GENERAL MERCHANTS, SONORA, TEXAS.

Leases.

1 All leases must be executed under the hand and seal of the commissioner, but it will not take effect till it is filed for record in the county where the land is situated.

2 No lease will be made for less than one year, and not less than three cents per acre paid in advance.

3 Leases on agricultural land and all lands having permanent water on them will not be made for more than five years, and for dry grazing land for not more than ten years.

4 When lands are occupied a lease thereof will be made with reference to the equities of the occupant, which must appear on the application.

5 No lease of less than four sections of unwatered pasture land shall be made, unless such number includes all unleased land in the vicinity belonging to the several funds mentioned in this act to wit: Public free school, public domain and asylum lands.

6 At the expiration of a lease the lessee has the preference right to renew his lease on the same lands, if it is open to lease.

7 All leases may be advertised by the commissioner and let to highest responsible bidder in such quantities and under such regulations as he may think to be the best interest of the state, not inconsistent with the equities of the occupants.—Colorado Times.

Yandell's Burro.

A few days ago Agent J. T. Logan of the Pacific Express company received a request from a friend in Illinois for a burro. 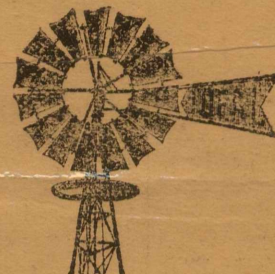

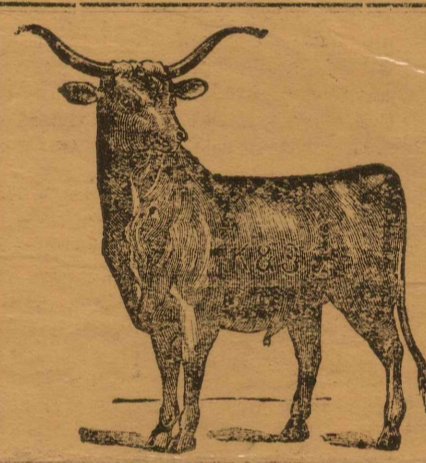

The Iowa democracy assembled in Marshalltown and adopted sound money resolutions and nominated a state ticket with Hon. W. I. Babb for governor.

The Hon. Howell Edmunds Jackson, associate judge of the supreme court of the United States died at his residence at West Meade, six miles west of Nashville, Tenn., on Aug. 5th, in the sixty-fourth year of his age, of consumption.

The British government has presented claims amounting to \$345,000 against the Hawaiian government for the imprisonment of British subjects during a period of martial law and against whom no charge were preferred.

General Weaver, late populist candidate for president is doing Texas. General Coxey of Coxey's army and populist fame at present candidate for governor of Ohio, is doing Texas. The only Mrs. Mary Ellen Lease of Kansas, is also lecturing in Texas.

The demand for rams this season promises to be better than for three years.

There is no doubt but what it will pay to feed muttons for market this fall.

A. V. Lamar the sheepman arrived from Bell county Wednesday, with another bunch of sheep.

H. Knausenberger sold 20 head of Delaine rams to H. H. Sheard of Schleicher county at \$5 a head.

T. D. Word bought 641 head of stock sheep from James Shaffer at terms private.

Keyes Fawcett has 150 head of cows and calves for sale in Fields pasture.

386 head of stock sheep will be sold at trustees sale in Sonora on Sept. 3rd. They were secured on a promissory note for \$305.

Keyes Fawcett sold 100 head of 3 and 4 year old steers to W. S. Talbott at \$17.50 and \$21.50 a head respectively.

J. B. Newman & Son sold 40 head of 3 and 4 year old steers to W. S. Talbott at \$17.50 and \$20.50 a head respectively.

Moller, Bauer & Hedden bought 400 muttons from Geo Brown of McKavett at \$1.50 for ewes and \$1.65 for wethers.

A. W. Pride and H. Spruce returned from Waco Saturday where they took a bunch of saddle horses. The prices obtained averaged \$25 a head.

The fact that there is an abundance of feed in Texas and the shortage in cattle will cause some smart men with the means to feed muttons.

From the San Angelo Standard: It is reported that \$22 has been paid for two-year-old steers in the Panhandle.

W. C. Jones sold 400 head of 1- and 2s last week at \$12 and \$16 to Harris Bros. He has 250 4 and 5 year old steers he wants to sell at market prices.

Lee Good, of Runnels county, bought his brother (E. C. Good's) entire stock of cattle, about 2500 head, at \$13.35 per head.

G. Miller, of Schleicher county, sold and delivered 60 head of 4 and 5 year old steers, this week, at \$24.50 per head to Wm. Anson, of Coleman county.—Standard.

Condition of the Wool Trade.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 9.—The Boston Commercial Bulletin will say to-morrow of the wool market:

The small sales are the result of a spasmodic agony on the part of American mills who have seen foreigners sweep into our cloths market and carry away large orders for Clay worsteds and fine fancies at phenomenally low prices. One of the foreign firms here just had its invoices marked up. There has, however, been no drop in wool. It is held in strong hands who hope that Europe prosperity will advance prices again at the London auctions in September. Wool is to-day lower than it was a year ago at this time. Ohio XX sells at 18 to 19c to-day, against 20 1/2c a year ago. The territory fine staple sells at 37c clean against 40c a year ago. The sales of the week are 1,641,900 pounds domestic and 1,180,200 pound foreign, against 3,664,100 pounds domestic and 3,775,500 pounds foreign last week and 7,526,600 pounds domestic and 351,000 pounds foreign for the same week last year. The sales to-day show an increase of 3,958,089 pounds domestic and 34,876,300 pounds foreign from the sales of the same date in 1894. The receipts to-day show an increase of 52,548 bales domestic and 174,780 bales foreign.

Paris, Tex. Aug. 8.—Miss Marze Pride, daughter of Carson Pride, one of the wealthiest and most prominent citizens of this county, suicided at an early hour this morning by jumping into a deep well at the home of her sister, Mrs. Charles Johnson, two miles east of the city. Miss Pride's mind has been somewhat unbalanced for the past two years, owing to the tragic death of her brother, Morgan Pride, who was murdered in Western Texas.
