Brackettville Merchants Targeted By Burglers

Brackettville merchants are under the gun it seems as a rash of break-ins occurred this week. Thursday morning, June 20, 1991, Davis Hardware and Sweets and Things were burglarized.

On Wednesday the 26th it was discovered that Davis Hardware had been broken into for a second time either early that morning or late Tuesday evening.

In the first break-in of Davis Hardware the burglars gained entry by smashing the glass front door. Approximately \$250.00 in cash was taken. According to Zack Davis, owner, nothing else appeared to be missing.

In the second break-in in less than a week, entry was gained by smashing in the front glass window and the glass panel next to the front door. There is no evidence of anything missing at this time based on reports from Mr. Davis.

Sweets and Things suffered less than \$50.00 damage, and that occurred by attempted forced entry through the front door and actual entry through a sliding glass window.

Syrup bottles were knocked over, televisions were unplugged, the venetian blind was knocked off the window and popcorn boxes were scattered over the floor. No other damage was reported and nothing seemed to be missing according to owner, Robert Correa.

According to the Kinney County Sheriff's Department, the break-ins are still under investigation.



Calhoun Builders of Mansfield, Louisiana is breaking ground on Highway 90 on the west side of Brackettville for a thirty-two unit apartment. The Brackett Seniors Apartments will have sixteen onebedroom units and 16 two bed-room

Construction Superintendent, J.W. Ham says, "This is an approximately two and a half month project. It should be finished sometime in Septemeber. We have moved in a ten man crew and are using Hazel Earwood's building, formerly Pat's Place, as a bunkhouse. We anticipate using about a dozen local people to help complete the project.

The Hams moved in their travel trailer and set up a mini-home complete with barbecue and flowers. Some of the work crew have also brought in their trailers and families.





Grandma's Kitchen

I'll bet you didn't know that vanilla was used for other things besides flavoring.

Liquid vanilla flavoring is obtained from the fully grown but unripe pods found on greenstemmed perennial vines growing wild and extensively cultivated throughout Mexico and many other tropic places.

Pollination is done artificially, except in Mexico where they have certain hummingbirds and butterflies not found anywhere else in the

Because of the high price of vanilla and the low cost of vanillin, extracts have been extensively adulterated.

Vanillin is the major flavor component with over 150 other aroma chemicals being present as well.

In South American countries an alcoholic extract of the dried pods is taken for increasing amorous desires.

Take 4 to 6 pods, steep in 2 cups of tequila or imported cognac for 21 days in a well-stoppered flask or glass container of some kind. Shake the bottle serveral times each day during the 21 days. Then, this mixture (tincture, they call it) is taken in

doses of 10 - 20 drops, 2 or 3 times




Sleep and Sleep Disorders. If you are interested in a subject nd feel you have exhausted local information in that area, stop by, see what we have.

DATE GRANOLA SQUARES

They're delicious, packed full of crunchy granola and sweet dates.

2 large eggs 1/4 cup margarine 11/2 cups unsweetened pear juice 1 Tea baking soda 1 cup unsweetened granola

2 Tea baking powder 1 cup chopped dates 1 Tea cinnamon 1/4 Tea ginger

1 Tea nutmeg

In a medium sized mixing bowl, hand beat together eggs, margarine, and pear juice. Add flour, granola, baking soda, baking powder, dates and spices. Beat thoroughly. Spoon batter into an oiled and floured 9 x 13" baking pan, and spread batter evenly with a spoon. Now, mix together 1/2 cup chopped dates and 1/2 cup unsweetened granola and sprinkle this over the batter. Bake at 350° for 20 minutes, or until knife inserted into batter comes out clean.

To make your own unsweetened granola, combine equal amounts of any of the following: rolled oats, chopped nuts, flaked coconut, sesame seeds, chopped sunflower seeds, dried fruit. Notice, the recipes I gave you have NO sugar at all, but they are delicious.

The treaty with Spain in 1819 made the Arkansas River west of the 100th meridian a part of the western boundary of the United States. The name, Arkansas, which had applied only to lower reaches of the stream, was carried westward by American traders and trappers.

