So why are we sending the children back to school before the Dog Days of Summer are over? Shouldn't we treat them better than we do our dogs? There isn't any research to show that there are educational benefits to starting school before Labor Day. 86 percent of Texans are in favor of a traditional school starting date anytime between the last week in August

and two weeks after Labor Day. I'm not complaining about the 180 days the youngsters must attend, but why should there be so many holidays, breaks and other disruptions during the school year?

In August, the playgrounds and play equipment are almost too hot to play on. The temperatures inside those unairconditioned school buses on the afternoon ride home can easily register over 100 degrees. 
Mustangs August 31
