To Tell When a Car Is Loaded.

A device that will enable a railroad employe to determine when a car is loaded consistent with safety or with economical wear has been a "long felt want" in railroad circles. An apparatus has been invented to supply this demand, and owing to its simplicity it is likely to come into general favor. The device consists of two distinct parts, the upper part being attached to the truck, above the spring on the side of the car, while the other part is fixed below the white.