The Arkansas River was navigable with keelboats as far west as Grande River. In early days 'Arkansas' applied to Arkansas River, the mountains north of it and the post near the mouth.

"Arkansas Traveler" is not only the best-known piece of folklore that Arkansas can lay claim to but the favorite of all old-time breakdown fiddle tunes in America.

The clever dialogue and the catchy tune go back to the days of Davy Crockett, but the author of neither has been determined. Newspapers, books and articles of commerce have taken the title.

As the tradition goes, a stranger traveling in Arkansas comes to a roofless tavern before which the proprietor sits fiddling "Where does the road go?" asked the stranger. "It's never gone anywhar since I've been here," the squatter answers, going on fiddling.

Finally, after more such colloquy, the stranger asks, "Why don't you play the rest of the tune?" So the squatter makes the stranger dismount and play. This "part of the tune" brings forth civil, horse provender, a hospitality having all the gusto of a country hoe-down.

The Great Bend of the Arkansas was an important landmark on the Santa Fe Trail marking the first point at which the river was encountered, 278 miles from Independence, and half-way to Bent's Fort, which joined the Arkansas at the apex of the bend. Travelers commonly encountered the first fringe of the buffalo herds, and Pawnee Rock, 15 miles beyond, was regarded as the beginning of the hostile Indian coun-

This rose is multiflora which stays compact, four feet high and five feet wide. There are hundreds of pink flowers per plant, each two yard.

This rose is the result of many crosses. For wildlife, this rose offers the cover density of a multiflora. June 23, 1845 - A special session of the Republic of Texas Congress met to vote for annexation to the United

June 3, 1846 - Colonel Stephen Watts Kearney, commander of "The Army of the West," was authorized to take possession of California with naval support from Commodore John D. Sloat, who was to blockade Mexican ports in the Pacific and seize the San Francisco Bay. Commodore David Conner set up blockades of enemy ports on the Gulf of Mexico.

June 14, 1846 - Rivalry among Mexican leaders helped foster "The Bear Flag Revolt." A handful of settlers took over the city of Sonoma, led by William B. Ide. They raised a flag with the emblem of a bear and declared the Republic of California

independent of México. They were joined by Fremont, who was chosen to lead the new Republic on the 5th of July.

June 15, 1846 - The Senate consented to a new treaty with Great Britain abolishing co-habitation of the Oregon Territory by the two countries and setting the USA -British boundary at the 49th parallel.

June 6, 1847 - President Polk authorized Nicholas P. Trist to negotiate a truce with the Mexican Government of Santa Anna. However, British Minister Charles Bankhead's services were required as liaison between Trist and General Scott before any discussions were held with the enemy. Scott regarded the Trist mission as an invasion of his business, and armistice as a

military question.

June 3 - 10, 1850 - A convention of the slave states advocated extending the Missouri Compromise line to the Pacific. This would include the Southwest and Monterey in southern California, in the area open to slavery. The irony was that the land involved was primarily suited for cattle grazing and ranching, activities that were incompatible with slave labor.

June 29, 1854 - Pennsylvania lawyer Andrew Reeder was appointed the first territorial governor of Kansas. June 9 - 11, 1856 - The first of 10 handcart brigades left Iowa City for Salt Lake City. Two companies of 497 persons drawing 100 carts, all newly converted to the Mormon faith was in the party. They reached Zion on September 26.





Trustees Take Action In Special Meeting

The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees held a special meeting on Monday, June 24, 1991 to act on items that were tabled for further consideration in the regular monthly meeting. During the meeting the Board took the following action:

A compensation plan for both professional and auxiliary workers was approved. This plan was developed by Texas Association of School Boards. It provides a flexible pay plan for all levels of district employees and will be implemented for the 1991-92 school year. Superintendent McCall noted that the plan establishes what a job is worth in Brackett ISD and gives the Board a clear means to make logical choices about the affordability of pay increases. McCall also noted that Brackett ISD pays all of its employees very well in comparison with other school districts in the area of similar size and taxable property wealth.

The proposal to close the new Middle School Campus for the 1991-92 school year was approved. A closed campus is a campus in which the school children are not allowed to leave during the school day.
Administrative recommendations

for closing the campus centered on the addition of the 6th grade and the need to reduce tardies. Parents who wish to personally pick their children up during the lunch period will be able to do so by contacting the campus principal.

