## Working Together

In the early part of 1980 Enoch Bruce, a very prominent citizen of Camp Wood, developed a burning desire to build a nursing home that would be owned and operated by the city. No town in Texas owned their own nursing home so many considered his dream nothing more than fantasy. Tragically, Mr. Bruce passed away before his vision became a reality.

Applications for a grant to build a nursing home were applied for on more than one occasion but by the same count they were disappointed. Many residents were discouraged while others continued to exhibit the tenacity it was going to take before the project could be undertaken.

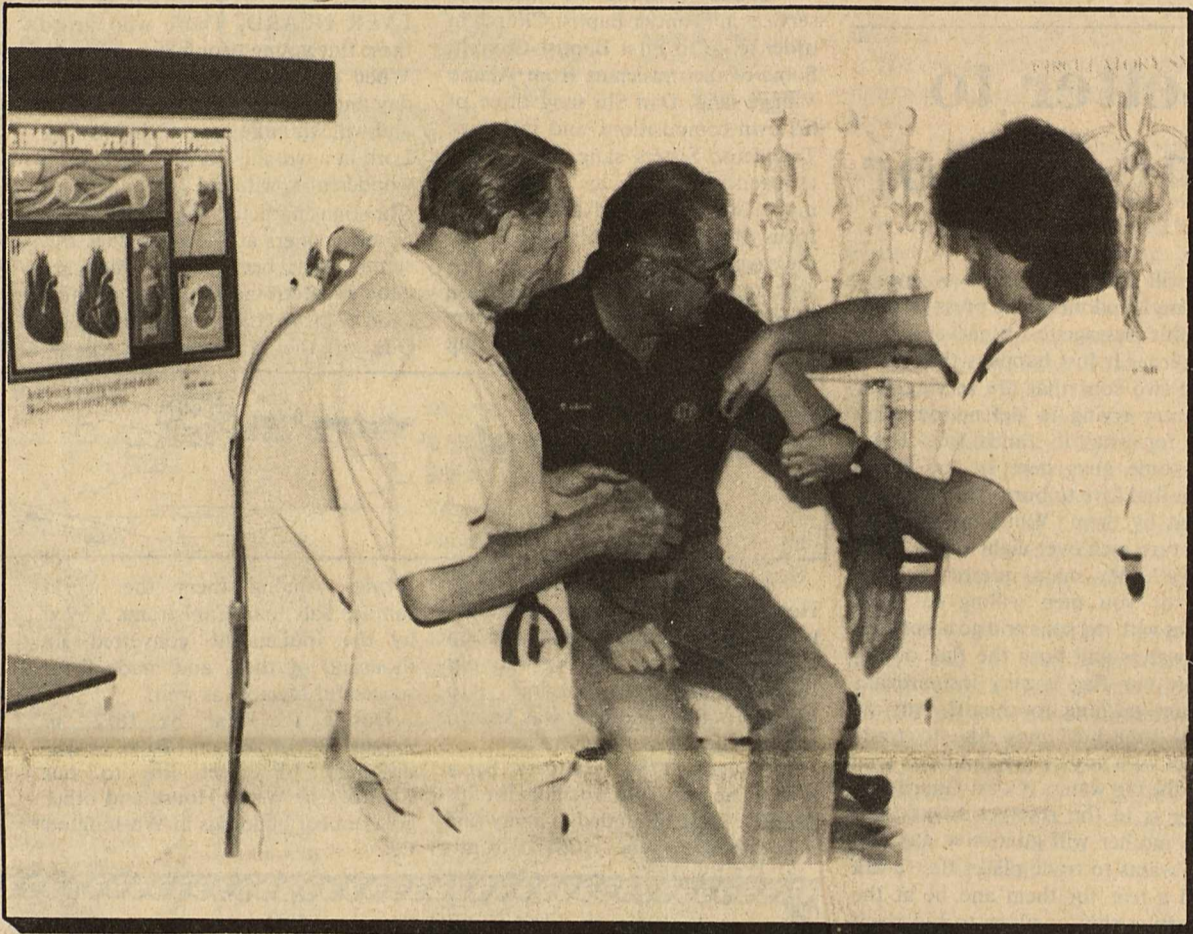
After all efforts seem to have been exhausted the idea of selling bonds was presented. It was not only a brilliant suggestion but it was the perfect antidote for the problem that seemed to have no solution. The successful sale of bonds got the ball rolling and from the day of their approval there has been no looking back.

On March 10, 1988 construction got under way on a city owned facility that some skeptics had predicted to be impossible. The nursing home was no longer a dream held by a small community with vision but a reality that would, in just a short time, become one of the premier homes in the state of Texas for the aged.

