its discretion, to retire such judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct upon recommendation of the commission created.

Number Nine -- would allow Legislature to set annual salary of Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House. They now receive the same pay as legislators. The proposal sets the per diem allowances for legislatures at \$40 per day for the first 140 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session. At present, legislators are paid a per diem of \$25 per day for the first 120 days only of each regular session. A second part of the amendment deals with vacancies in the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

Number Ten -- would increase the terms of office of members of the House of Representatives to four years. The terms would be overlapping with

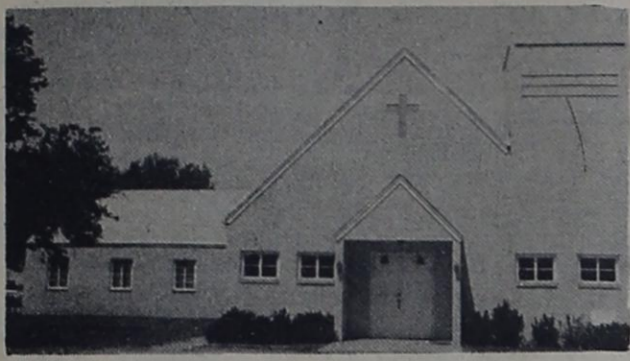

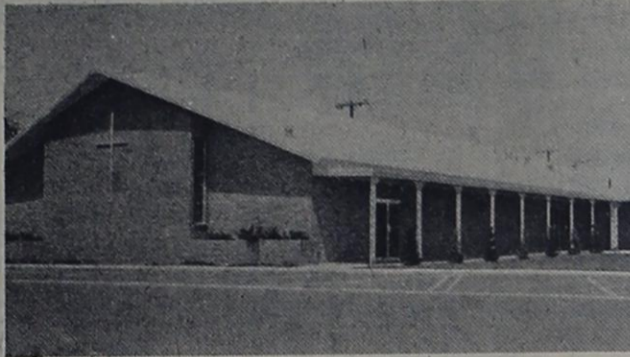

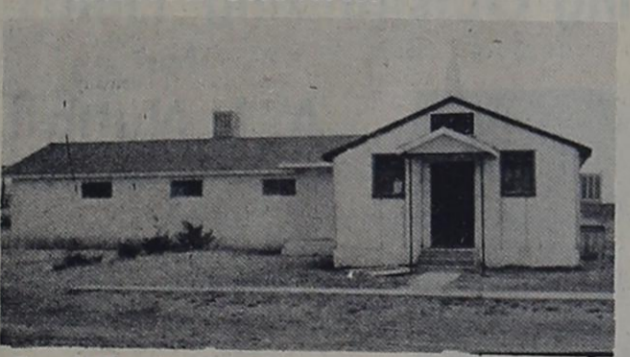

This Week's DEVOTIONAL

Read Luke 7:36-50

Thy Faith Hath Saved Thee

And He said to the woman, Thy faith hath saved thee; go in peace. Luke 7:50

We speak a great deal about faith. In our church services and in our Bible classes, at baptisms and at Communion, in our liturgy and in our church music, we speak about this Christian faith.

We often call Christians "the believers" or "the faithful." These are significant terms. By these words one can recognize the chief characteristic of the Christian.

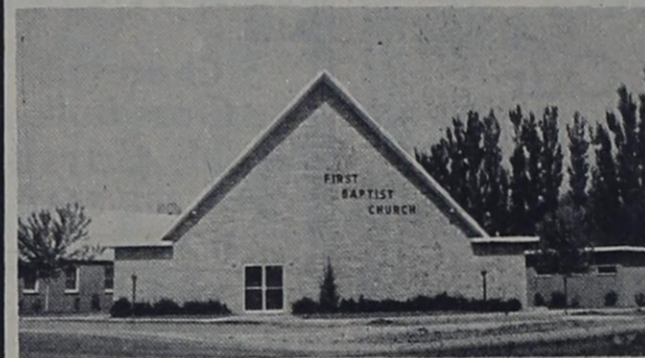
What is faith? The writer of the Epistle to the Hebrews answers, "Faith is . . . the evidence of things not seen." Faith helps us "to see" things which lie beyond the boundaries of our five senses and reasoning powers. Faith enables us "to see" such invisible realities as God, Savior, grace, forgiveness, eternal life. Faith means trusting implicitly in God and in His promises. Faith means taking God at His word. Faith means accepting as true whatever God tells us in His Word.

