HERE IS A BIT OF NEWS that probably will not be received with open arms by the Kodak Corporation. According to a national magazine, the Sony Corporation has announced the development of the first filmless camera.

Yep, you read it right the first time. We said FILMLESS.

If a camera doesn't use film, then pray tell, what does it use? Especially if you are a stockholder in Kodak, and even if you're not, you deserve an explanation. We'll try to give you one.

Sony officials say that their new camera will electronically record images on magnetic discs for viewing through a television set.

Users of the camera will insert a cassette into the back of the camera, aim at the subject and push a button. Light passes through the shutter to a special semi-conductor chip that converts it into thousands of electric impulses which are recorded on a small magnetized disc inside the cassette.

The cassette can then be removed from the camera and popped into a special adapter which is hooked into a television set. The adapter is programmed to reconvert the recorded impulses on the disc into pictures which are shown on the TV screen.

The company also plans to develop a printer, which will produce hard-copy photographs upon command from the adapter.

People owning video recorders could use the system to record several pictures into an "album tape." And, the story says, it may even be possible to transmit the pictures over great distances by hooking the adapter on your telephone.

Sound incredible? Well, what if you had told almost anyone 25 years ago that the United States would, by this year, send a robot to the planet Saturn, a journey in itself which would require four years, and that upon command, messages sent out over a billion miles would result in pictures being taken by the robot, and the photos, crystal clear, would be transmitted back to earth where they would be recorded?

That hypothesis would have sounded pretty "far out" and futuristic in the 1950s, yet it was accomplished this past month, and most of the residents of our country took a "ho-hum" attitude about the whole thing. It didn't even challenge their imagination.

So, the idea of having filmless cameras within five or ten years really doesn't sound too absurd. However, the system, if popularized, could revolutionize the picture-taking industry. But the revolution may only occur on a professional (newspaper-TV) level, as the projected cost of the camera is around \$900—about three times what a good 35mm camera costs today. And—Sony hasn't indicated what the magnetic disc cassettes will cost. It may be that you could go through scores of rolls of film for what one cassette will cost.

So, we're not scrapping our 35mm cameras yet, nor are we throwing away our bulk film loader we use for black and white pictures. Showing your pictures on a television screen may be a fad someday, but we hope that it will still be in fashion to want to clip your photograph from a newspaper page and send it to Grandma.

Chamber Directors Call 1982 BTM Big Success

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture met on September 2 at noon in the Bovina Restaurant. Kenneth Gaunt, president, called the meeting to order and the eight members who were present discussed the Bull Town Days festivities.

One of the major topics of discussion was the meat that was stolen prior to the Bull Town Days barbecue, August 15.

None of the members indicated that they knew or had heard of the person or persons who took the meat.

The barbecue dinner brought in \$1,604.00 and then the income from the breakfast was totaled at \$186.00, with the wood sale to Larry Scott at \$100.00.

Totally, the expenses for Bull Town Days ran \$1,965.13, with the celebration losing \$73.65, which brought the Chamber of Commerce balance to \$293.82 for the year to date.

In the regular account there was \$546.07 and in the banquet fund, there is a total of \$381.13.

According to two members of the food committee, Billy J. Charles and Larry Scott, if the meat had not been stolen, it is very probable that the Chamber would be announcing a gain in income instead of a deficit.

There were 802 tickets sold to the barbecue for the BTM celebration, and then there were 75-80 free passes issued for those participants from out of town who were in the parade.

Kenneth Gaunt, president, praised the Chamber members for the success of Bull Town Days. He said they were responsible for the success, not just him.

A discussion on possibly running a survey to see whether or not to have BTM was brought up, with the members deciding that it was worth the effort that goes into the celebration to continue it.

One member suggested that they find people to do the barbecue who had had previous experience with a barbecue of this size. It was stated that the people who had done this cooking before did not come to assist those doing the cooking this year and

so they were sort of left in the dark about the way to do things.

Another suggestion on the barbecue was that those persons buying the surplus barbecue after the dinner would be possibly given free beans so as not to waste the beans.

Several donors were mentioned and the Chamber secretary will be getting out letters of appreciation for their donations to them in the next few weeks.

Galen Hromas brought up the possibility of raising the prize money for the BTM parade, so as to get more participation and interest. Several of the members thought this would be a good idea, but no action was taken on the matter.

Mustangs Shellack BR In 48-6 Opening Win

Bovina's Mustangs let it be known that they never had any intention of doing anything but beating Boys Ranch Friday night, as they got back all of the revenge on the Roughriders' past wins, with a 48-6 opening night victory.

Among the outstanding performances was that of

quarterback Dale Gilbreath, who threw the ball for some 350 yards, and six touchdowns.

Gilbreath found the sure hands of Ricky Shepherd for three of the six counters and then the quarterback also found the grasp of Richard Shepherd, Ricky's brother, for two TD's, and, as though that was not enough, Gilbreath then connected with Joe Black, and Edward "Bull" Chisom for the remaining two scores.

On the first touchdown for Bovina, Ricky Shepherd brought in a 35-yarder for the score, then on the second score, Richard Shepherd hauled in another 35-yard pass to make the TD.

the yardage gained was 489 for the Mustangs to Boys Ranch's 177.

Gilbreath completed 20 passes of his 40 attempts, and only had one pass intercepted.

Bovina averaged 54.0 on punting and BR averaged 29.0, with Bovina having only one punt during the game and BR having to give the ball back some four times.

The game looked as though it might be a close contest, with the Roughriders coming out for the score first, but Bovina got its land legs and came back with a vengeance which could not be reckoned with by the Riders.

