They also had the likes of Slim Whitman, yes, the now-famous international recording star, back when he really was slim.

ENMU has brought some stars to its campus in recent years, and among the concerts we attended there was one by Olivia Newton-John, during the time she was at the top of the musical charts.

Civic Amarillo and other groups have brought some big-name entertainers to the Panhandle from time to time, and we have enjoyed the likes of Barry Manilow, Neil Sedaka and Shirley Jones.

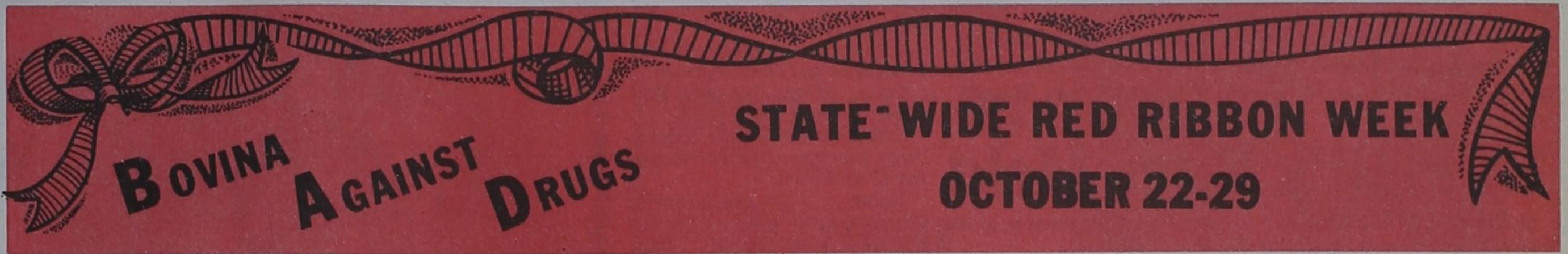

Bean said his team worked out in shorts early in the week, against trying to get over their small injuries.

Meanwhile, during the past week, sophomore Corey Kirkpatrick, attempting to re-join the team, re-injured his knee, and had to have knee surgery in Amarillo on Monday.

Kirkpatrick will probably miss the entire basketball season in addition to the rest of football.

"The coaches and members of the team wish Corey a quick recovery," Coach Bean said.

## Mustangs Whip Eagles In First Dist. Game

The Bovina High School Mustangs rose to the occasion and defeated previously undefeated Three-Way, 52-38 in a game at Maple last Friday night.

The Mustangs spoiled the Eagles' Homecoming game by winning the district opener against one of the tougher teams in the district.

Bovina won the game with a steady, four-quarter performance, and were well in control at the game's end.

Junior runningback Robert Guevara scored five touchdowns for the Mustangs, and added three PAT kicks, to account for 36 of Bovina's points.

"It took quite a load off our shoulders, to win that game. The kids played extremely well. They just set their minds to the fact that they were going to win, and they did," said a happy Coach Terry Bean.

Bean said that Three-Way's offense was hard to defend, and complimented the Mustang defense for the way they managed to hold Three-Way down.

"Their quarterback, Mario Guillen, has undoubtedly the best throwing arm in the district. He was on target for three long bombs that had to be placed just at the right place, and he did it," Bean said.

Bean said that one of the biggest plays of the game came late in the third quarter, when defensive players Juan Reyna and Robert Guevara forced a Three-Way safety.

"We were only a few points ahead at the time, and I think that play sort of demoralized Three-Way. That kind of burst their bubble," the Mustang coach commented.

Boving grabbed the lead when Guevara scored on a 62-yard pass play from Juan Reyna in the first quarter. Guevara kicked the two-point PAT for an 8-0 Bovina lead.

A little later, Guevara hauled in a six-yard scoring pass from Reyna, and Hector Guevara's kick made the score 16-0.

Three-Way responded with a pair of TDs from the Guillen brothers, one on an 11-yard run by quarterback Mario, and then Eddie scored on a 24-yard pass from his brother to make it a 16-14 game. Both kick attempts by the Eagles failed.

Izzy Marrufo scored on a 15-yard pass from Reyna in the second quarter, and Guevara's kick gave the Mustangs a 22-14 lead.