"We know that many military personnel are back home now and glad to be with their families," said TPWD executive director Andy

New Legislation Increases State Veterans Housing Benefits

AUSTIN--The maximum amount available through the Texas Housing Assistance Program (VHAP) is expected to more than double from \$20,000 to \$45,000 on September 1 as a result of new legislation signed into law by Governor Ann Richards.

"Increasing the maximum loan amount to \$45,000 brings the program more in line with the realities of today's economy," said Garry Mauro, who serves as chairman of the Texas Veterans Land * Board

Assistance Program currently makes 30-year, fixed-rate loans at 8.5 percent for the purchase of a new or existing home.

Mauro said Texas veterans can combine a Texas VHAP loan with a conventional, FHA or VA loan to get a lower overall mortgage rate and lower payments.

Tentative approval has also been given to the VLB to raise the maximum loan available through the Texas Veterans Land Program from \$20,000 to \$40,000. Mauro stressed, however, that this action cannot be taken without additional approval

The Texas Veterans Housing from Congress. Mauro said changes in federal tax law are required to increase the ceiling and he is currently working with the Texas delegation to accomplish this.


Mauro said boosting the home loan limit to \$45,000 will "provide a financing alternative for low-tomoderate income veterans who are currently locked out of the housing

When the Veterans Land Program was initiated in 1949, the land board set the loan limit at \$7,500. On the average that was good for the purchase of about 150

"If you apply a conservative inflation rate to those figures, the equivalent figure in today's market would be a \$39,000 loan limit. And that same 150-acre tract now goes for \$103,000 at today's prices.'

The land loan ceiling was last raised in 1979 from \$15,000 to \$20,000. The home loan program was created in 1983 with a \$20,000

The Texas Veterans Land Program will lend eligible Texas veterans up to \$20,000 at 7.99 percent interest to purchase at least five acres of land.

We have been fortunate to receive some nice rains lately and everything seems to be holding its own with a little supplemental irrigation. But when the days get extremely hot and the rains do not occur for a week or so, then gardens and beds can dry out very quickly. **Conserve Water By Mulching**

You can save water in your gardens by adding mulch. This one practice can separate the super gardener from an average one, particularly during the dry periods. This may well be the most valuable cultural practice that one can do to help the vegetable garden and lan-

A good mulch can reduce soil packing, blowing and washing, suppress weeds, keep the soil moist, regulate soil temperature, add organic matter and keep vegetable fruits, such as squash, off the ground and free of many diseases.

Mulches also have advantages in the landscape. They improve plant growth, enhance the appearance of the landscape and reduce main-

With summer heat drying vegetable gardens and landscapes, the most important benefit of a mulch is to reduce evaporation from the soil surface. Because of the reduced evaporation, the soil moisture level remains more constant, which promotes root growth.

Mulches also modify soil temperatures in home gardens. Summer mulches cool the soil and create a better environment for plant growth.

A thin layer of mulch reduces disease problems and, since most weed seed require light to germinate, a thick layer of mulch will help shade them out and can reduce weed problems by 90 percent of

Fall Gardens Mean Summer Work

For a successful fall garden, you can't wait until fall to get started. Soil preparation, fertilizing and planting all have to be done during the heat of the summer.

Like preparation for a spring garden, fall gardens benefit from generous amounts of organic matter such as hay, peat moss, shredded leaves, grass clipping, compost, barnyard manure or even shredded

A 3- to 4-inch layer of organic matter is necessary to physically change the structure of the soil. Till the material into the garden at least 6 to 8 inches deep.

Fertilizer also should be applied at the same time. If your soil is high in phosphorus or you used a high phosphorus fertilizer such as 10-20-10 in the spring, then nitrogen is probably all you will need to add for

About 1 pound of a high-nitrogen fertilizer, such as ammonium sulphate or ammonium nitrate, can be used for each 100 square feet of garden area. This can be broadcast on top of the organic matter and all tilled in together.

the preparation, August to early September is the time to plant most vegetables for fall harvest. Many vegetables perform better under Texas fall weather conditions. Crops such as green beans, cucumbers and squash need to be planted early so that harvest is completed by the time the first frost occurs.

