Prairie Acres Chosen For Research Project

Prairie Acres is announcing the facility's cooperation in a research project for Texas Tech University Health Science Center. Dr. Shirley E. Poduslo, director of the DNA Alzheimer's Research Bank, is doing research to determine what gene or genes cause Alzheimer's disease.

Alzheimer's disease is a progressive, neurodegenerative disorder characterized by a loss of memory, reasoning, perception, and orientation. Currently, no definitive test for Alzheimer's disease exists. The diagnosis can only be confirmed by autopsy. Risk of getting Alzheimer's disease increases dramatically as individuals approach age 85. It has been calculated that by the age of 85, more than 50 percent of this age group will suffer from this disease.

Dr. Poduslo and her technicians will be at Prairie Acres in June and at that time families and/or individuals choosing to participate in this research will have two vials of blood drawn.

The DNA is isolated from one vial of blood, and permanent cell lines for each patient are made from the second vial.

Dr. Poduslo states, "We are looking for changes in particular genes directing the specific properties of the neurons—changes that may be increased in frequency in Alzheimer's patients."

"We are comparing any DNA changes in Alzheimer's patients with normal controls, with other family members, and also with patients who have other neurological disorders," he adds. The technology being used is so

sensitive, according to Dr. Poduslo, it is like trying to spot a single weed in a whole acre of healthy cotton plants.

A video describing this research project will be shown at 7 p.m., Monday 24, 1999 in the community room of the Friona State Bank. Area families with members affected by Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, Multiple Sclerosis, Huntington's disease, Down's Syndrome are invited to view this video and participate in this research project.

THEY BURIED MY friend Porter Roberts this past Wednesday. Some people are friendly, and some are not. Some folks work at having friends, and others don't work too hard at it.

Porter worked at being friendly, and at having friends. That's probably the reason that First Baptist Church at Friona was packed for his funeral service.

In his near 40 years as a Friona and Parmer County resident, Porter had made a lot of friends. He enjoyed working with people, and people enjoyed Porter.

As stated on Wednesday, Porter was a member of a number of organizations as well as his church, and he wasn't just a member—he was a participating member.

He was a church greeter for a number of years, and he fulfilled his duty both in good health and bad. If Porter was in pain, you wouldn't guess it, due to the broad smile that he always displayed.

Porter was a jack-of-all-trades. He worked for a pipeline company when he and Jean first married. He also worked for Southwestern Public Service Company for a time. In his family history in the Parmer County History Book *Prairie Progress*, Porter stated "We tried for four years to get a furniture store going."

That's where Ye Editor first met Porter Roberts after moving to Friona—at his little furniture store at the corner of Sixth and Main. When Carol and I bought our first house, we purchased a big old hassock from Porter. We had spent all of our money to pay down on the house, and the hassock was all we could afford—and it covered some space for us.

While he was in the furniture store, the Friona Chamber of Commerce needed a manager, but couldn't afford a salary for a full-time person in the position. So our friend Porter offered to do the job on a "part-time" basis. Knowing Porter now as we didn't then, he probably worked full time for part-time wages. In fact, we'd bet on it.

Porter later became tax assessor-collector for the Friona Independent School District when longtime tax man Dan Ethridge retired. Somewhere in this time period, he also delivered the Lubbock paper in Friona, and was the best newspaper delivery-person we've ever had, and one of the few who got our paper up close to the door.

Porter would spend 15 or 20 minutes with you every month when he came by to collect for the paper, and he usually (as was his trademark) had a new joke or two to share. Carol and I always wondered how long it took him to make this monthly "route."

After 15 years or so as the "Old Devil Tax Man," as he called himself, Porter was appointed in 1979 as Parmer County Judge and was later elected to the post twice.

For the last four or five years, Porter had voluntarily called us regarding obituaries in the Lubbock paper which had Friona or Bovina ties, which was a big help. (Any takers on replacements??)

Porter also gave himself to all sorts of public service. I'll not repeat them all here, as they (at least most of them) are included in his obituary write up. I can only attest for sure about his work at church and in the Lions Club.

If Porter involved himself in all of his civic duties as he did for our Lions Club, and we feel that he did—then his loss will be felt by many, many folks.