Other matters discussed by the commissioners, Sheriff Bill Morgan discussed the possibility of securing auxiliary power unit to be used in case of a black-out. The commissioners advised Morgan to check into the possibility of replacing the unit and to secure figures that would give them an idea of the cost of such a replacement.

A discussion of the Energas proposed rate increase was also brought up, and Ralph Shirley, of Energas, explained the situation to the commissioners.

A final payment in the amount of \$1,840.72 had been received by the commissioners for the remainder of the payment of Parmer County's share of the Bookmobile funds.

A new calculator was purchased for the County Treasurer's office, which cost \$260.00 and a discussion of the possibility of a percentage salary increase for county employees was brought up but a decision on that matter was not finalized.

And, although the elevator can dry the corn at 6,000 bushels per hour, the costs for the farmers to do this is almost prohibitive.

Johnson said, also, that the milo in the area was looking good and would probably yield 20-30 per cent more than last year.

"Last year, on the milo, the heat just about got everyone," said Johnson.

Milo harvest will probably start around the last of October or the first part of November, when the first frost comes to the area.

Ezra has two older sisters, Heather and Tieyah.

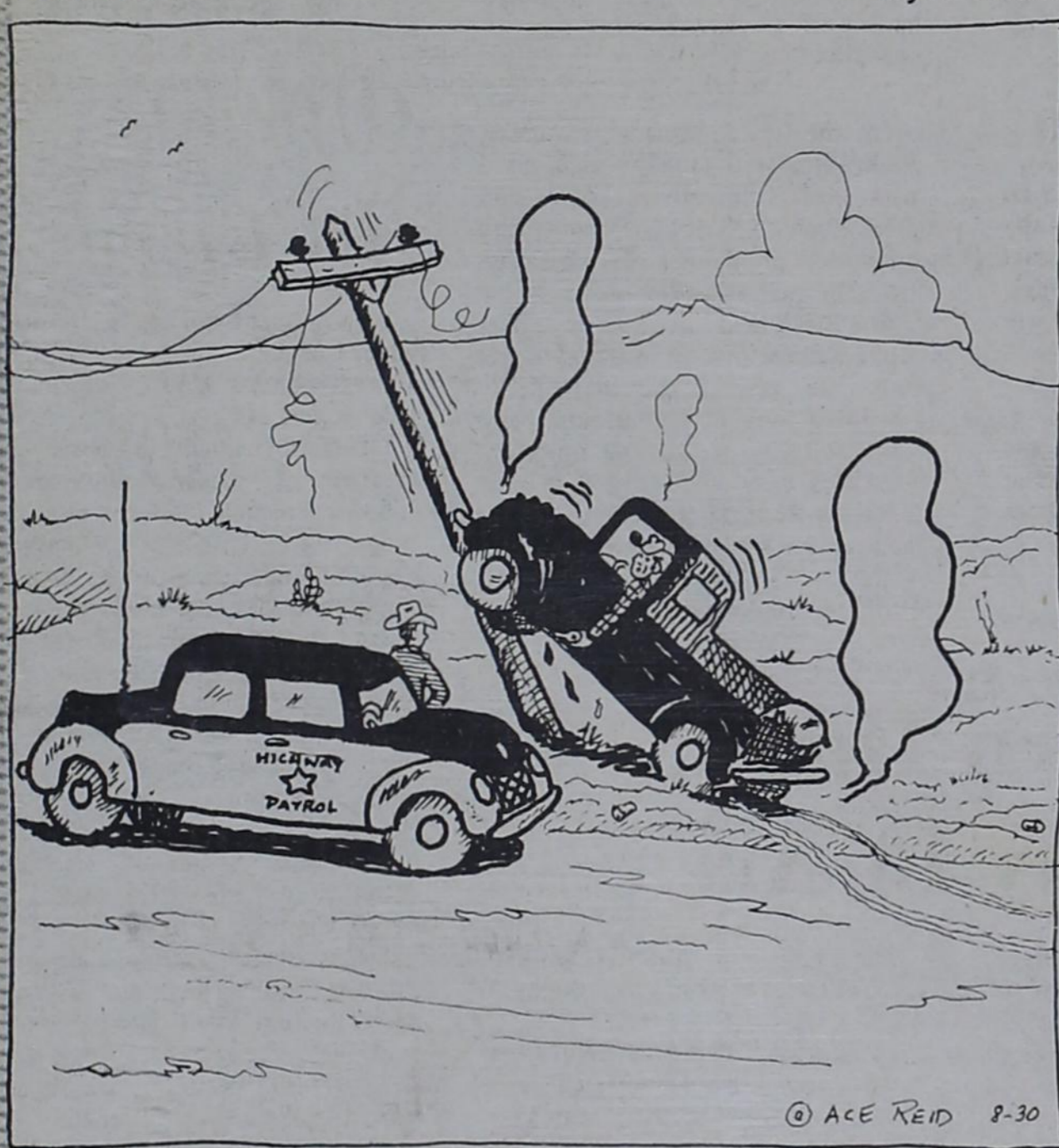

Some of the Methodists who are back in school include Annette Stevenson, Carol Ware, Tammy Dow, and Del Ray and Blake Sudderth.

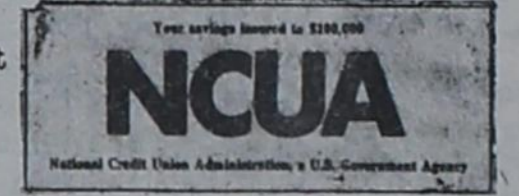
