# Safety Pays Excel Salutes Its Texas Employees 

Approximately 3,000 employees of Excel Corporation's beefprocessing plants in Friona and Plainview, Texas, received checks of up to $\$ 350$ each this week. The gifts were a one-time payment recognizing each employee's contribution to Excel and to overall safety and safety costs.

We're using this one-time disbursement to share a portion of that savings with those responsible for implementing the expanded safety and ergonomic-safety programs," said Cary Humphries, general manager of the Plainview plant.