Porter had a habit of opening almost every board meeting he attended with "I make a motion to adjourn." This would start the meeting out on a lighter note that got to be the "norm" when Porter was present.

A number of these people made up the big crowd that came to his funeral Wednesday to say goodbye to Porter in spite of the inclement weather. Thanks, Jean, and Mike and Patricia, for sharing your husband and daddy with the rest of us.

His ability to "keep on keeping on," and his upbeat personality should stand as an excellent example for many of us to live by.

If success is measured, as we have heard said, by the number of friends you have, then Porter Roberts was a successful man, indeed. More of us should strive to be half this successful.

Heaven will never be the same!

Those present were Mayor Galen Hromas, Aldermen Stone, Marshall, Hughes, Waters, and Wilkins.

Meeting was called to order at 7:15 p.m. and Mayor Hromas opened the meeting with a prayer.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Alderman Hughes made a motion to pay the bills. Alderman Stone seconded. Motion passed.

Alderman Stone made a motion to allow Aldermen Charles Wilkins and Kevin Hughes to purchase generators as needed for the city and allow appropriate wiring to be done to the City Hall, Pump Station, and Lift Station for the use of the generators. Marshall seconded, motion passed.

When open session resumed, Alderman Hughes moved to accept insurance proposal at 80/20 base premium and serious/mental health with a cap of \$400 per person. Wilkins seconded.

Stone moved to table Animal Ordinance. Hughes seconded and motion passed.

Meeting was adjourned at 11 p.m.

About 5,300 high school students were honored April 13 for outstanding academic achievements during the State Board of Education's Celebrations of Educational Excellence awards program.

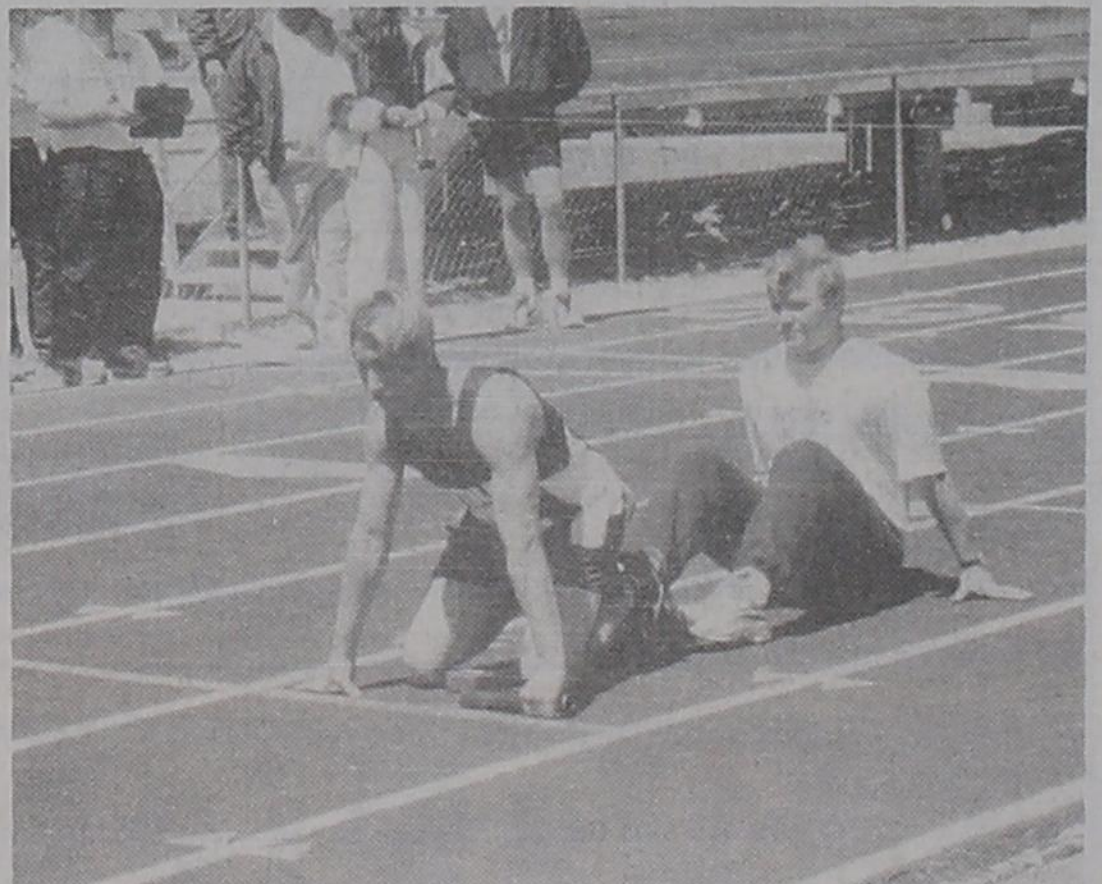
The ceremony for this area was held at West Texas A&M University in the Virgil Henson Activities Center and included about 155 students from the Panhandle area.