But the Mario Guillen to Eddie Guillen team clicked for 65 yards before halftime, and the Eagles went to intermission trailing by just 24-22, as their third kick was good.

Three-Way tied up the game in the third quarter by scoring a safety against the Mustangs, and then took the lead when the Guillen to Guillen express worked for 45 yards. The kick made the

score Three-Way 32, Bovina 24.

But the Mustangs responded when Guevara got untracked for a 15-yard run for a touchdown, and his successful kick tied the game at 32-all midway through the quarter.

Bovina got the ball back and set out on another drive, and Guevara climaxed it successfully by running it in from four yards out to give Bovina a 38-32 lead, as the kick failed.

That's when the Mustangs scored their safety with the defensive play by Reyna and Guevara, and Bovina captured the game's momentum, as the score became 40-32.

In the fourth quarter, Guevara took an eight-yard scoring pass from Reyna, as Bovina hiked its lead to 46-32. The kick following this score was no good.

Manuel Porras got into the scoring act with a five-yard run, as the Mustang lead became 52-32.

On the PAT kick, Three-Way blocked it, picked up the ball and ran it back and were awarded two points. However, the Eagles committed a clip on the play, according to Coach Bean, and should not have been awarded the points. As it turned out, the two points were not a factor in the game's outcome.

Three-Way scored again on a pass before the game ended.

## Former State Rep. To Speak Here

Former state representative Ben Bynum of Amarillo will be speaking to Bovina youngsters at two school assemblies, and then at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, October 25, he will address the adults at the high school auditorium, on the subject of drugs and alcohol.

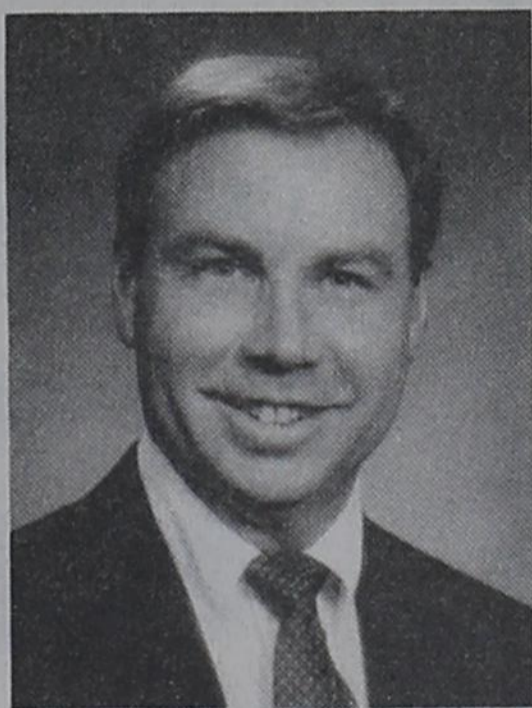
Bynum, a recovering former alcoholic, will speak from first-hand experiences as to what alcohol can do to a person.

Bynum was born and raised in Amarillo, where he attended public schools and Amarillo College. He is a member of a pioneer Panhandle family that has been engaged in ranching, banking and real estate for several generations.

Bynum graduated from the University of Texas at Austin, in 1966, with a BA Degree in government and history. He continued his education with post-graduate study in journalism and advertising.

In 1971, Bynum was elected to represent Potter County in the Texas House of Representatives. During his six years service in the Legislature, Rep. Bynum was appointed the youngest member to serve as chairman of a major standing committee.

Following his legislative service, he worked in the advertising field until his election in 1980, as County Judge of Potter County. As County Judge, he served on the Board of Directors of the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Center (P.A.R.C.), and was instrumental in the opening of a detoxification center in Amarillo.

Bynum is an adult child of an alcoholic. As a result of his own alcoholism, he was suspended as Potter County Judge in 1984. In September of 1984, Bynum admitted himself to a CareUnit Center for alcoholism/chemical dependency in Waverly, Pennsylvania.

Since that time he has been involved in an ongoing program of recovery from the disease of alcoholism. Bynum, a state certified alcohol and drug abuse counselor, is program manager of CareUnit Chemical Dependency treatment center.