Other vegetables that can withstand freezes down to 25 degrees F. or so are beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, collards, lettuce, mustard, onion, parsley, radish, spinach and



Artist Spellmon Returns For Juneteenth Celebration He was in Brackettville to exhibit

The representation of the real, that has conventionally been considered a major task of painting, takes a tour through the work of Doc Spellmon. His visually packed paintings, scenes of rural life, explode with dense passages and energized fields. The work is more informed by the traditions of folk art than the cultural mainstream, providing it a directness and sincerity often forfeited by contemporary artists.

Who is Doc Spellmon? He is an Afro-American artist from the Red River Valley of Texas who records the images of a lifetime.

A turning point in Doc's artistic career came when a friend told him, "You missed slavery by an inch, so you better be independent. Paint your own life. Paint like a black The expressionistic oils depict black imagery and design elements which seem to ooze from the tubes and creep off the canvas. They are jazzy, yet sentimental, rhythmic textures reminiscent of the work of William Johnson.

The thick impasto surfaces are like depictions of the black unconscious, for beneath layers of violent color, rests something quiet and ob-

Doc seems to paint anything he gets his hand on, there are washboards with washing scenes, old coca-cola trays with sunsets, and even dinner plates aren't safe from this king of kitsch. Yet, there is substance to these rural motifs, for he is ...documenting the hidden heritage of Blacks in the rural South.'

Who is Doc Spellmon? He is a hero to his generation with a whole bag full of degrees and an accumulation of awards over the past twenty years. Internationally known, the work of F. L. (Doc) Spellmon resides in the permanent collections of the Carver Museum in Austin, and the San Antonio Museum, as well as many private collections throughout the United States. On June 19, 1991, his work was displayed at the Carver School in Brackettville, Texas.

his work, visit with friends, and enjoy himself. It was not his first trip to Brackettville. In fact, he was here

in 1990 for Juneteenth. In 1990, Mr. Spellmon was one of thirteen Texas visual artists who won Fellowships in Painting and Works on Paper funded by the Texas Commission on the Arts and Mid-America Arts Alliance in poperation with the National Endowment for the Arts.

Each year hundreds of regional artists compete in the program (762 entries in 1990). The twenty winners receive awards of \$3,500 to \$5,000 and gain wider visibility through exhibits of their work organized with funding assistance from M-AAA's Do-It-Yourself-Exhibit Project. Thirteen were from Texas, twelve besides Mr. Spellmon.

Doc's purpose is to complete the paintings he has researched for over ten years depicting the Black Seminole Indians of Brackettville.

He is San Antonio's leading black artist - his art continues to grow more ambitious.

Although his most popular work has always been his smaller paintings of pastoral black life, miniature scenes of fishing ponds, gardens, juilting parties and other rural settings, he has always balanced these urban scenes as well: clotheslines in the alley, city street scenes, and jumbled montages.

His subjects include sunsets in Africa, slaves picking cotton, Biblethumping preachers and juke-joint dancers. He is a retired Army illustrator whose complex style employing abstract elements betrays his formal training.

Incorporating such figures as Martin Luther King, Jr. and John F. Kennedy, many of his works are political, although not always in ways you would expect. For example, one montage of black history is, without a trace of irony, titled Uncle Tom - The First Non-Violent

Who is Doc Spellmon? He is a fine artist, and a role model for all young people. He will always be welcome in Brackettville.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 10, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance

of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to







Low-income households may be eligible for energy assistance

AUSTIN-Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to the Texas Department of Human Services.

The one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in May. Other low-income individuals may request an application by calling the toll-free number 1-800-252-8060 during the enrollment period of July 1 through

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a oneperson household having less than \$628.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$842.49 for households of two persons, \$1,056.49 for

three, \$1,270.49 for four, \$1,484.49 for five, and \$1,698.49 for six. Households are eligible if the cost for

cooling is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs. Energy assistance checks are sent

directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider. People receiving one of these energy

assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider busi-

ness office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference

in conjunction with the Middle Rio Grande Development Council and Private Industry Council is offering a College Bound Program to JTPA eligible students in the nine-county region this summer. MRGDC is the administrative entity for the JTPA

The new program was written by David England, SWTJC director of planning, external relations and developmental studies, and will be funded by approximately \$80,000 in JTPA funds.