On April 1, 1989, the C.W.C.C. opened its doors for business with three state required residents and a full staff of 28 employees. The state made it mandatory to operate with no more than 3 patients and a full staff for thirty days before an inspector could come to the facility and pass it for certification. This new entity not only survived one inspection but a second one as well with a zero deficiency score, something unheard of by other nursing homes throughout the state.

This nursing home is now accepted as Camp Wood's leading industrial operation generating many dollars in income and providing jobs for 42 employees.

Dub Sims, administrator of the nursing home has done a magnificent

job of assembling a staff who not only respond to their duties as employees but as co-workers with pride who take a personal interest in the welfare of their community's investment. Sims seems to have an unlimited supply of energy as he conducts guided tours of the home. When he is out of his office and serving as the public relations officer, his secretary, Daisy Stephens, is very capably filling in for him. The working staff, under his expert leadership, have developed into a well oiled machine that seems to have the qualifications to meet any kind of crisis or emergency.

This nursing facility has a mark of excellence going for them that no other home around here can boast of and that is a full time resident doctor, Dr. Bill Triplett. Dr. Triplett visits every permanent resident in the facility on a daily basis and this is a courtesy of the home. He is loved

and respected by these elderly people and the comfort of having him around at all times is evident in the look of contentment on their faces. It is the philosophy of this organization that these older people have lived a life time and served society well and, now, they deserve the best.

Camp Wood mayor, Dick Tucker, probably ranks close to the top of the list of 92 boosters who support the facility with his unlimited source of energy. In one week he drove to Houston, picked up a new resident, the next day to San Antonio and picked up a new resident, and the next day to Spofford where he picked up another new resident. Tucker is well respected in his community and considered a man of his word.

A service of great importance that is offered to the people of Camp Wood and the new residents of the nursing home is the EMS ambulance

service that is provided at no cost. The ambulance is operated with volunteer workers and all expenses on the ambulance are donated. These small town residents project a lot of pride when they speak of their EMS service.

A VA contract has recently been awarded to the C.W.C.C. and this could be the shot in the arm that will put them over the top.

The hard work and dedication of a small community is now beginning to reap the dividends that everyone dreamed of. As the Camp Wood Convalescent Center, led by the Tuckers, the Sims, the Stephens, Dr. Triplett, and it's countless number of volunteers, continues to travel down a road that provides a very special kind of service surrounded by love and attention to your parents and my parents, your friends and my friends, and your family and my family...we wish them GODSPEED.

## Council Meets With D. A. & Texas Ranger

BRACKETTVILLE, TX

The Brackettville City Council convened Monday evening, August 13, 1990 at 6:30 P.M. in the City Hall conference room.

Mayor Larry Moore, after calling the meeting to order, requested a roll call and with three councilmen present a quorum was established.

After all visitors were welcomed the Mayor immediately declared the meeting into executive session and everyone except those directly involved in the business at hand were excused from the room.

The business discussed during the executive session pertained to voting irregularities by city residents. District Attorney Tom Lee and Texas Ranger Johnny Allen from Del Rio were in attendance. After a brief time Mr. Lee and Mr. Allen departed the conference room and all visitors were invited back in to the meeting.

### STREET

Joe Townsend, minister of the Frontier Baptist Church, expressed his dissatisfaction with the progress on street repairs in Brackettville, especially in the area where he resides. The city superintendent assured Mr. Townsend the problem would be put at the top of the priority list and looked into immediately.

### UTILITY DEPARTMENT REPORT

The council took a long and intense look at the financial and operating cost of the utility department and agreed it needs attention. The present expenditures are exceeding the proposed budget. It was agreed this item would be investigated in detail and steps would be

taken to work within the proposed budget.

### COMMUNITY COUNCIL

George Botello, representative for the Community Council, spoke to the council and expressed a desire to work and cooperate with them in any way. His short talk was very informative and well received by the members present.

### BURNING TRASH WITHIN THE CITY LIMIT

This item was tabled by the council pending more research into the matter.

### SWIMMING POOL GRANT

A motion was made and seconded to rescind a motion made during a previous meeting to hire an administrator and an engineering firm for the swimming pool. It was noted the administrator and the engineering firm had to be evaluated before the grant was available. The motion was made and seconded to comply with this law. Motion carried.