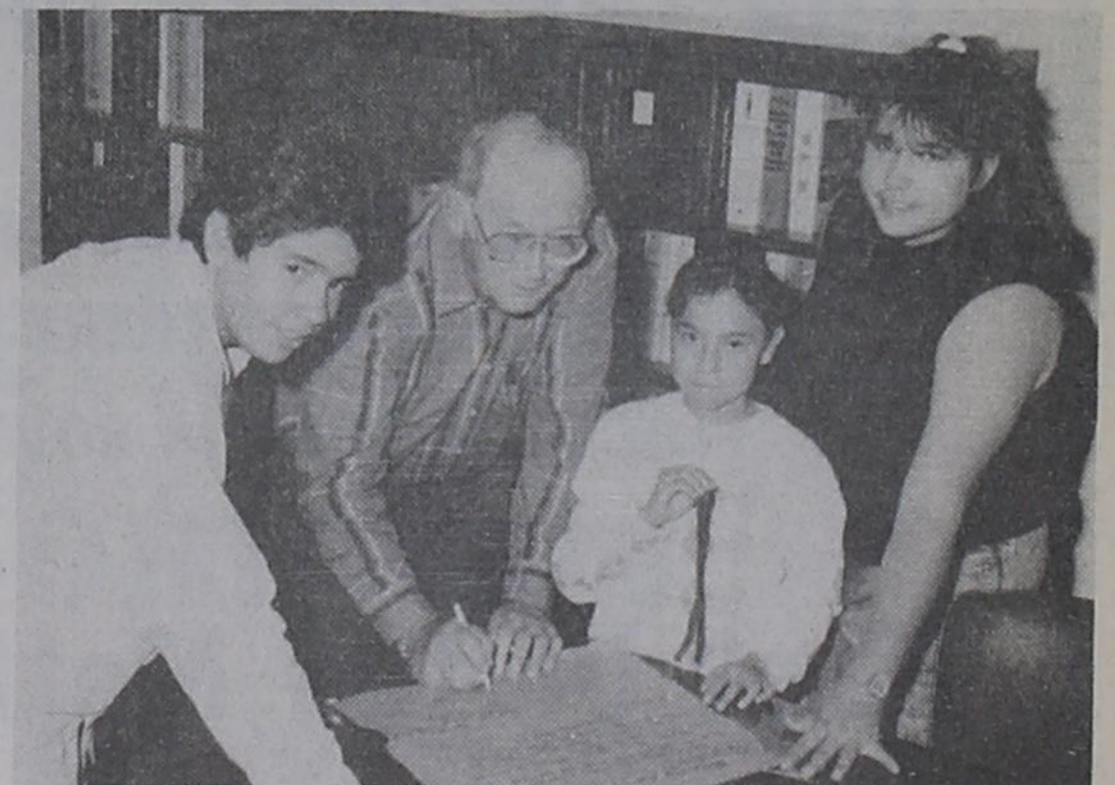
The CareUnit is located in Canyon at Palo Duro Hospital and is the Panhandle's oldest and pre-eminent center for the treatment of dependencies. Bynum directs the daily operations of the seven-unit and acts as liaison