According to Ricky McNiel, Youth Coordinator with MRGDC, the program is only one component of the region's summer youth program.

'In addition to the College Bound Program offered through SWTJC, we also have programs offered through St. Mary's University in San Antonio and Texas A&I University in Kingsville," McNiel said. "We have a subcontract with St. Mary's University that is open to high school seniors, and a College Exploration Program and Migrant Student Program at A&I. The Exploration Program is open to May 1991 high school graduates while the migrant program is open to migrant students from 14 years of

The College Bound Program, a six week academic/work study program, is being offered for the first time in the region to help economically disadvantaged studen-

by Coordinated Development Studies Counselor, Martina Arreola, the program gives students an opportunity to earn college credit, to experience a college environment and to broaden their social exposure through

various field trips. "We have about 40 students enrolled representing eight counties," Arreola said. "Each student is taking either a three hour college

Southwest Texas Junior College credit course or a remedial class and a physical education course. In addition each student is placed in a job and receives minimum wage for 16 hours of work a week," she continued.

The program is open to JTPA eligible students and pays tuition, fees, books, room and board and transportation. In addition each student receives the opportunity to participate in a work experience program.

'Eligible students must be 16 to 18 years of age and have completed their junior or senior year of high school," Arreola said. "Students live in the dorms, eat in the cafeteria and are not allowed to leave without permission of their parent or legal guardian. It is an intensive sixweeks, 7 days a week program," she

"My staff and I are their parents for this six-week period," she laughed. "We take the kids to church on Sunday and to various field trips to San Antonio. The first week we went to Sea World and have trips to the zoo, the Witte Museum and possibly Astroworld planned."

In addition to Arreola, the College Bound Program is staffed by Eduardo Cuellar, job counselor, Sotero Alviar, Jr., recreational counselor, Manuel Alejandro, activities direc-

tor and Joe Barker, PE instructor. About a dozen of the students are May 1991 high school graduates with the remaining preparing to start their senior year in the fall.

According to Cuellar the students are placed in jobs both on campus and in the local business community. Local businesses participating in the work study portion of the program are Dale Evans Day Care, The Department of Human Services, Region 6 Clinic, Family Life Center, Housing Authority, Uvalde County Clinic and Uvalde Cares for

"Many of those who are planning to enroll at SWTJC in the fall were placed in jobs on campus where they may possibly be placed during the Cuellar said. "They are receiving their training this summer and will be able to continue with their jobs when school resumes in

According to England, many of these students are not sure if they want to continue their education and by having an opportunity to experience college life through College Bound they are better able to make that decision.

"We are glad to be able to offer this program to encourage these kids to go to college and possibly raise their academic potential,' England said.

Cuellar added, "Many of the students I have talked with were not planning to continue their education after high school, but after only two weeks here many of them have expressed a desire to enroll at SWTJC in the fall. In fact, six of our CB participants are hoping to continue as work study students during the fall semester at their present work site. Several of our off-campus workers are also making arrangements to

continue their jobs during the fall." In summing up MRGDC's programs, McNiel said, "basically we are serving approximately 950 students this summer in the ninecounty region." In addition to the

"For example, if a student failed English at Uvalde High School and qualified for a place in the summer youth program, I.S.D. summer school would be the assignment," he said. "On the other hand, if the student passed but tested two or more grade levels below his grade classification, he or she would attend remediation classes. Those students who passed and tested only one grade level below their classification are allowed to participate in the 7 week work experience program and work 32 hours a week for minimum wage,' he continued.

programs I mentioned earlier, we also have 250 students enrolled in I.S.D. summer school, 200 in MRGDC remediation classes at our centers and approximately 475 in a seven week work experience component."

According to McNiel, eligible students are placed into the program most suited to their needs. According to McNiel, next year

the plans are to expand the College Bound Program to include both summer sessions. "This program is a great oppor-

tunity for students and if we are funded next year we plan to let the kids attend both summer sessions,' he concluded.