The Christian faith accomplishes the seemingly impossible for us. In the Bible narrative about the woman in Simon's house we see the power of faith. Faith brings to us the blessings of God. Above all, faith in Jesus gives us the greatest prize, life eternal.

How can we obtain a stronger faith, a faith that pleases God and brings us His blessings? Pray with the apostles, "Lord, increase our faith."

Gracious God, bestow upon us a larger measure of faith in Thy Son and in Thy Word. Amen.

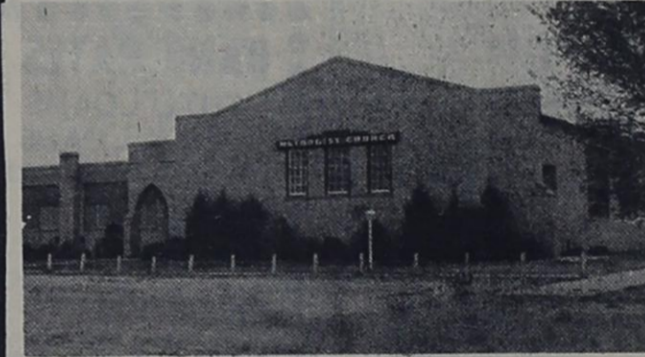

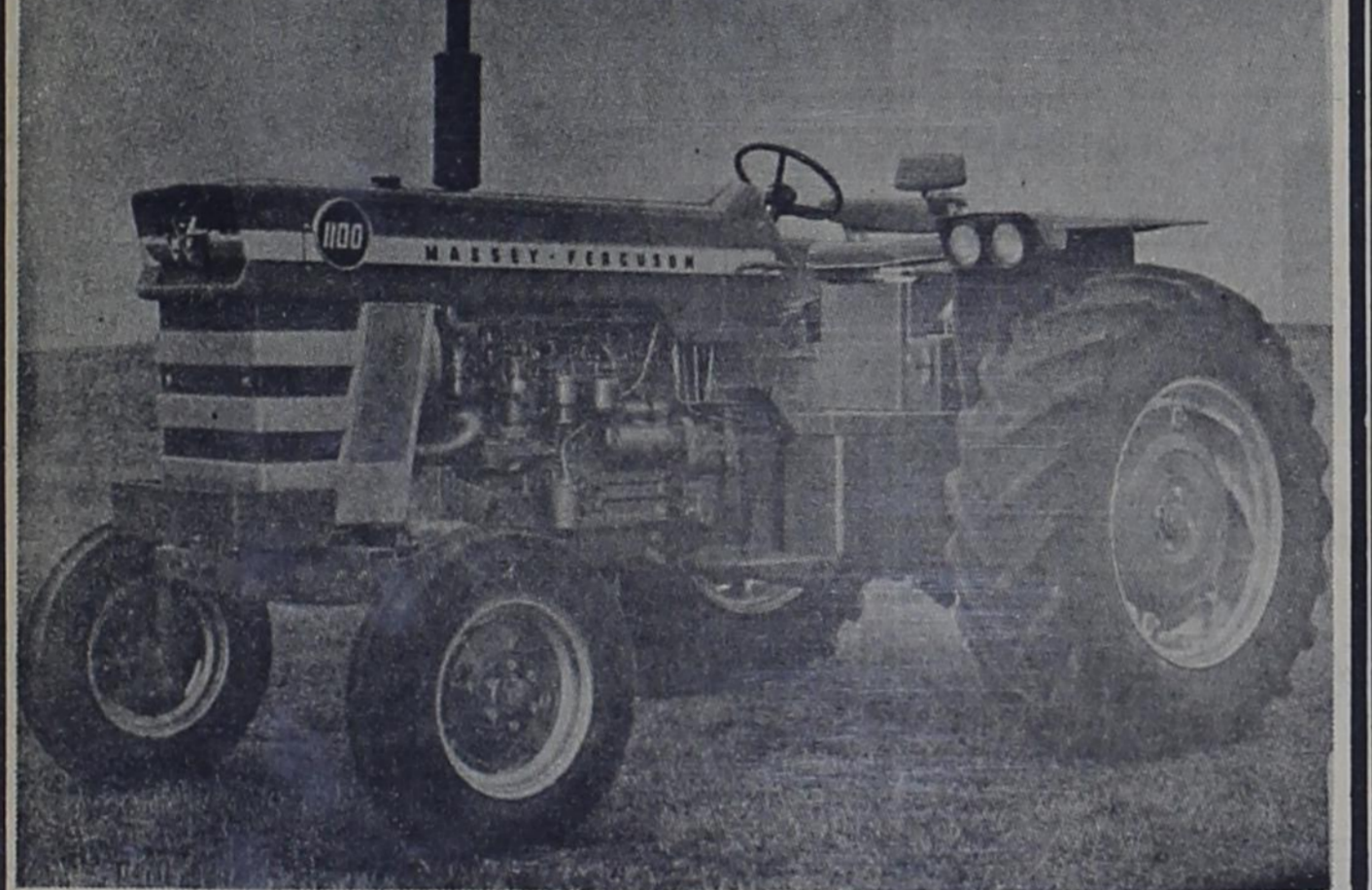

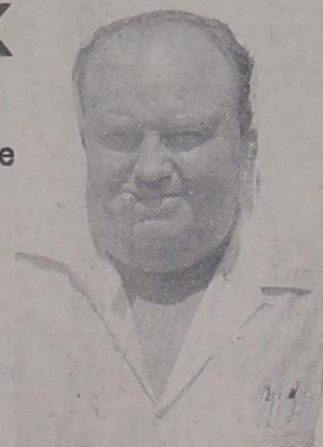

The win for the Ponies was easy enough, but they didn't show complete dominance in the game as some fans had felt they would against the host team which is now winless in seven games.

The tilt was played before a sparse crowd which had Bovina fans outnumbering the home-owners. The weather was ideal, not cold with little wind.

By downing Hart, the charges of Coach Roy Stone swelled the district mark to 3-0. For the season, they are now 4-3.

The Mustangs scored at least one TD in each quarter for the one-sided win. They rolled up their highest total yardage of the year in so doing -- 399. That figure would have, no doubt, been higher had not the second unit taken over in the fourth period. The reserves were able to hold their own against the Longhorns.

Bovina's first score came late in the first period. Halfback Scotty Rundell scored it from one yard out and then carried over the frosting for the cake -- two extra points -- to make the scoreboard read 8-0.

The scoring drive originated on Bovina's own 28-yard line as a brief Hart drive was halted

there by a recovered fumble. Early in the march, Rundell scampered 65 to the goal line, but the effort was nullified by a penalty. Rundell set up the touchdown eventually with a 29-yard gallop from the 33 for a first down on the Hart four yard line.