### RETIREMENT PLAN

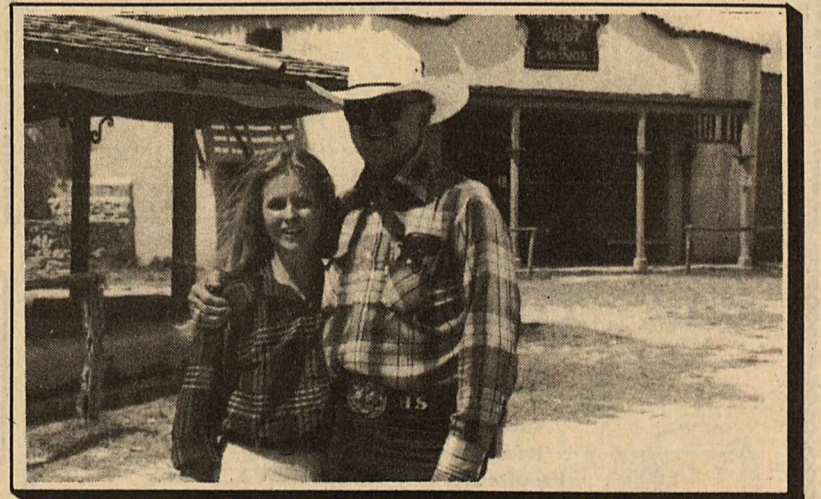
Dennis Slubar was approved by the council to work up a retirement program to be presented at a later date.

### PROPOSED BUDGET MEETING

A budget meeting was set for Friday 31, 1990 at 6:30 P.M. in the City Hall.

The question involving the target date for completion of the proposed city swimming pool was raised. The Mayor assured everyone present that the grant had been acquired and work should start in the very near future. It was noted the pool would not be available for swimming in 1990 but it shall be ready to open in early spring of 1991.

## Storm Warning System Top Business During Commissioners Court

BRACKETTVILLE, TX

The Commissioners Court convened Monday morning, August 13, in regular session after Judge Tommy Seargeant called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M.

With three commissioners in attendance a quorum was established and the meeting progressed with the reading of the minutes by Dolores Raney. The minutes were approved as read.

### STORM WARNING SYSTEM

The subject of re-advertising for installation of the storm warning system that was approved at the July meeting was raised by Judge Seargeant. County Attorney, Tully Shahan, informed the Court that many items of importance must be secured before a system like this can be installed. First of all, an interlocal governmental contract with Fort Clark Springs, MUD Maintenance, and the city of Spofford for a joint effort to install said systems. Many other areas of importance must be looked into before a contractor can be given the green light to go ahead with construction. Items of utmost importance mentioned by Shahan

were easements, liability, indemnity agreement, placement, maintenance,

insurance, area coverage, type of devices (telephone, automatic, manual, etc.) synchronization in/or without City of Brackettville and Spofford and the number of decibels etcetera. It was agreed that more research would go into the project before any forward progress could be implemented. Shahan reminded the commissioners that the county must own the land the post goes on. He also questioned the commissioners on the project after it has been installed. Who will maintain it, be liable for it, insure it, and so forth. Many questions remain unanswered.

### BUDGET AMENDMENT

The budget was amended to accommodate the TAC current budget, the Clerk's budget, and the Heat Stress Relief Program.

### PAYROLL CHECK PROCEDURE

A policy on requests for early payment of salary checks was discussed. It was agreed to proceed with the present system.

### NUECES RIVER CROSSING

Sealed bids for the Nueces River crossings were opened and reviewed by the commissioners. Alamo Construction was awarded the contract for the steel work and Baker Construction was awarded the contract for the concrete work. Construction will start as soon as possible.

### CLEANING CEMETERY AND PURCHASING LAWNMOWER

The commissioners agreed to mow and maintain the cemetery with Ruben Fuentes overseeing the project. The request for the purchase of a new lawnmower was rejected.

### SENIOR CITIZENS BUILDING (old jail)

After the commissioners made a visual check of the old jail building it was agreed that Nicho and Bernie Cervantes would do the work on the building while Henry Lozano would cut the bars from the old jailhouse windows.

### CIRCULAR COMMISSIONERS TABLE

The request by commissioner Slubar to purchase a new round table

to replace the one now in use was tabled by the court.

### DPS BROCHURE

The purchase of an ad in the DPS brochure for the 17th DPS conference by the Commissioners Court of Kinney County was declared illegal.

### MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

A handicap ramp for the Justice of the Peace office will be presented to the City. The budget was amended to cover county wide utilities from insurance & bonds; amend budget for library assistant's salary; amend the jail budget to cover supplies.

