Farm and Ranch Accident Study

A Texas Farm and Ranch Accident Study has been initiated to obtain the best possible information on the nature and extent of farm and ranch accidents. The goal is to use this information to develop safety education programs to halt the mounting accidents that claim more than 200 lives and cause more than 4,000 disabling injuries in the state each year, says an agricultural safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The study will involve 42 counties, with some 7,000 farm and ranch families being interviewed by about 700 neighbor volunteers.

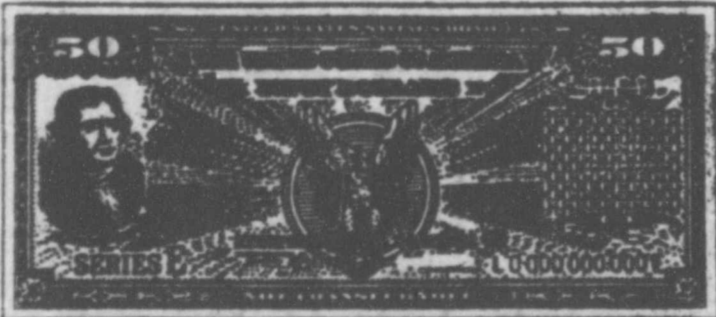
