

LESS THAN TWO weeks remain before voters will go to the polls to elect their president for the next four years. According to much of what we read, it appears that even this close to the election, a number of voters have not made up their minds as to who they will vote for.

Just prior to and immediately following the Democratic National Convention, Jimmy Carter was the "shooting star" in the political arena, and it appeared that President Ford would have little chance of catching this newcomer.

That was before Carter had made a stand on many subjects, and before he had undergone the

pressures of a national campaign. The former Georgia Governor has made some statements, had some endorsements, and granted the infamous interview with Playboy Magazine, and these actions have probably cost him votes in some quarters.

However, an opinion that we read this week seemed to believe that Carter was the victor in the second of the three debates, and that he had begun to beat back the advances made by President Ford in recent weeks.

So, it appears that the race may well go right down to the wire, and that the early indication that Carter might win in a breeze will have been washed away to the extent that the race might turn out to be a real toss-up.

+ + + +**ORIGINALLY**, Bovina voters had only had the presidential race, and the U.S. Senate and Congressional race to contend with for 1976.

But due to the death of Wilbur Charles, who was in the middle of his term as Justice of the Peace, a special election had to be called, since Charles' unexpired term had more than two years to run.

This will make for two contested races within the county, as the Friona precinct has a Democratic and Republican candidate vying in the commissioner's race.

In the U.S. Congressional race, longtime representative George Mahon has an opponent for the first time since 1946 in former Odessa Mayor Jim Reese. And in the Senate race, Lloyd Bentsen is opposed by Alan Steelman.

Various of the other statewide offices are contested this November. So--Texas is slowly becoming a two-party state. It is taking a while, but the age old custom of winning your office in the Democratic primary and then winning the general election as a formality is beginning to change.

And this is good for politics. People change--even your elected officials. Sometimes we have voted to nominate a person in the primary, and by the time the general election rolled around, we were completely against the person. With a two-party system, you can have two shots at an individual in a case such as this.



Committee **Named** For Jim Reese

A committee for the election of Jim Reese for Congress has been named by Jimmy Briggs, chairman. The members are: Jack Hamil, Peggy Hamil, Frank Hinkson, John Getz, Vernon Estes, Linda Marshall, and Lee Stevenson.

Jim Reese is an outstanding young man, and his political philosophy is most conservative. He says, "When I am elected, I will work to get the government off our backs and out of our pockets! I will vote to cut back the number of Washington bureaucrats who are burying us in a sea of rules, regulations, and red tape." George Mahon, his opponent, has been in Washington 42 of his 76 years, and a recent study made by the Americans for Constitutional Action shows that Mr. Mahon no longer thinks or votes as a West Texan, Reese says. His study shows Mahon has voted as follows: 57 per cent of the time against a sound dollar; 65 per cent of the time against a private market and individual freedom of choice and for government price fixing and controls; 50 per cent of the time against private ownership and for government ownership; 49 per cent of the time against a strong national defense. "We believe the political philosophy and beliefs of Jim Reese (see pd. ad. this issue) are more that of the West Texan than those of his opponent," said Briggs.

## **Yields** Termed "Favorable"

Blessed with good weather, the corn harvest in the Bovina area has progressed at a steady clip, and at press time this week, the harvest was well past its peak, and was on the downhill grade.

Long lines formed at the local elevators during the past week, as the elevators attempted to keep pace with the harvest work.

"It is hard to say exactly what percentage of the crop is harvested, but we are 'way over half through," said Earl Whitten at Sherley Grain Tuesday.

A number of farmers have finished up as of press time this week, or would finish up in short order.

Whitten said that the yields, overall, were in line with what the farmers were hoping for. "There have been some good yields, some real outstanding yields, and some just fair," he said.

The price of corn has been fairly stable this week, holding at around \$4.13 per cwt. Most farmers would like a better price, and are not selling their crop for the most part. A spokesman for Bovina Wheat Growers agreed with the estimate

that the crop was considerably on the downhill side of the harvest run. Many empty fields are evident, and some have only a little corn left.

The harvest of the area's milo crop has not gotten underway to a large extent, but it will be a short harvest. One source said he doubted that five per cent of the area's grain crop was planted to milo this year. Except for minor delays, the harvest has gone without incident.

Last Friday morning the harvest was interrupted when the area received around a half-inch of rain.

#### NOTICE OF HEARING BEFORE THE TEXAS WATER RIGHTS COMMISSION OF AN APPLICATION TO APPROPRIATE PUBLIC WATERS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS. NO. 3669

Notice is given that MILBURN T. CASH, Star Route, Bovina, Texas 79009, applicant, seeks a permit to maintain an existing on-channel dam and reservoir on Catfish Draw, tributary Running Water Draw, tributary White River, tributary Salt Fork Brazos River, tributary Brazos River, Brazos River Basin, and impound therein not to exceed 3 acre-feet of water and to divert and use not to exceed 30 acre-feet of water per annum from the reservoir which will capture and retain for reuse the tailwaters produced by groundwater irrigation from permittee's water systems to irrigate 33 acres of land of applicant's property in the Abner Taylor Survey, Abstract No. 41, Parmer County, 13 miles N of Farwell, Texas.

The dam is located in the aforesaid survey, and the midpoint on the centerline of the dam at the stream is 7,390 feet NW of the SE corner of the said survey. Diversion

will be from the perimeter of the reservoir by means of one floating pump with a maximum diversion rate of 450 gpm (1.0 cfs), all being more fully set out in the application. Application No. 3669 was accepted for filing pursuant to S5.141, Texas Water Code, by the Texas Water **Rights Commission on September** 27, 1976, and a hearing thereon will be held by the Commission in the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building at 1700 N. 