### COURTHOUSE ANNEX

Plans for expansion on the annex building will be funded by the Department of Human Resources. The various floor plans available were presented to James Crumley with the Soil Conservation and Alan McWilliams, the County Extension Agent. An agreement was reached by both departments. Commissioner Bizzell was appointed to contact the Department of Human Resources in San Antonio for the purpose of working out minor details.

### "Special message to a special woman"

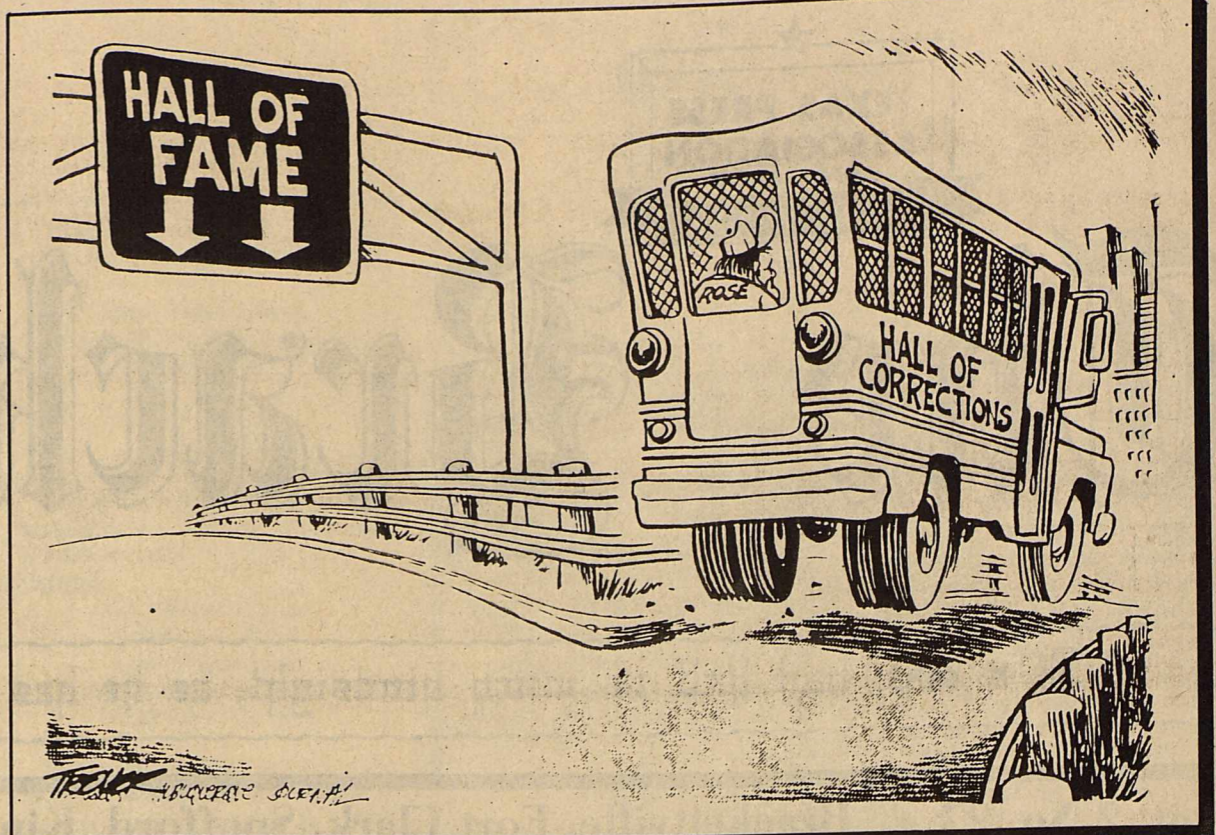

It isn't often that grandparents are blessed with two grandchildren at almost the same time.

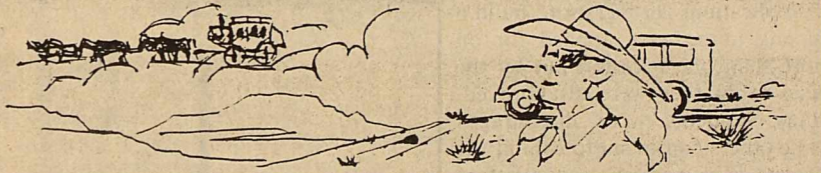

## Days Past

In August, 1774, a Judge Henderson from North Carolina hired Daniel Boone to lead a group of woodsmen to improve the old Indian trails from Virginia into Kentucky--this road later was known as the Wilderness Road. In August 1784, Junipera Serra died as he was still working for his people. He founded twenty-one missions along the coast of Cali-

fornia. Among them the world famous San Juan Capistrano. Loved by the Indians he converted six thousand of them and made them successful farmers as well. During the War of 1812, in August British General Ross's expeditionary force set fire to our Capitol, the White House and other government buildings in Washington D.C.

