

New Football Field Discussed By Board

ball stadium for Bovina Schools highlighted a lengthy meeting of the school board Monday

Advancement of the high school to Class A status next year has created an even greater need than before for additional seating space for football games, school board members agreed.

No decision was made concerning building a new stadium. Ways and means of paying the cost of the facility were considered and discussed.

The field will be built on two city blocks of school-owned land a block west of the school property. A rough estimate of the cost is \$35,000, according to Superintendent Otis Spears. The funds could be raised with a bond election, by increasing the present taxrate, by using funds now available in the school's interest and sinking fund or by selling options on seats in the new stadium, Spears points out.

The board discussed all the possibilities and a decision is expected to be reached at a later date. The board was in agreement that a new stadium needs to be built, Spears says.

The estimated cost includes bleachers, a fieldhouse, sodding cycle for each \$1 in purchases. the field and fencing the area.

Briefly, David won because in sizing up the challenger (that towering mountain of a man), he knew that the contender was not really the shepherd boy, but God! 

This is in keeping with ton, which can cause a reduc-USDA's announcement on October 25 that "mike" measurements of fineness will be included as an additional factor for 1965 Upland cotton going under price support loan after October 31.

Mike readings, used widely in commercial channels, are measured on a scale from 2.4 to 8.0, in steps of one-tenths. It works like this: Compressed air at 6 pounds pressure is forced through the sample of cotton. A special air-flow instrument registers the mike reading of that particular sample. Fine cottons permit less air to pass through. Thus, the finer the fibers, the lower the readings. Fineness, depending on conditions, can be related to maturity. Fineness and maturity affect the spinability and value of cotton.

Included in the USDA announcement was a schedule of premiums and, discounts that will be applied when cotton is put under loan. If the mike reading ranges 3.6 through 4.8, a premium value of 14 points per pound will be allowed. No premium or discount will be allowed if the reading is 3.3 through 3.5, or 4.9 through 5.1. But discounts from 15 to 300 points will apply if readings are outside these measurements.

COTTON STRIPPER

Three factors will determine the efficiency of your cotton stripping operation. These are:

1. Field conditions at harvest

2. Machine characteristics and adjustments; and

3. Skill of the operator. Very important is field conditions at harvest. In damp weather, performance of a coton stripper will be less efficient than under dry conditions. Extensive testing has shown best cotton stripper performance is obtained when humidity is below 60%.

So, for better grades and cleaner fields delay harvesting until the relative humidity is 60% or less at boll height in the field to be harvested.

Condition of the cotton stalk is also important in addition to relative humidity. Strippers are designed to handle comparitively large volumes of dry trash efficiently. But a small amount of green leaves and other green wash can cause a significant reduction in the grade of stripped cotton. For this reason, cotton harvested with a stripper prior to frost should be treated with a chemical dessicant to kill the leaves.