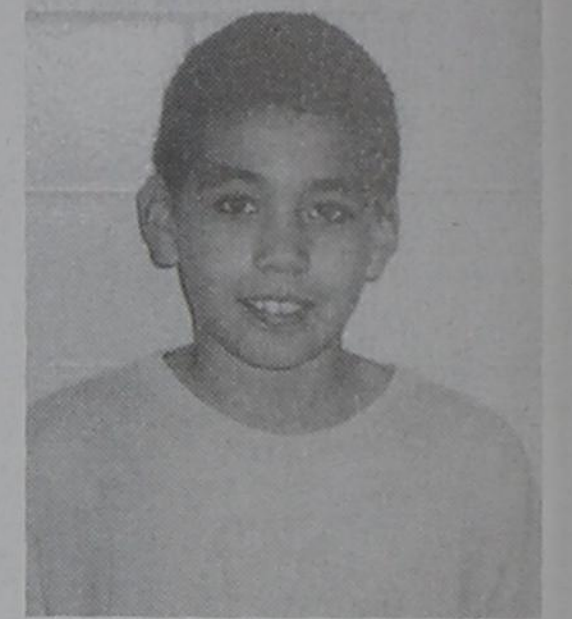
HERE COMES ERIC.....Showing his triple jump style is Eric Shufelberger at Dimmitt's Bobcat Relays last Saturday. ron carr photo

Porter Roberts Is Buried Wednesday

Funeral services for Porter V. Roberts, 75, of Friona, were held Wednesday at First Baptist Church of Friona, with Rev. Waide Messer, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Roberts was dead on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital Monday, April 12.

He was born November 4, 1923, in Alluwe, Nowata County, Oklahoma. After graduating from Ada (Ok.) High School, Porter served three years in the U.S. Army, serving in Germany as a Combat Medic. He received the Army's Purple Heart Award for wounds he received in Germany.

Roberts attended East Central State College in Ada, and moved to Levelland after his father, O. Dale Roberts, was transferred by Service Pipeline Company. Porter was employed by Southwestern Public Service Co. in Levelland.

Roberts married Jean Tugwell June 16, 1950 in Levelland, which was their hometown. In 1954 the family moved to Post, and then came to Friona in 1960, where Porter opened a furniture store on Main Street.

Roberts served as tax assessor-collector for the Friona Independent School District from 1964-79. In December of 1979, he was appointed as County Judge, replacing Paul Fortenberry, who retired. Porter was later re-elected to two full terms as County Judge.

He has been very active in civic affairs, serving as Friona's Chamber of Commerce manager for a time. He has been an active member of First Baptist Church, and an ultra-active member of the Friona Lions Club. He served as a board member for the High Plains Eye Bank, sponsored by the

district Lions, for a number of years.

Roberts has been a longtime member of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department, the American Legion Post 206, and the VFW Post 1413. He had served as a member of the Parmer County Child Welfare board since its inception in 1980, and was a member of the board of directors for the Friona Municipal Library.

He was a board member of the Friona Heritage Society (Depot) and was a past member of the Texas National Guard.

Survivors include his wife Jean of the home; a son Mike Roberts and a daughter, Patricia Shirley, both of Houston, and two grandsons, James and Matthew Shirley of Houston.

Also surviving is his mother, Mary Alice Roberts of Friona, and one sister, Norma Jean Chisum of San Angelo.

