade-Cranberry Punch 4pints cranberry juice

46 ounce cans frozen lemonade concentrate 1/2 teaspoon salt cinnamon sticks 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon allspice 4 cups water

Combine ingredients and Mix oats, flour and brown simmer gently for 15 minutes. Pour into punch bowl and serve in mugs with cinnamon sticks. Yield: 1

Cranberry Salad 1 quart cranberries 1½ cups sugar 2 tablespoons granulated

gelatin 1 cup diced, unpeeled apples ½ cup orange juice 1 cup finely chopped celery l cup chopped nuts

Grind cranberries, using fine blade; add sugar, mix and let stand for at least 1 hour stirring occasionally. Soften the gelatin in the orange juice for 5 minutes; then stir over hot water until dissolved. Mix gelatin mixture with cranberries, celery, apples and nuts. (Miniature marshmallows also can be added). Place ingredients in individual molds or flat dish, which have been rinsed in cold water. Chill in refrigerator until set. Unmold (or in dish cut in squares) and serve on crisp lettuce leaf, with

mayonnaise (if desired).

Cranberry Quick Bread

2 cups flour l teaspoon baking soda l teaspoon salt 34 cup sugar

legg 1 cup halves or coarsley chopped raw cranberries 1-3 cup orange juice 3 tablespoons white vinegar

plus water to make 2-3 cup. 1 teaspoon grated orange

1/4 cup melted shortening 1 cup chopped nuts

Sift together flour, soda, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Beat eggs; add liquids, orange rind and melted shortening. Add all at once to flour mixture; stir until flour is just dampened. Add cranberries and nuts; stir just enough to blend well. Turn into greased 83/4 inch by 41/2 inch by 21/2 inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 60 to 70 minutes. Remove from pan; cool several hours or overnight before slicing.





Freshness of shelled nuts can be judged by looking at the appearance of the kernel. Plump, meaty kernels mean full flavor and richness. Fresh kernels of fine quality will snap when broken. They will have a crisp, fresh taste. If the kernel is rubbery this indicates staleness, high moisture content and probably rancidity.

The inside of the kernel should be clean, white and clear. A dingy gray color means oiliness and possible rancidity.

It is easy to store nuts, but here are some suggestions to help keep them fresh. Nuts in the shell keep better than the shelled nuts. If nuts are to be kept over a

long period of time, it might be wise to buy and store them in the shell and crack as needed. Nuts contain a high percentage of fat which will become rancid when stored at room temperature or in

the light. The nuts should be kept in the refrigerator between 32 and 40 degrees F. It's best to store the nuts in the main section of the refrigerator rather than in the moist air section where the vegetables are kept. Since air also hastens the

onset of spoilage it is best to avoid opening vacuumpacked containers long before the nuts are to be used. It's also good to remember that salted nuts do not store as well as unsalted ones, since salt encourages the onset of rancidity.

Nuts add a delicious touch to main dishes, salads, desserts and relishes. Christmas cookies depend on nuts for their special goodness. Nuts are also wonderful for snacks. A full nut bowl adds a warm touch to a living room or a family room. Nuts can also be used in many creative ways on wreaths and with greens.

Holiday snacks have to be "made with care" for diabetics and people on calorie-restricted diets, according to an Extension foods and nutrition specialist, who is a registered dietitian.

This is because food plays a major part in controlling metabolic disorders such as diabetes, commonly called "sugar diabetes." Too many carbohydrates, starches and sugars are bad for diabetes because their bodies don't produce enough insulin to counteract the effects of these types of

She suggested that diabetics can eat fresh fruits or unsweetened canned fruits--a baked apple sweetened with artificial sweetener, cinnamon and dietetic lemon-lime soft drink makes a festive dessert.

"Another holiday treat--pumpkin custard--can be made of unsweetened cooked pumpkin combined with artificial sweetener, cinnamon, ginger and saccharin. This baked custard would be counted as a B vegetable or half slice of bread.

Plain or dietetic gelatins can be prepared with or without fruits for many desserts. Try combining gelatin with low-calorie cranberry juice, artificial sweetener and orange rind. Pour into orange shells and refrigerate. If fruit is added to the gelatin, count the fruit as the fruit exchange for that meal, she said.

"Many diabetics are unaware that they can eat regular ice cream--in limited amounts--in place of a slice of bread and two fat exchanges. "Avoid diabetic candy and ice cream because they may be high in fat and extremely expensive. Also, the labels may be confusing.

"If diabetic ice creams are used, they must be calculated into the diet. Dietetic soft drinks are allowed and can be used to flavor desserts or even in baking a candied holiday ham," she said.


