A Famous Fiddle.

There is a violin in the possession of Frau Grigorieff-Krudener of Lucerne, the widow of the brilliant young performer Grigorieff, which is reputed to be worth 60,000 francs. Vulliaume, Bianchi, Sivori and other experts have agreed in this extraordinary estimate. The greatest artists, Paganini, Spohr, Vieuxtemps, Joachim and Sarasate, have played upon it, and there is quite a collection of documents relating to its history for the last 150 years. It was originally one of the so called Kurfursten geige, or Prince Elector fiddles, 12 of which were made as presents to the electors of the holy Roman empire by Jacob Stainer Amati, and is the only one of the 12 which is still in existence. About a century and a half ago it came into the possession of Baron de Krudener, the Russian diplomatist and husband of the famous Mme. de Krudener, the singular religionist who played so great a part in bringing about the so called holy alliance in 1815. Mme. de Krudener was a sort of German Lady Huntingdon, always surrounded by a court of clergymen. But one of her family, the last of the name, was a born musician and delighted himself with the dusty old neglected Amati. He took to music as his profession, renounced the name of Krudener and adopted that of Grigorieff.—Westminster Gazette.

A Natural Apartment House.

"In Florida they have marsh hens that build their nests in the grass or in 'logs,'" said A. P. Cornell at Jacksonville, Fla., "I was hunting along the upper St. Johns river when I saw what at first appeared to be a log. Then I noticed that one end was split and went to investigate it. The Telephone Line From Sonora to San Angelo.

Sonora, Tex., March 21, '97.
 Editor Standard:
 I noticed in your columns of the Standard of the 20th an article about the intended telephone line to this place. I must say that Mr. Irwin did not make me any proposition on the line nor did I make him any. I told him I thought we could get up a bonus of \$1500, that means San Angelo and Sonora together. I said I would see what I could raise here and he said he would see what he could do in San Angelo. The two places together and from others along the line we might get up more. I don't think the people would like to build the line though and give it to anyone.
 I would not like to ask the people to subscribe to raise \$3000 as a bonus on a \$4500 investment for I don't believe they would be willing to subscribe to it. I am writing you this as it may help you some if you have a meeting, as I don't want you to believe I am offering to make up \$1500 in Sonora for I don't think I can do it.
 I will, however, be in San Angelo on the 2nd and will be ready for business. I am not writing this letter for publication, simply to let you know my feeling in the matter. Yours truly,

What do you think of it? It would be the finest thing imaginable just at the present time for Ozona. It comes to us from good authority that Mayer Bros., of Sonora, are getting out the posts for a telephone line to San Angelo. It is also stated that the Sonora people are willing that the line should come by Ozona as it could be secured in this way at less cost to the Sonora people. From Ozona it would run to Sherwood, thence to Knickerbocker and to San Angelo. It is stated to us by good authority that Sherwood would raise \$250 for the proposed line and Knickerbocker \$100. So much for these two places. Ozona and Sonora will certainly come to the front with \$500 a piece, or probably more, if it should require more to put up the line. It would be hard to calculate the benefit such a line would be to the people of Ozona and Crockett county. It would not only benefit the business men of Ozona but ranchmen as well. For instance, if a ranchman's windmill should get out of fix and he needed a certain piece of material to repair it with, which he could not get in Ozona, instead of waiting eight or ten days for a freight wagon to bring it out, he could just step into Ozona, ring up Mr. Hardware man in Angelo and tell him to send him out the required piece on next day's mail hack and thereby probably prevent his stock from starving for water. The same way with the merchant and everyone else. All we need is some one to start the ball. If Ozona fails in this matter it will be the first time on record that failure has been stamped on her countenance. But she won't fail. Watch the indicator and see. The Weekly is in the road with \$25, and we can probably "dig" a little more if necessary.—Ozona Courier.