Pallbearers were Rickey Rector, Ron Smiley, Dale Schueler, Gene Scheuler, Kyle Tugwell, David Sides and Rodney Blocker.

Honorary pallbearers were members of the Friona Voluntary Fire Department, Friona Evening Lions, and the VFW Post 1413.

pictures when she edited the FHS school newspaper.

She told me two weeks ago that she planned to attend WTAMU and major in journalism and communications. She is a UIL finalist in editorial writing and was scheduled to compete at the UIL regionals in Odessa next week.

Now life has changed some. Two shattered ankles, two broken femurs, a broken nose and a damaged vertebra have a way of interfering.

She was in surgery 3 1/2 hours on Sunday and another surgery Wednesday. Speculation is she could be in a wheelchair for six months or longer.

Next week they say she will move to a rehab hospital in Amarillo and begin the grueling therapy sessions for her injuries.

She has received several units of blood. She has received cards, flowers, prayers, and phone calls from friends and classmates.

I'm betting that Angela will recover sooner than people thought. I'm betting that if Angela says she is going into journalism, that is what she will do too.

After all she already has her first story to write.

OH NO!
Clutch, brake, crash!
That's how fast life changed for Angela Fitzgerald late last Saturday night.

The 18-year-old Friona high school senior was on her way home around 11 p.m. She had stopped by a friend's house but no one was at home.

She had told her dad, Richard, she would be home by 11:30 p.m. and was on schedule when fate intervened.

In the darkened world of country dirt roads, she missed a turn off onto the road back to town. Continuing along on a now unfamiliar road, the headlights of the red 1990 Mustang suddenly lit up a dead end "jog" in the road.

Traveling about 60 mph it was too late. Her natural panicked instinct was hit the clutch, hit the brakes, and brace for an impact.

She told friends that for an instant she thought she would go flying into a field. She didn't realize she was aimed at an 8-foot high dirt embankment.

The Mustang hit the embankment full force, plowed dirt straight up the side, then slammed back down, rear wheels in the ditch.

The impact shoved the engine back. The airbag deployed and broke her nose.

Dazed and in shock, not knowing the extent of the damage, she thought she could "back out of the ditch and drive on home."

Then she realized her legs weren't cooperating. She reached down to her lower left leg and ankle and felt bone from a compound fracture.

Using her training as an EMS cadet, she took off her belt and tied off the bleeding.

Because of her rigid pressure on the clutch and brakes at the time of impact, her right ankle and femur were also shattered and she had a crushed vertebra.

With not much hope that anyone would come along that time of night, she

wrapped a towel around her right leg, gathered whatever she could to put over her for warmth, and maneuvered into the Mustang's small back seat.

She thought she remembered that her legs should be elevated to help prevent blood loss. Being in the back seat made the elevating easier.

I can only imagine the thoughts that must have gone through this young lady's mind as the minutes dragged on.

When she wasn't home by 11:30 p.m., her dad got worried and eventually began a search. He drove out to a friend's house in the country but there was no one home.

He called people. He

notified the Friona police, who notified neighboring city police departments with a description of the vehicle.

Angela isn't ever late and if she is going to be she calls. No call came. Her dad didn't sleep.

As the night wore on and the temperature dropped into the low 40s, Angela could only wait, hurt, and hope.

She told friends that later in the early morning darkness, she was afraid she was going to die. So she took her drivers license out of her back pocket and laid it on her knee so whoever found her would know her name.

As dawn broke around 7:30 a.m., Mr. Johnny Hand, a local farmer who lives nearby, left the house to check on some cattle. He was to be the first person to come by all night.

Mr. Hand went for help. He went back to call 911 and Mrs. Hand took some blankets and supplies and went to the accident scene to look after Angela.

Shortly after 8 a.m., Friona EMS and volunteer firemen arrived on the scene, along with a sheriff's deputy and a state trooper.

And a LifeStar medic helicopter from Amarillo landed on a hastily cleared landing spot nearby.

Medical officials said when she was found she was in critical condition due to the loss of blood and exposure.

Friona police meanwhile notified her dad. He and her younger brother John went to Parmer County Hospital, then had to chase the helicopter to Amarillo.

Angela and LifeStar got to Amarillo only 30 minutes before Richard and John did.