In August 1812, Missouri became the 24th state, and the twelfth to permit slavery. The capitol was Jefferson City, and the 1820 census showed 55,856 people including 10,222 slaves. In August 1844, Fremont returned to St. Louis, Missouri, bringing maps and journals of his trips. He wrote a guide which was to lead a generation of westward bound settlers.

## Fishing Report

AMISTAD, TX--Water slightly murky, 80 degrees, 18 feet low; black bass are fair to 6 pounds on topwaters early and Zara Spooks later in the day; striper are fair in 40-60 feet of water; crappie are slow; white bass are picking up near the dam; catfish are very good in shallow water on cheese bait and shrimp in grassy areas.

BRAUNIG, TX--Water murky, 90 degrees, normal level; black bass are slow; striper are slow; catfish are good to 8 pounds on nightcrawlers and shrimp; redfish are fair to 13 pounds on spoons and tilapia.

CALAVERAS, TX--Water murky, 85 degrees, 3 inches above normal level; black bass are slow; striper are very good on silver spoons to 6 pound average; catfish are good to 23 pounds on shad and perch; corvina are good to 8 pounds on shrimp and perch; redfish are good on silver spoons and cranks.

CHOKO, TX--Water clear, 82 degrees, 11 feet low; black bass are fair to 12 pounds, 12 ounces on spinners in 8 feet of water in the main lake, bass are good early in 2-5 feet of water on spinners and topwaters, Rat-L-Traps; around 10 a.m. bass move in 10-20 feet of water, deep diving cranks are best in the lower half of lake; striper are slow to 15 pounds, 5 ounces trolling near the dam; crappie are slow; white bass are slow; catfish are good to 11 pounds on cheese baits, blood baits and shrimp.

COLETO CREEK, TX-- Water clearing, 88 degrees, normal level; black bass are slow; striper are slow; crappie are fair to 15 fish per string on minnows; catfish are good to 2 1/2 pounds on bloodbait and shrimp.

CORPUS CHRISTI, TX--Water clear, 85 degrees, lake full; black bass are good to 7 pounds on black or chartreuse buzz baits; striper are good to 9 pounds off Sunrise Beach Pier on live shad; crappie are good to 20 fish per string in 10-17 feet of water on minnows; white bass are good under the birds on white slab spoons; blue catfish are good to 30 pounds on trotlines baited with live sunfish; yellow catfish are good to 28 pounds on trotlines baited with goldfish.

FALCON, TX--Water slightly off color on upper end, clear near dam, 84 degrees, 24 feet low; black bass are slow; striper are fairly good in the dam area; crappie are slow; white bass are good near the dam on jig and spoon; catfish are good to 3 1/2 pounds on rod and reel baited with shrimp.

MEDINA, TX--Water clear, 35 feet low; black bass are slow; striper are slow; crappie are fair to 3/4 pounds, no limits, on minnows; white bass are slow; catfish are good to 14 pounds on stink baits and live baits.

TEXANA, TX--Water fairly clear in main lake, clear in the jungle, 90 degrees, normal level; black bass are fair to 3 1/2 pounds on spinners, worms early and late; striper and white bass are slow; crappie are fairly slow; catfish are slow.

Mr. Campbell grew up in Welch, Texas, and attended Dawson high school where he participated in football, basketball, track, and tennis.

# County Agent News

This week's article ties in with the previously written one on types of fencing materials to be used around your home landscape. As with the fences, it is best to evaluate your own family's needs and what role a patio or porch will serve in your landscape.

There are two things that you cannot overlook in your selection of a surface: the surface needs to look good and it needs to be safe. It can be fun to plan the design but make sure it will not be slippery during wet or icy weather.

Concrete is the most common patio or walk surface. It is often unimaginative when it's massed in large squares. But, it does have advantages. It's quick and it's permanent. It can also be finished smooth for areas that are not going to be wet or broom-finished before it dries, to put a tread surface into it.

Exposed aggregate concrete is formed in the same way as plain concrete, but small pea gravel is embedded in its surface just as it begins to set. Once it has dried, the surface is acid-washed to give it a bright clean look. Exposed aggregate surfaces are natural looking and have the convenience of concrete. They blend well with plantings. They are not, however, good do-it-yourself projects unless you have some skill at finishing gravel surfaces.

Brick pavers are probably the third most common walk and patio surface. There are many colors available, so you can achieve almost any landscape look you desire.