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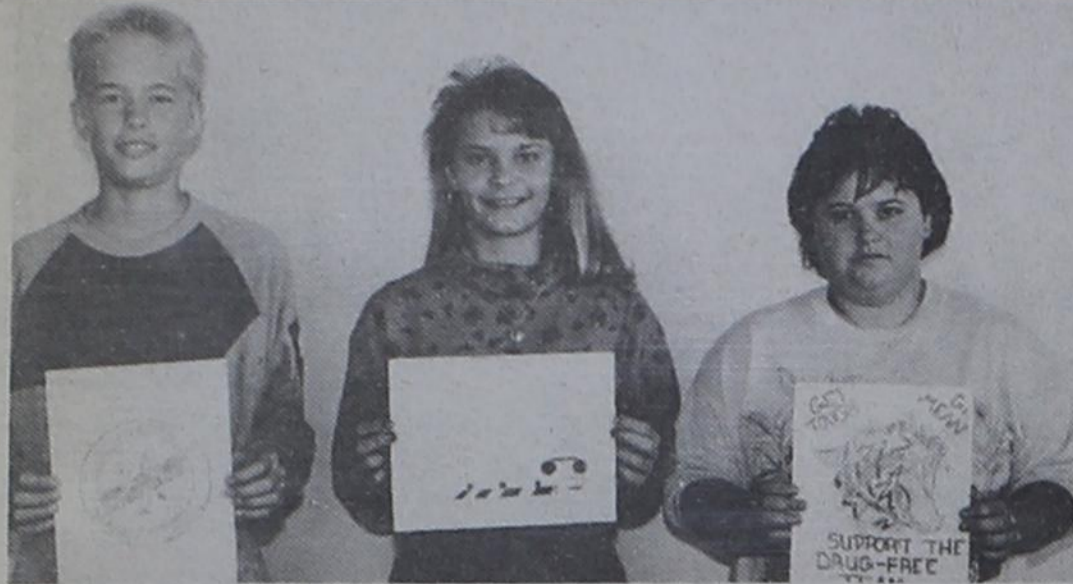
## Oct. 22-27 Proclaimed BAD Week

