

### Deaf Mutes Have a Fascination for Walk-ing on Railroad Tracks.

"This one makes twenty two deaf rsons that I have a record of who have been killed on railroad tracks since 1874," an old Erie locomotive engineer said after reading the account of Homer J. Higbee, a deaf mute, being run over and killed while walking on the railroad track at Olean. "Deaf people, and especially deaf mutes, seem to have a fascination for walking on railroad tracks, and they invariably walk on the track on which trains are running in the same direction they are from the coffee mountains or the adjawalking.