Should you ever have to work under them, you can quickly lift them up, then replace them. This is a fun project for do-it-yourselfers. A

little more care is required when installing them in heavy traffic area like driveways and parking areas.

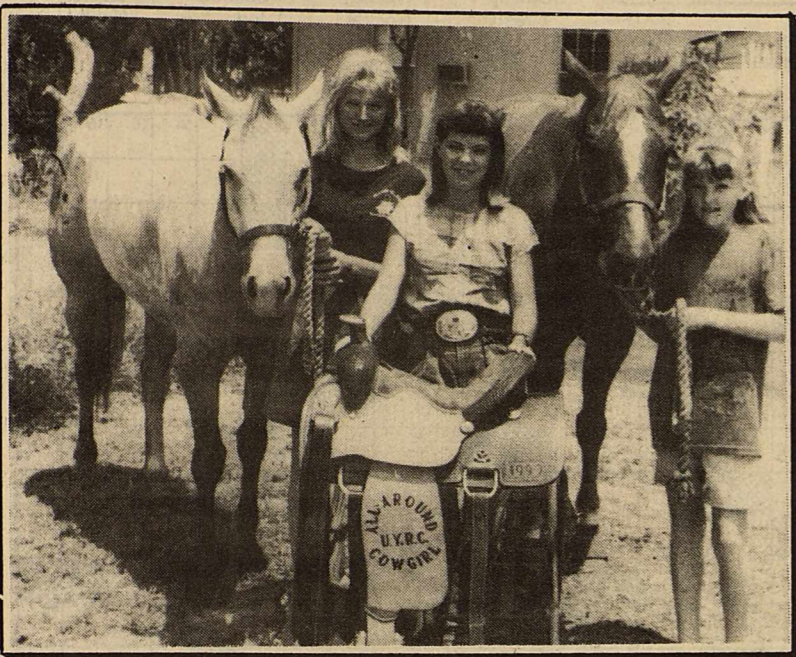
Decking is very popular. It's natural and can easily compensate for uneven terrain changes. In fact, decks really look the part when there is some variation in the terrain. Redwood or treated pine last best, both holding up to rain and other abuse for decades. A deck must be securely attached and be sure the exposed portions that contact the ground are treated for termites. Coat the wood with a protective stain or clear sealant once it has aged and dried somewhat, usually six to eight weeks after it's built.

Flagstoned surfaces are beautiful and they are the ultimate in a natural look. It is easy to have an uneven, sloppy surface if care is not taken when they are laid.

It takes a great deal of time and patience to lay a good flagstoned surface. It needs to go over a bed of brick sand. You can then fill in the crack with pea gravel or mortar to hold the stones in place.

Flagstones are particularly appropriate for garden pathways into the landscape or through the woods. Quarried stone can be beautiful, particularly if large pieces are used as walks through groundcover and perennial beds.

Which ever type you use, it will look attractive once you get it installed in your landscape. It will also create an exciting new, fresh look to your land-scape. For more information, you can contact the county extension office located on the second floor of the county courthouse.



Left to Right: Charlie, Kasey and Katie Hall.

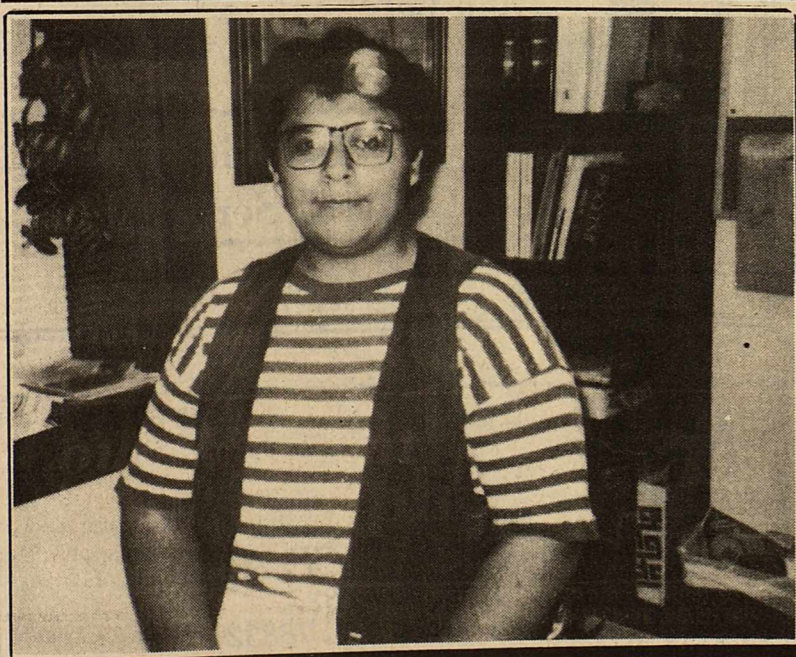
## All Around Cowgirl Wins Trophy Saddle