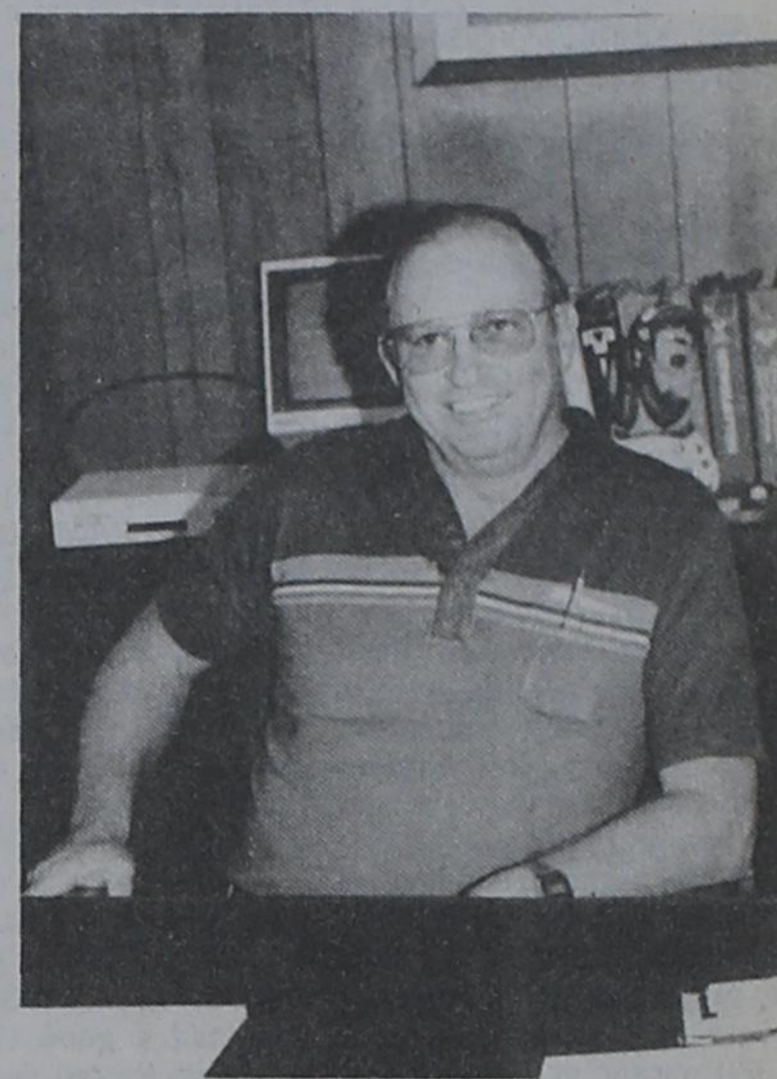

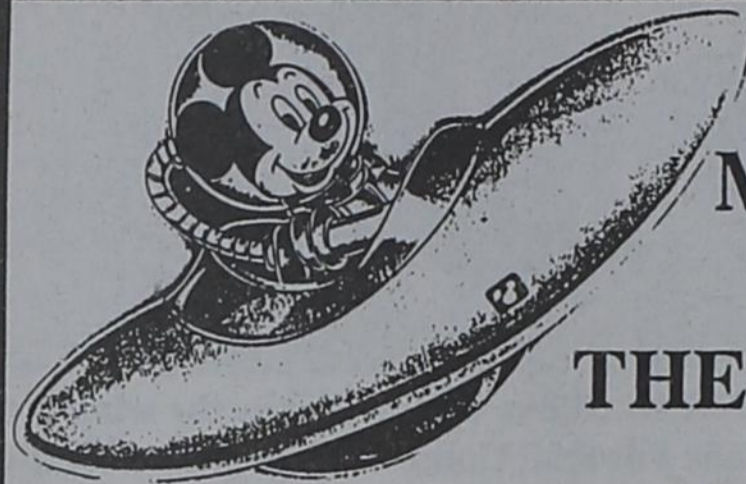
Earl and Lee Stevenson flew to Dallas and flew from there to

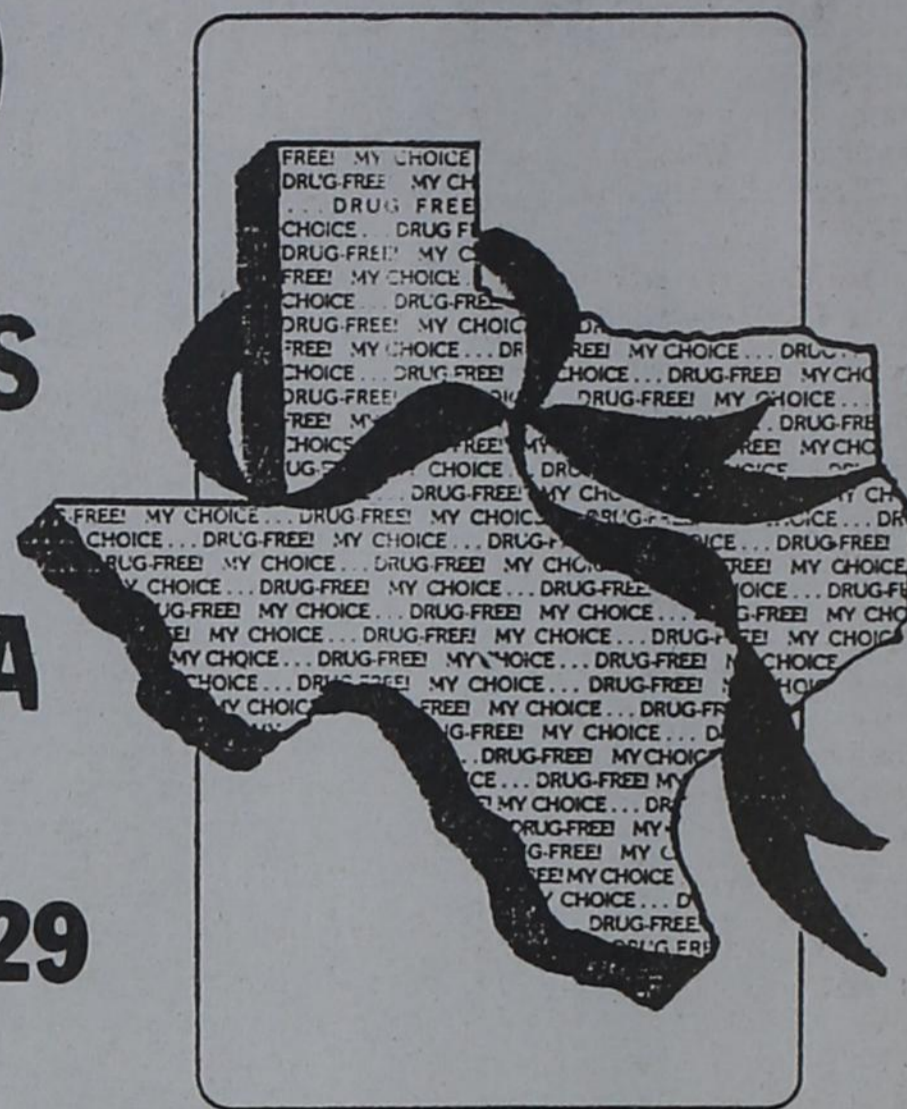
Three-Way scored the first touchdown on a drive, and Bovina scored 41 unanswered points.