I met Angela at the city pool last summer when she was a lifeguard and my kids spent a lot of time there. She was good to them and a good lifeguard.

She is a senior member of the annual staff at FHS. She and I spent some time together on the sidelines at football and basketball games shooting pictures.

Christen Stowers was 3rd in the high jump with a height of 4'8". K'Leigh Scroggins was 6th in the long jump at 14'8".

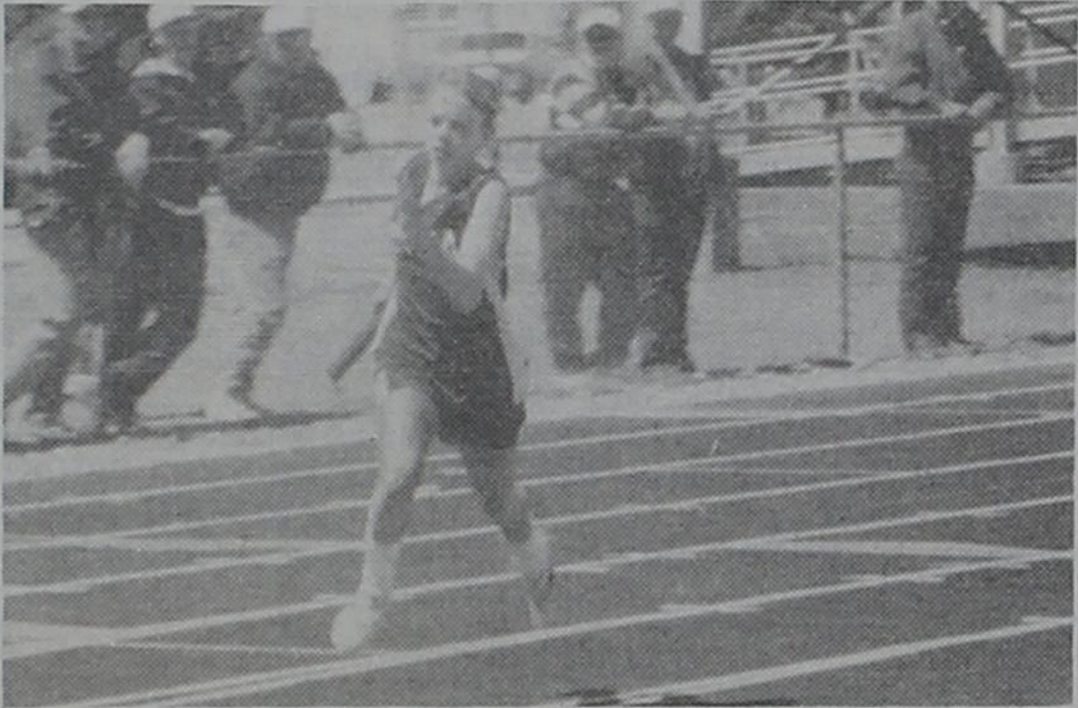
The 400m relay team of Elia Maruffo, Veronica Herrera, Christen Stowers, and Ashley Zehner finished 5th at 56.1.

Scroggins came in 3rd in the 100m hurdles with a time of 17.23, but won 1st place in the 300m hurdles at 50.04.