The second score came early in the second stanza. It was climaxed by a seven yard scoring effort by Sophomore Fullback Carl Harris. Halfback Dean Stanberry did the bulk of the work in the leather-toting department. He made some 30 yards on the ground and took a 25-yard pass from Quarterback Jerry Roach as well.

Roman Ramirez kicked the extra point to make the score read 25-0.

Stanberry got the third TD on a one-yard plunge after the Ponies got possession of the ball on downs on the Hart 29. The score came six plays later.

Still full of fight in spite of the score which was now getting out of hand against them, the Longhorns blocked Ramirez' kick to leave it 21-0.

Bovina's fourth score came with 3:25 remaining in the third period. Harris scored from one yard out. A Roach-to-Rundell pass tacked on the double extra

points to boost the score from 27-0 to 29-0.

In the fourth quarter, with 5:21 showing on the clock, Stanberry ran for the final touchdown from seven yards away. Ramirez' kick was again blocked and the scoring was finished at 35-0.

The Mustangs' passing attack showed tremendous improvement in the tilt. They had, in their previous six games, made only token efforts in the aerial department. With Rundell completing one and Roach five tosses, a total of 101 yards were made in the airways during the game.

This was the first game played by the Bovina team since notification was received that they would compete in Class A next year instead of the present Class B.

Eventhough the Mustangs took a 35-0 win over Hart, the coach said about that game, "We were down and didn't play well." The Mustangs were penalized 125 yards in the game.

Last year, the Mustangs downed Nazareth, 32-16, on their way to the district championship.

This will be the eighth regularly-scheduled game of the season for the Ponies. After this week's game, they have Lazbuddie and Vega remaining. Vega whipped Happy, 34-0, last week. This was a larger margin than Bovina's 21-6 decision over the Cowboys. The Vega-Happy game established Vega as the solid district favorite.

Physically, the Bovina team came out of the Hart game in good shape and the same starting line-up is expected to go against Nazareth this week.
