Alaska's Glaciers.

Mr. H. F. Reed, in his public lecture on "Glacier Bay, Alaska," says that Glacier bay is the most accessible region in which to see large tidewater glaciers. There are eight glaciers which discharge bergs into its waters. The largest of these is Muir glacier, which drains an area of about 800 square miles. It is moving with a maximum velocity of about seven feet a day and is continually discharging large icebergs from its end. Its fluctuations have been great within recent times. One or two hundred years ago it extended, in common with the other glaciers of the bay, 20 miles below its present ending, and not long before that the glaciers were so small that valleys now barren and bleak were occupied by large forests.



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
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
