within the county education district.l
This proposed amendmient would authorize the new districts to hold elections to allow voters within the districts to decide whether to grant an exemption on a percentage of the assessed value of residence
homesteads; whether to grant an additional exemption on the homesteads of elderly and disabled persons; and whether to impose taxes on certain types of personal property. In the enabling legislation that was passed during the regular session of the legislature, the amount of the elderly and disabled persons was set at $\$ 10,000$. These exemptions would be in addition to the existing $\$ 5,000$ homestead exemption, the