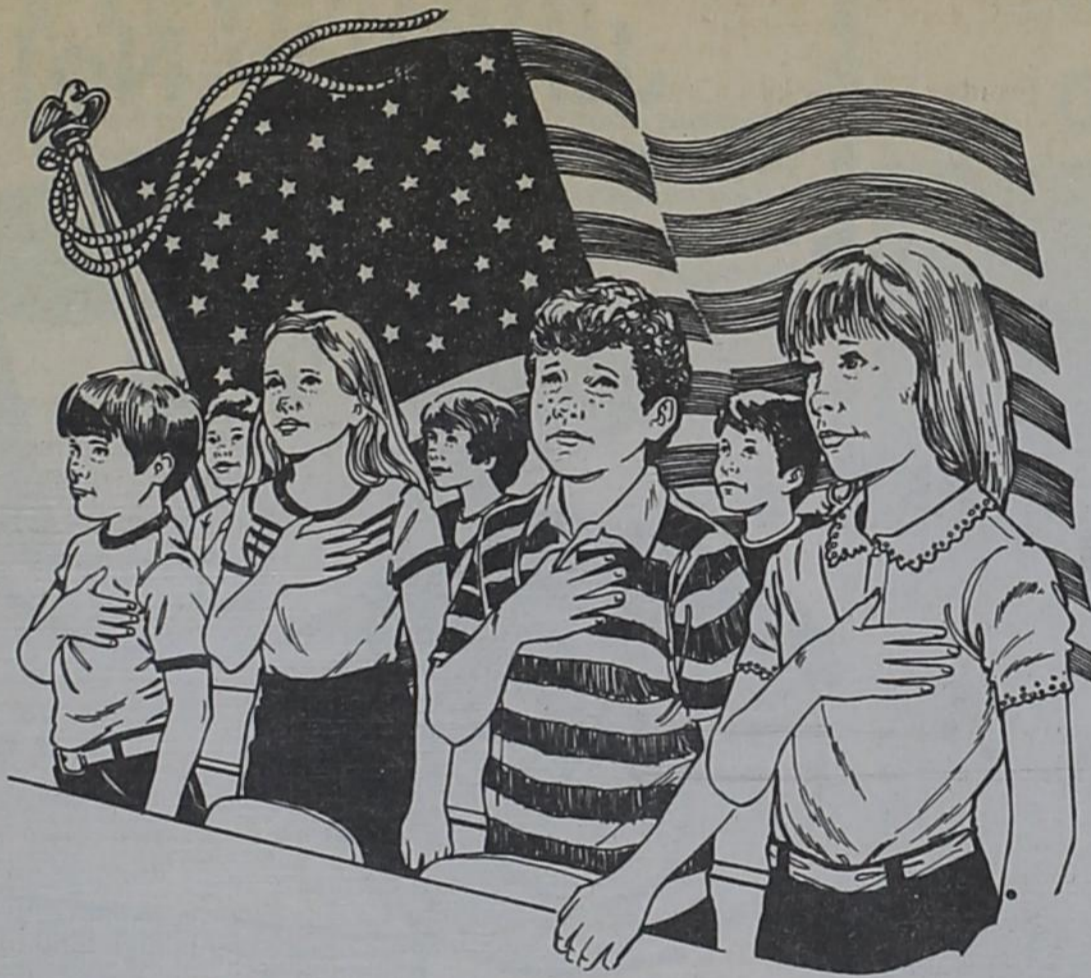

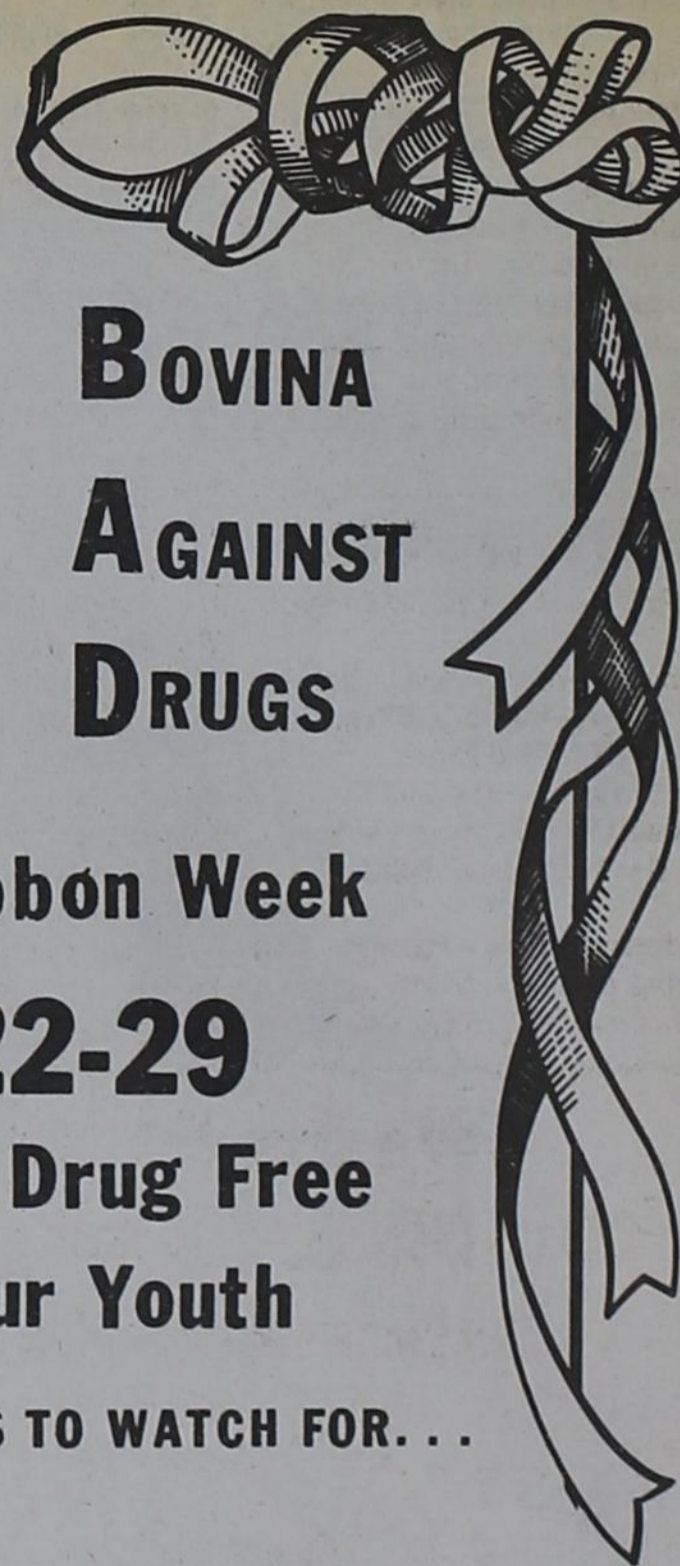

between the hospital and CareUnit corporate headquarters in California.

"Alcoholism has been recognized by the American Medical Association as a disease since 1956, yet most people don't see it as a disease.

"I knew that I had a compulsiveness about me, so I went all the way through high school and college and did not drink."

In 1971 while Bynum was serving as Potter County State Representative, he took his first drink. "I crated to peer pressure," he stated. "I thought I had to drink to be trusted by other legislators.

"From the beginning, I drank alcoholically. It (alcohol) anesthetized my feelings of anger and guilt and fear. It filled the empty hole. It made my inside feel like the mask I was wearing on the outside. I drank for that feeling."

Bynum began to "cultivate" his drinking buddies and behave more irrationally. His wife told him she had married him because he didn't drink. Now she was beginning to ask him "why?" He found mysterious bumps on his car, his work product deteriorated and he lost his seat in the Texas House after six years. After a back sprain, a prescription of valium put him on the road to dual dependency.