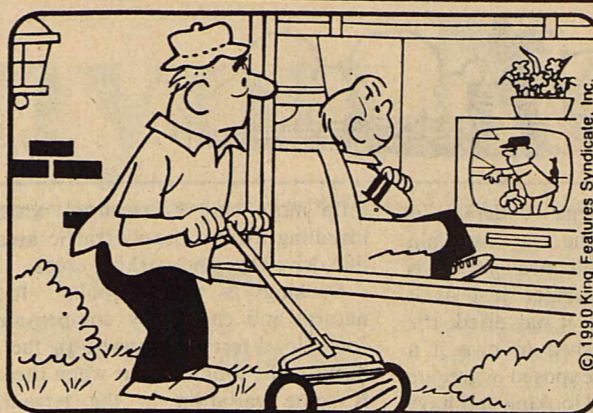

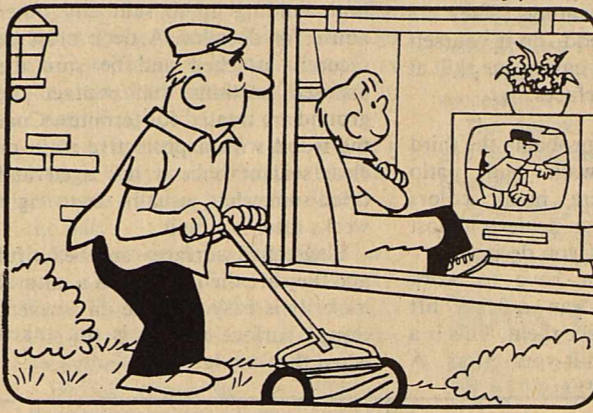

Super S Foods last spring awarded over \$250,000 in Apple Computers, printers and software packages to schools in Central and South Texas. The new program this fall is estimated to generate well over \$500,000 in free computers and equipment to local schools in the Super S Foods marketing area.

Schools collect gold register tapes from the commencement of the program on Wednesday, August 8th. Tapes value can be accumulated toward a goal of purchasing a set piece of computer equipment. Of course, this is all brand new equipment which is fully covered by the manufacturer's regular warranty."

Any school can join the program by registering with the "Apples for the Students" Coordinator, or by contacting their local Super S Foods Store Manager. Complete program details will then be sent to them at their school.

"Apples for the Students was designed to address the growing need for more computer equipment in our primary and secondary schools," Mr. Stanley said. "It will help promote computer literacy among students who will be graduating into increasingly computerized workplaces and college environments."

"This exciting program" Mr. Stanley said, "is an excellent example of a business/educational partnership. Super S Foods strives to serve the community and we can think of no better way to reinvest our funds into our communities than by helping to further the education of our young people."

### Grandma's Kitchen

Here's a real cute story I know most of you will enjoy, so the rest of you, don't take offense, none intended. Here goes:

#### Unmeddle-some Mother-in-Law

"I've always thought the prize for Most Unmeddle-some Mother-in-Law should go to my grandmother. Mom and Dad were driving cross-country returning from vacation and bringing Mom's mother home with them. The second hot afternoon of the trip, Dad pulled into a gas station. All three got out to stretch and visit the rest room while the car was being serviced. Dad got back in the car later and asked "All set?" Grandma in the front seat said "Yes", so off he drove. A few miles down the road he glanced back at an empty rear seat. Bewildered, he asked Grandma why she hadn't told him he was leaving Mom behind. She said quietly, "I just figured you knew what you were doing."

Wasn't that a cute story? I'll bet ole grandma was laughing all over inside as they went back.

I figure that it is time we should get to some Hints for the Household:

- 1. Mildew is one of the most difficult of all stains to remove. Rub well with brown soap, then apply a paste of chalk and water and place the article in the sunshine. After several applications the stain will be bleached out. 2. Iron rust may be removed by covering the stain with a thick layer of salt and then saturating it with lemon juice, then laying it in the sunshine to bleach.

- 3. To remove tea, coffee, or claret stains, rub powdered borax into the stained part and pour boiling water through it. 4. Washing your hands twice a day with dry cornmeal, and rubbing on a little diluted glycerine at night will keep them soft and white. 5. A little linseed oil brushed over faded green blinds will, if they are not too far gone, make them look almost as good as new.