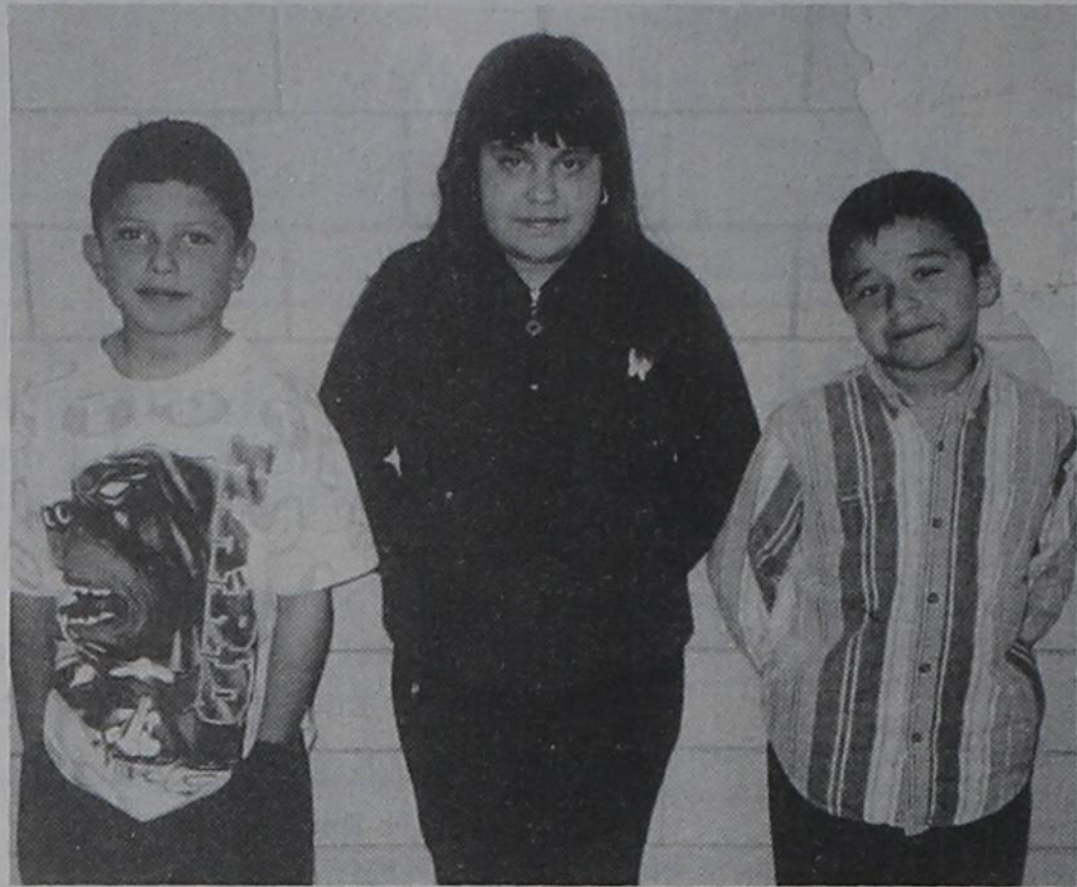
The 800m relay team of Maruffo, Amber King, Stowers, and Ashley Zehner were 4th at 2:03.1.

Alfalfa Weevils Are Reported In County

Cherinell Riley, Extension agent-integrated pest management, says that first reports of alfalfa weevils in Parmer County were received last week.

The alfalfa weevil adult is light brown and has dark brown and grey stripes down its back. These adults emerge in the late fall and females begin chewing holes in the stems of alfalfa before inserting eggs.

Eggs are laid on living and dead stems and are smooth, shiny and yellow in appearance and will hatch in five to ten days. The larvae move out of the holes and crawl up the outside of the stem and begin feeding in the terminals of the alfalfa, which makes them hard to find since they are hidden in the tightly folded young leaves.

Young larvae are very small and yellowish to green in color. The older larvae, third and fourth instars, are darker green and have a white stripe down their back, and cause the most damage to alfalfa.

The larvae stage can last up to three weeks. When the larvae are ready to pupate

they drop to the ground. The emerging adults feed for about two weeks before moving to aestivate, or rest.

Alfalfa weevils cause two types of damage. The first type is defoliation, which can result in yield reduction and reduced photosynthesis. The second type is damage to regrowth, which can ultimately cause stunting or death.

One way to determine the level of infestation, if any, is to use a sweep net. Divide the field in at least four quadrants and sweep five times in each quadrant with the net. Then determine your average sweep count.

Another method is using a "beat bucket," in which you put a bucket near the plant and tap the plant so that the feeding larvae will fall in the bucket.

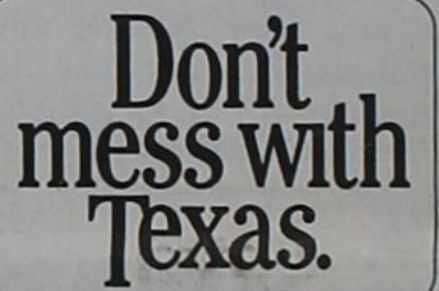