By the time he ran for County Judge, he was consuming a fifth of alcohol a day. When he was relieved of his position there, he stayed "smashed" daily for two months. By this time, he knew his life was falling apart.

In 1984, when he began treatment in Pennsylvania, he was able to renew his relationship with God. "It's been a big part of my recovery," states Bynum.

Bynum's family also entered a family treatment program. "It was a year before my eldest daughter could talk about it. But finally, she forgave me. We told each other we loved one another. That's when the healing process began."

Bynum said he doesn't lecture his friends on the dangers of chemical abuse. "I don't tell my friends not to indulge. I just tell them that if their time comes, I'm here to help.

"I will speak to schools, though. And I think that if somebody had come into my school to talk about alcoholism, it might have had an impact on my life.

"The truth is, the alcoholic doesn't want to do what he or she is doing, but has lost the ability to make choices. The dependent person must have help if balance is to be restored to one's life.

"The disease isn't fully understood," Bynum said. "Non-drinking addicts can again lose control, or relapse, by using any mood altering chemical, even substances such as Nyquil, Actifed, Vicks Formula 44 and Listerine. I used to love that stuff. When I was drinking, I couldn't wait to come down with a cold.

"Alcohol is a potent, potent drug. If the Food and Drug Administration were testing it for the first time, it would be a class three narcotic, and probably would be classified as a tranquilizer. It could only be obtained by prescription and one could not get refills. Alcohol is really no less than wet ether," Bynum stressed.

"I am the child of an alcoholic. The alcoholic feelings are present in family members who do not drink or drug. The affect can go on for generations. In my home there was always a fear of alcoholic behavior. I never knew what it was like to feel normal. I always had a sense, a feeling of differentness...and I didn't talk about it.

"I had a sense of anxiety, too. I didn't bring other kids home. I had guilt; I thought everything that went wrong was my fault. I thought that maybe if I had been a better kid, maybe things would be different.

"On the outside, we were a typical middle class family; nice clothes, country club membership, picket fence out front.

"But inside was a certain craziness. I wore a mask on the outside that everything was great." Bynum became an over-achiever/under-achiever.

At the school library, Ben looked up alcoholism and learned that it was a hereditary disease.

"But now, the gift I am able to give kids is recovery. I can help people get into recovery sooner."

Alcoholism is a devastating family disease and left untreated it can be fatal. Family members are in as great a need of treatment as the chemically dependent person. The good news is that today there is a solution.

Ben Bynum is a member of numerous professional organizations and associations. The Bynums are members of the First Presbyterian Church in Amarillo. Ben Bynum is 46 years old and lives in Amarillo with his wife, Penny, and two daughters, Susan and Brooke.

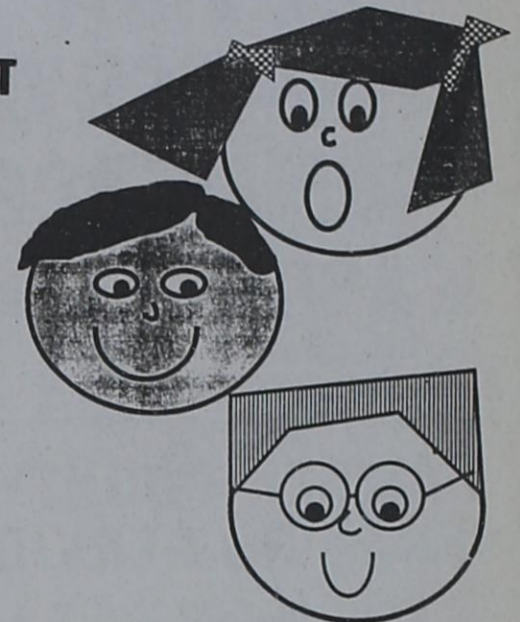

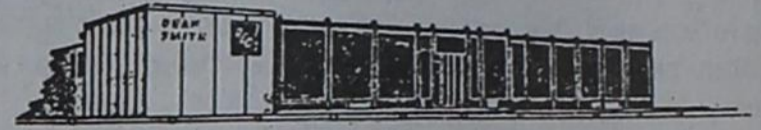