This next recipe is a good way to dress up a pound of ground beef and make it something special. Make it in a cast iron skillet for that rustic look. It'll also give you extra iron and is convenient to go from stove to oven to table all in the same pan.

#### Hamburger Pie

- 4 onions-shredded
1 lb. ground beef
1 tea salt
pepper to taste
2 TBS flour
1 TBS Worcestershire sauce
1 cup water
1-4 oz can mushroom stems undrained
1 bouillon cube
1 cup biscuit mix
1/4 cup milk
1 cup sour cream

1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
Cook beef and onions about 5 minutes, breaking up meat with fork. Drain off any excess grease. Add salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce and mushrooms. Stir in flour; add water and bouillon cube; bring to boil. Prepare biscuit mix according to package directions, using enough milk to make a thin batter and spread lightly over top of meat mixture. Bake in 425 degree oven until topping is done and lightly browned. Spread with sour cream and sprinkle with shredded cheese. Bake another 5 minutes longer or until cheese melts. Sprinkle with parsley if desired; makes 6 servings. It also freezes well.

Here's one more quick recipe, this one is really old, so you may already have it.

#### Sweet Potato Souffle

- 3 cups cooked mashed sweet potatoes
1 cup sugar
1/2 tea salt
1/2 stick margarine
1 tea vanilla
2 eggs

Mix all ingredients and pour into a greased baking dish (add a little milk if mixture seems very dry) - then mix together:

- 1 cup flaked coconut
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup self rising flour

Place this mixture on top of 1st mixture. Bake at 300 degrees for 35 minutes or until topping is lightly browned.

### Beyond The Horizon

In Ohio in 1801, a man by the name of Jonathon Chapman turned up with a horse-load of apple seeds which he planted in various places near streams of water. We hear of him next when he was noticed coming down the Ohio river in 1806.

He was known as Johnny Appleseed in every log cabin from the Ohio River to the northern lakes, and westward to the prairies in what is now the state of Indiana. He had two canoes lashed together and was carrying a load of appleseeds to the western frontier for the purpose of planting and growing orchards in the further most part of the white settlements.

He started his project at twenty-six years of age and his whole afterlife was spent in the work of planting appleseeds in remote places. Most of his journeys were made on foot. And most of the time he traveled in his bare feet ignoring the briars and snakes.

His clothes were rags, but the children loved him. The Indians never bothered him in his travels.

He followed the teachings of Emanuel Swedenborg, a Swedish Seer and carried books of his teachings which were supposed to protect him from harm, even snakebite. He believed God had appointed him to preach the gospel of love and plant appleseeds to provide orchards for him fellowman. He never harmed any living creature, man or beast.

In the summer of 1847, we find him headed further west. He would stop at log cabins and entertain the family by reading the beatitudes from the Bible.

One morning, he was found on a cabin doorstep dying in a happy state. At seventy-two years of age, Johnny Appleseed died as one of the memorial men of pioneer times, who never inflicted pain on anyone or had an enemy.

He left apple trees over a hundred thousand square miles of territory and spent forty-six years devoted to his self-imposed mission. So when you smell the apple blossoms in the west you can think of Johnny Appleseed who brought them to us.

## Great, great fishing at Choke Canyon Lake

CALLIHAM--A small fishing lake, located entirely within the Calliham Unit of Choke Canyon State Park, is stocked with bass and native fish species, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said.

"Youngsters love fishing there," said Bob Hauser, director of park operations. "It's got plenty of pan-sized fish habitat and three earthen jetties built along the shoreline for fishing. No boats are allowed on the lake.

Officials expect the fish to have plenty of food and predict they may grow to trophy size in a few years. Fish species include largemouth bass, catfish, bluegill, sunfish, carp and crappie.

"Small bass are usually aggressive and fun to catch," said Jimmy Dean, fisheries district management supervisor.

The bass must be released, but fishing regulations apply when keeping other fish species.

Nineteen new walk-in tent campsites also have been opened. The sites are adjacent to the new lake and the reservoir, said Park Superintendent Tommy Hicks. "Visitors can easily walk from the parking lot to their campsite."

Each campsite has a sheltered picnic table, ground fire ring, stand-up cooking grill and nearby water faucets. A restroom and new fish cleaning table are located in the camping area.

Reservations can be made by calling between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at (512) 786-3868. Choke Canyon is in South Texas just west of I37 between San Antonio and Corpus Christi. Take Highway 72 west to Calliham and turn on Park Road 8 to reach the park.

Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$.1829 per \$100 of taxable value or 21.34 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.
